1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; TABLE OF CONTENTS.

- 2 (a) SHORT TITLE.—This Act may be cited as the
- 3 "Department of Homeland Security CBRNE Defense Act

7 SEC. 2. CBRNE OFFICE.

8 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Homeland Security Act of 9 2002 is amended by adding at the end the following new 10 title: **"TITLE XXII—CBRNE OFFICE** 11 "Subtitle A—Chemical, Biological, 12 Radiological, Nuclear, and Ex-13 **plosives** Office 14 15 "SEC. 2201. CHEMICAL, BIOLOGICAL, RADIOLOGICAL, NU-16 CLEAR, AND EXPLOSIVES OFFICE. "(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established in the 17 Department a Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, 18 and Explosives Office (referred to in this title as the 19 20 'CBRNE Office'). The CBRNE Office shall be comprised 21 of the Chemical Division, the Biological Division, the Nu-

clear Division, and the Explosives Division. The CBRNE
 Office may include a Health Division.

3 "(b) MISSION OF OFFICE.—The mission of the
4 CBRNE Office is to coordinate, strengthen, and provide
5 chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, and explosives
6 (CBRNE) capabilities in support of homeland security.

7 "(c) ASSISTANT SECRETARY.—The Office shall be 8 headed by an Assistant Secretary for the Chemical, Bio-9 logical, Radiological, Nuclear, and Explosives Office (re-10 ferred to in this title as the 'Assistant Secretary'), who 11 shall be appointed by the President by and with the advice 12 and consent of the Senate.

13 "(d) RESPONSIBILITIES.—The Assistant Secretary14 shall—

15 "(1) develop, coordinate, and maintain overall
16 CBRNE strategy and policy for the Department;

17 "(2) develop, coordinate, and maintain for the18 Department periodic CBRNE risk assessments;

19 "(3) serve as the primary Department rep20 resentative for coordinating CBRNE activities with
21 other Federal departments and agencies;

22 "(4) provide oversight for the Department's23 preparedness for CBRNE threats;

24 "(5) provide support for operations during
25 CBRNE threats or incidents; and

"(6) carry out such other responsibilities as the
 Secretary determines appropriate, consistent with
 this title.

4 "(e) OTHER OFFICERS.—The Director of the Chem5 ical Division, the Director of the Biological Division, the
6 Director of the Nuclear Division, and the Director of the
7 Explosives Division shall report directly to the Assistant
8 Secretary.

9 "SEC. 2202. COMPOSITION OF THE CBRNE OFFICE.

10 "The Secretary shall transfer to the CBRNE Office,11 the functions, personnel, budget authority, and assets of12 the following:

"(1) The Office of Health Affairs as in existence on the day before the date of the enactment of
this title, including the Chief Medical Officer authorized under section 516, and the National Biosurveillance Integration Center authorized under section
316.

"(2) The Domestic Nuclear Detection Office
authorized under title XIX, as in existence on the
date before the date of the enactment of this title
(and redesignated as the Nuclear Division).

23 "(3) CBRNE threat awareness and risk assess24 ment activities of the Science and Technology Direc25 torate.

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"(4) The CBRNE functions of the Office of
 Policy and the Office of Operations Coordination.
 "(5) The Office for Bombing Prevention of the
 National Protection and Programs Directorate, as in
 existence on the day before the date of the enact ment of this title.

7 "SEC. 2203. HIRING AUTHORITY.

8 "In hiring personnel for the CBRNE Office, the Sec-9 retary shall have the hiring and management authorities provided in section 1101 of the Strom Thurmond National 10 11 Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1999 (5 U.S.C. 12 3104 note; Public Law 105–261), except that the term of appointments for employees under subsection (c)(1) of 13 14 such section may not exceed five years before granting any 15 extension under subsection (c)(2) of such section.

16 "SEC. 2204. GRANTS, COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS, AND

17 OTHER TRANSACTIONS AND CONTRACTS.

18 "The Assistant Secretary, in carrying out the respon19 sibilities under this title, may distribute funds through
20 grants, cooperative agreements, and other transactions
21 and contracts.

