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# A BILL

To require the Secretary of Homeland Security to conduct a northern border threat analysis, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

**3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Northern Border Secu-  
5       rity Review Act”.

**6 SEC. 2. NORTHERN BORDER THREAT ANALYSIS.**

7       (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the  
8       date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Home-

1 land Security shall submit to the appropriate congress-  
2 sional committees a Northern Border threat analysis that  
3 includes—

4 (1) current and potential terrorism and crimi-  
5 nal threats posed by individuals and organized  
6 groups seeking to—

7 (A) enter the United States through the  
8 Northern Border; or

9 (B) exploit border vulnerabilities along the  
10 Northern Border;

11 (2) improvements needed at and between ports  
12 of entry along the Northern Border to—

13 (A) prevent terrorists and instruments of  
14 terror from entering the United States; and

15 (B) reduce criminal activity, as measured  
16 by the total flow of illegal goods, illicit drugs,  
17 and smuggled and trafficked persons moved in  
18 either direction across the Northern Border;

19 (3) gaps in law, policy, cooperation between  
20 State, local, and tribal law enforcement, inter-  
21 national agreements, or tribal agreements that  
22 hinder effective and efficient border security,  
23 counter-terrorism, anti-human smuggling and traf-  
24 ficking efforts, and the flow of legitimate trade along  
25 the Northern Border; and

1                             (4) an analysis of whether additional U.S. Cus-  
2                             toms and Border Protection preclearance and pre-in-  
3                             spection operations at ports of entry along the  
4                             Northern Border could help prevent terrorists and  
5                             instruments of terror from entering the United  
6                             States.

7                             (b) ANALYSIS REQUIREMENTS.—For the threat anal-  
8                             ysis required under subsection (a), the Secretary of Home-  
9                             land Security shall consider and examine—

10                             (1) technology needs and challenges;  
11                             (2) personnel needs and challenges;  
12                             (3) the role of State, local, and tribal law en-  
13                             forcement in general border security activities;  
14                             (4) the need for cooperation among Federal,  
15                             State, local, tribal, and Canadian law enforcement  
16                             entities relating to border security; and  
17                             (5) the terrain, population density, and climate  
18                             along the Northern Border.

19                             (c) CLASSIFIED THREAT ANALYSIS.—To the extent  
20                             possible, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall submit  
21                             the threat analysis required under subsection (a) in un-  
22                             classified form. The Secretary may submit a portion of  
23                             the threat analysis in classified form if the Secretary de-  
24                             termines such is appropriate.

25                             (d) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

1                   (1) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMIT-  
2                   TEES.—The term “appropriate congressional com-  
3                   mittees” means—

4                         (A) the Committee on Homeland Security  
5                         and Governmental Affairs of the Senate;  
6                         (B) the Committee on Appropriations of  
7                         the Senate;  
8                         (C) the Committee on Homeland Security  
9                         of the House of Representatives; and  
10                        (D) the Committee on Appropriations of  
11                         the House of Representatives.

12                   (2) NORTHERN BORDER.—The term “Northern  
13                   Border” means the land and maritime borders be-  
14                   tween the United States and Canada.