22 "SEC. 2205. TERRORISM RISK ASSESSMENTS.

23 "(a) TERRORISM RISK ASSESSMENTS.—

24 "(1) IN GENERAL.—The Assistant Secretary25 shall, in coordination with relevant Department com-

ponents and other appropriate Federal departments
 and agencies, develop, coordinate, and update peri odically terrorism risk assessments of chemical, bio logical, radiological, and nuclear threats.

5 "(2) COMPARISON.—The Assistant Secretary 6 shall develop, coordinate, and update periodically an 7 integrated terrorism risk assessment that assesses 8 all of the threats referred to in paragraph (1) and, 9 as appropriate, explosives threats, and compares 10 each such threat against one another according to 11 their relative risk.

"(3) INCLUSION IN ASSESSMENT.—Each terrorism risk assessment under this subsection shall
include a description of the methodology used for
each such assessment.

16 "(4) UPDATES.—Each terrorism risk assess17 ment under this subsection shall be updated not less
18 often than once every two years.

"(5) PROVISION TO CONGRESS.—The Assistant
Secretary shall provide a copy of each risk assessment under this subsection to the Committee on
Homeland Security of the House of Representatives
and the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs of the Senate not later than 30
days after completion of each such assessment.

1 "(b) METHODOLOGY.—In developing the terrorism 2 risk assessments under subsection (a), the Assistant Sec-3 retary, in consultation with appropriate Federal depart-4 ments and agencies, shall— "(1) assess the proposed methodology to be 5 6 used for such assessments; and 7 "(2) consider the evolving threat to the United 8 States as indicated by the intelligence community 9 (as such term is defined in section 3(4) of the Na-10 tional Security Act of 1947 (50 U.S.C. 3003(4))).

"(c) USAGE.—The terrorism risk assessments required under subsection (a) shall be used to inform and
guide allocation of resources for chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear threat activities of the Department.
"(d) INPUT AND SHARING.—The Assistant Secretary
shall, for each terrorism risk assessment under subsection
(a)—

"(1) seek input from national stakeholders and
other Federal, State, local, tribal, and territorial officials involved in efforts to counter chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear threats;

"(2) ensure that written procedures are in place
to guide the development of such assessments, including for input, review, and implementation purposes, among relevant Federal partners;

"(3) share such assessments with Federal,
 State, local, tribal, and territorial officials with appropriate security clearances and a need for the in formation in the classified versions of such assess ments; and

6 "(4) to the maximum extent practicable, make 7 available an unclassified version of such assessments 8 for Federal, State, local, tribal, and territorial offi-9 cials involved in prevention and preparedness for 10 chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear events. 11 "SEC. 2206. CBRNE COMMUNICATIONS AND PUBLIC MES-12 SAGING.

13 "(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary, in coordination 14 with the Assistant Secretary, shall develop an overarching 15 risk communication strategy for terrorist attacks and 16 other high consequence events utilizing chemical, biologi-17 cal, radiological, or nuclear agents or explosives that pose 18 a high risk to homeland security, and shall—

19 "(1) develop threat-specific risk communication
20 plans, in coordination with appropriate Federal de21 partments and agencies;

"(2) develop risk communication messages, including pre-scripted messaging to the extent practicable;

1	"(3) develop clearly defined interagency proc-
2	esses and protocols to assure coordinated risk and
3	incident communications and information sharing
4	during incident response;
5	"(4) engage private and nongovernmental enti-
6	ties in communications planning, as appropriate;
7	"(5) identify ways to educate and engage the
8	public about CBRNE threats and consequences;
9	"(6) develop strategies for communicating using
10	social and new media; and
11	((7) provide guidance on risk and incident com-
12	munications for CBRNE events to State, local, trib-
13	al, and territorial governments, and other stake-
14	holders, as appropriate.
15	"(b) Communication During Response.—The
16	Secretary shall provide appropriate timely, accurate infor-
17	mation to the public, governmental partners, the private
18	sector, and other appropriate stakeholders in the event of
19	a suspected or confirmed terrorist attack or other high
20	consequence event utilizing chemical, biological, radio-
21	logical, or nuclear agents or explosives that pose a high
22	risk to homeland security.
23	"(c) Reports.—

24 "(1) DEVELOPMENT EFFORTS.—Not later than
25 120 days after the date of the enactment of this

1 title, the Secretary shall submit to the Committee on 2 Homeland Security of the House of Representatives 3 and the Committee on Homeland Security and Gov-4 ernmental Affairs of the Senate a report on current 5 and future efforts of the Department to develop the 6 communication strategy required under subsection 7 (a). 8 "(2) FINALIZATION.—Not later than two years 9 after the date the report required under paragraph 10 (1) is submitted, the Secretary shall submit to the 11 Committee on Homeland Security of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Homeland 12 13 Security and Governmental Affairs of the Senate the 14 communication strategy required under subsection 15 (a). 16 "SEC. 2207. CHEMICAL, BIOLOGICAL, RADIOLOGICAL, NU-17 CLEAR, AND EXPLOSIVES INTELLIGENCE AND 18 **INFORMATION SHARING.** 19 "(a) IN GENERAL.—The Under Secretary of Intel-20 ligence and Analysis of the Department shall— 21 "(1) support homeland security-focused intel-22 ligence analysis of terrorist actors, their claims, and

their plans to conduct attacks involving chemical, biological, radiological, or nuclear materials or explosives against the United States;

1	"(2) support homeland security-focused intel-
2	ligence analysis of global infectious diseases, public
3	health, food, agricultural, and veterinary issues;
4	"(3) support homeland security-focused risk
5	analysis and risk assessments of the homeland secu-
6	rity hazards described in paragraphs (1) and (2) by
7	providing relevant quantitative and nonquantitative
8	threat information;
9	"(4) leverage existing and emerging homeland
10	security intelligence capabilities and structures to
11	enhance prevention, protection, response, and recov-
12	ery efforts with respect to a chemical, biological, ra-
13	diological, nuclear, or explosives attack;
14	((5) share appropriate information regarding
15	such threats to appropriate State, local, tribal, and
16	territorial authorities, as well as other national bio-
17	security and biodefense stakeholders; and
18	"(6) perform other responsibilities, as assigned
19	by the Secretary.
20	"(b) COORDINATION.—Where appropriate, the Under
21	Secretary of Intelligence and Analysis shall coordinate
22	with the heads of other relevant Department components,
23	including the Assistant Secretary, members of the intel-
24	ligence community, including the National Counter Pro-
25	liferation Center and the National Counterterrorism Cen-

ter, and other Federal, State, local, tribal, and territorial
 authorities, including officials from high-threat areas, to
 enable such entities to provide recommendations on opti mal information sharing mechanisms, including expedi tious sharing of classified information, and on how such
 entities can provide information to the Department.

7 "(c) REPORT.—

8 "(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than one year 9 after the date of the enactment of this section and 10 annually thereafter for five years, the Secretary shall 11 submit to the Committee on Homeland Security of 12 the House of Representatives and the Committee on 13 Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs of the 14 Senate a report on—

"(A) the intelligence and information shar-15 16 ing activities under subsections (a) and (b) and 17 of all relevant entities within the Department to 18 prevent, protect against, prepare for, respond 19 to, mitigate, and recover from terrorist attacks 20 and other high consequence events utilizing 21 chemical, biological, radiological, or nuclear 22 agents or explosives that pose a high risk to 23 homeland security; and

24 "(B) the Department's activities in accord-25 ance with relevant intelligence strategies.

1	"(2) Assessment of implementation.—
2	Each report required under paragraph (1) shall also
3	include—
4	"(A) a description of methods established
5	to assess progress of the Office of Intelligence
6	and Analysis in implementing this section; and
7	"(B) such assessment of such progress.
8	"(d) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:
9	"(1) INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY.—The term
10	'intelligence community' has the meaning given such
11	term in section 3(4) of the National Security Act of
12	1947 (50 U.S.C. 3003(4)).
13	"(2) NATIONAL BIOSECURITY AND BIODEFENSE
14	STAKEHOLDERS.—The term 'national biosecurity
15	and biodefense stakeholders' means officials from
16	Federal, State, local, tribal, and territorial authori-
17	ties and individuals from the private sector who are
18	involved in efforts to prevent, protect against, pre-
19	pare for, respond to, mitigate, and recover from a
20	biological attack or other phenomena that may have
21	serious health consequences for the United States,
22	including infectious disease outbreaks.".
23	(b) AFTER ACTION AND EFFICIENCIES REVIEW.—
24	Not later than one year after the date of the enactment

25 of this Act, the Secretary of Homeland Security, acting

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through the Assistant Secretary for the Chemical, Biologi-1 2 cal, Radiological, Nuclear, and Explosives Office of the 3 Department of Homeland Security (established pursuant 4 to section 2201 of the Homeland Security Act of 2002, as added by subsection (a) of this section), shall submit 5 to the Committee on Homeland Security of the House of 6 7 Representatives and the Committee on Homeland Security 8 and Governmental Affairs of the Senate a report that— 9 (1) reviews the functions and responsibilities of 10 the Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and 11 Explosives Office of the Department (established pursuant to section 2201 of the Homeland Security 12 13 Act of 2002, as added by subsection (a) of this sec-

Act of 2002, as added by subsection (a) of this section) to identify and eliminate areas of unnecessary
duplication;

16 (2) provides a detailed accounting of the man-17 agement and administrative expenditures and activi-18 ties of the Office, including expenditures related to 19 the establishment of the CBRNE Office, such as ex-20 penditures associated with the utilization of the Sec-21 retary's authority to award retention bonuses pursu-22 ant to Federal law;

(3) identifies any potential cost savings and efficiencies within the CBRNE Office or its divisions;
and

(4) identifies opportunities to enhance the effec tiveness of the management and administration of
 the CBRNE Office to improve operational impact
 and enhance efficiencies.

5 (c) CHEMICAL, BIOLOGICAL, RADIOLOGICAL, NU6 CLEAR AND EXPLOSIVES RESEARCH AND DEVELOP7 MENT.—

8 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Homeland 9 Security shall assess the organizational structure of 10 the management and execution of the Department of 11 Homeland Security's chemical, biological, radio-12 logical, nuclear, and explosives research and develop-13 ment activities, and shall develop and submit to the 14 Committee on Homeland Security and the Com-15 mittee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Homeland Security and 16 17 Governmental Affairs and the Committee on Appro-18 priations of the Senate at the time the President 19 submits the budget under section 1105 of title 31, 20 United States Code, for the fiscal year that follows 21 the issuance of the Comptroller General review re-22 quired pursuant to subsection (d) a proposed organi-23 zational structure for the management and execution 24 of such chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, 25 and explosives research and development activities.

1	(2) Organizational Justification.—The
2	Secretary of Homeland Security shall include in the
3	assessment required under paragraph (1) a thorough
4	justification and rationalization for the proposed or-
5	ganizational structure for management and execu-
6	tion of chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, and
7	explosives research and development activities, in-
8	cluding the following:
9	(A) A discussion of the methodology for
10	determining such proposed organizational struc-
11	ture.
12	(B) A comprehensive inventory of chem-
13	ical, biological, radiological, nuclear, and explo-
14	sives research and development activities of the
15	Department of Homeland Security and where
16	each such activity will be located within or out-
17	side such proposed organizational structure.
18	(C) Information relating to how such pro-
19	posed organizational structure will facilitate and
20	promote coordination and requirements genera-
21	tion with customers.
22	(D) Information relating to how such pro-
23	posed organizational structure will support the
24	development of chemical, biological, radiological,

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1	nuclear, and explosives research and develop-
2	ment priorities across the Department.
3	(E) If the chemical, biological, radiological,
4	nuclear, and explosives research and develop-
5	ment activities of the Department are not co-lo-
6	cated in such proposed organizational structure,
7	a justification for such separation.
8	(F) The strategy for coordination between
9	the Under Secretary for Science and Tech-
10	nology and the Assistant Secretary for the
11	Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and
12	Explosives Office on chemical, biological, radio-
13	logical, nuclear, and explosives research and de-
14	velopment activities.
15	(G) Recommendations for necessary statu-
16	tory changes.
17	(3) LIMITATION ON ACTION.—The Secretary of

Homeland Security may not take any action to reor-ganize the structure referred to in paragraph (1) un-less the Secretary receives prior authorization from the Committee on Homeland Security of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs of the Senate permitting any such action.

(d) GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTABILITY OFFICE REVIEW
 OF CHEMICAL, BIOLOGICAL, RADIOLOGICAL, NUCLEAR,
 AND EXPLOSIVES RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT ACTIVI TIES.—

5 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Comptroller General of
6 the United States shall conduct a review of the orga7 nizational structure of the Department of Homeland
8 Security's management and execution of chemical,
9 biological, radiological, nuclear, and explosives re10 search and development activities.

11 (2) SCOPE.—The review required under para-12 graph (1) shall include the following:

(A) An assessment of the organizational
structure for the management and execution of
chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, and
explosives research and development activities
of the Department of Homeland Security, including identification of any overlap or duplication of effort.

20 (B) Recommendations to streamline and
21 improve the organizational structure of the De22 partment's management and execution of chem23 ical, biological, radiological, nuclear, and explo24 sives research and development activities.

1 (3) REPORT.—Not later than two years after 2 the date of the enactment of this Act, the Comp-3 troller General shall submit to the Committee on 4 Homeland Security of the House of Representatives 5 and the Committee on Homeland Security and Gov-6 ernmental Affairs of the Senate a report on the re-7 view required under this subsection.

8 (e) DISSEMINATION OF INFORMATION ANALYZED BY 9 THE DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY TO STATE, LOCAL, TRIBAL, AND PRIVATE ENTITIES WITH RESPON-10 11 SIBILITIES RELATING TO HOMELAND SECURITY.-Para-12 graph (8) of section 201(d) of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 121(d)) is amended by striking "and 13 to agencies of State" and all that follows through the pe-14 15 riod at the end and inserting "to State, local, tribal, territorial, and appropriate private entities with such respon-16 17 sibilities, and, as appropriate, to the public, in order to 18 assist in preventing, protecting against, preparing for, re-19 sponding to, mitigating, and recovering from terrorist attacks against the United States.". 20

21 (f) TECHNICAL AND CONFORMING AMENDMENTS.—
22 The Homeland Security Act of 2002 is amended—

(1) in paragraph (2) of section 103(a) (6
U.S.C. 113(a)), by striking "Assistant Secretary for
Health Affairs, the Assistant Secretary for Legisla-

16	SEC. 3. CHEMICAL DIVISION.
17	(a) IN GENERAL.—Title XXII of the Homeland Se-
18	curity Act of 2002, as added by section 2 of this Act, is
19	amended by adding at the end the following new subtitle:
20	"Subtitle B—Chemical Division
21	"SEC. 2211. CHEMICAL DIVISION.
22	"(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established in the
23	CBRNE Office a Chemical Division, headed by a Director
24	of the Chemical Division (in this subtitle referred to as
25	the 'Director').

1 "(b) MISSION AND RESPONSIBILITIES.—The Direc-2 tor shall be responsible for coordinating departmental 3 strategy and policy relating to terrorist attacks and other 4 high-consequence events utilizing chemical agents that 5 pose a high risk to homeland security, including the fol-6 lowing:

7 "(1) Developing and maintaining the Depart8 ment's strategy against chemical threats.

9 "(2) Serving as the Department representative
10 for chemical threats and related activities with other
11 Federal departments and agencies.

12 "(3) Providing oversight of the Department's
13 preparedness, including operational requirements,
14 for chemical threats.

15 "(4) Enhancing the capabilities of Federal,
16 State, local, tribal, and territorial governments, and
17 private entities as appropriate, against chemical
18 threats.

"(5) Evaluating and providing guidance to Federal, State, local, tribal, and territorial governments,
and private entities as appropriate, on detection and
communication technology that could be effective in
terrorist attacks and other high-consequence events
utilizing chemical agents.

1 "(6) Supporting and enhancing the effective 2 sharing and use of appropriate information gen-3 erated by the intelligence community (as such term 4 is defined in section 3(4) of the National Security 5 Act of 1947 (50 U.S.C. 3003(4)), law enforcement 6 agencies, other Federal, State, local tribal, and territorial governments, and foreign governments, on 7 8 chemical threats.

9 "SEC. 2212. DEMONSTRATION PROJECTS.

10 "(a) IN GENERAL.—The Director may, subject to the 11 availability of appropriations for such purpose, partner 12 with high-risk urban areas or facilities to conduct demonstration projects to enhance, through Federal, State, 13 local, tribal, and territorial governments, and private enti-14 15 ties, capabilities of the United States to counter terrorist attacks and other high-consequence events utilizing chem-16 17 ical agents that pose a high risk to homeland security.

18 "(b) GOALS.—The Director may provide guidance 19 and evaluations for all situations and venues at risk of 20 terrorist attacks and other high-consequence events uti-21 lizing chemical agents, such as at ports, areas of mass 22 gathering, and transit facilities, and may—

23 "(1) ensure all high-risk situations and venues24 are studied; and

"(2) ensure key findings and best practices are
 made available to State, local, tribal, and territorial
 governments and the private sector.

4 "(c) CONGRESSIONAL NOTIFICATION.—The Director
5 shall notify the Committee on Homeland Security of the
6 House of Representatives and the Committee on Home7 land Security and Governmental Affairs of the Senate not
8 later than 30 days before initiating a new demonstration
9 project.".

10 (b) REPORT.—Not later than one year after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Comptroller General of 11 12 the United States shall submit to the Committee on 13 Homeland Security of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental 14 Affairs of the Senate an assessment of the Department 15 of Homeland Security's programs and activities related to 16 terrorist attacks and other high-consequence events uti-17 18 lizing chemical agents that pose a high risk to homeland 19 security.

 is defined in section 3(4) of the National Security
 Act of 1947 (50 U.S.C. 3003(4))), law enforcement
 agencies, other Federal, State, local, tribal, and ter ritorial governments, and foreign governments, on
 biological threats.

7 "(6) Achieving a biological detection program.

8 "(7) Maintaining the National Biosurveillance
9 Integration Center, authorized under section 316.".

10 SEC. 5. NUCLEAR DIVISION.

private entities as appropriate, to counter terrorist
 attacks and other high-consequence events utilizing
 explosives.

4 "(5) Evaluating and providing guidance to Fed5 eral, State, local, tribal, and territorial governments
6 and appropriate private entities on detection and
7 communication technology that could be effective
8 during terrorist attacks or other high-consequence
9 events utilizing explosives.

10 "(6) Supporting and enhancing the effective 11 sharing and use of appropriate information gen-12 erated by the intelligence community (as such term 13 is defined in section 3(4) of the National Security 14 Act of 1947 (50 U.S.C. 3003(4))), law enforcement 15 agencies, other Federal, State, local, tribal, and ter-16 ritorial government agencies, and foreign govern-17 ments, on explosives threats.".

18 SEC. 7. SAVINGS PROVISIONS.

Nothing in this Act shall change the authority of the
Administrator of the Federal Emergency Management
Agency to lead the emergency management system of the
United States. Nothing in this Act shall alter the responsibility of the Chief Medical Officer of the Department of
Homeland Security to serve as the principal advisor to the
Secretary of Homeland Security and the Administrator of
