- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Placing Restrictions
- 5 on Teargas Exports and Crowd Control Technology to
- 6 Hong Kong Act" or the "PROTECT Hong Kong Act".

1 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

2	Congress finds the following:
3	(1) The United Nations High Commissioner for
4	Human Rights, along with human rights organiza-
5	tions, has called for an investigation of the use of
6	crowd control tactics used in Hong Kong which fall
7	short of international standards, including the
8	United Nations Code of Conduct for Law Enforce-
9	ment Officials and the Basic Principles on the Use
10	of Force and Firearms for Law Enforcement Offi-
11	cials.
12	(2) United States companies have reportedly
13	provided the Hong Kong Police Force with muni-
14	tions and non-lethal crowd control equipment that
15	were reportedly used by the police.
16	(3) Hong Kong citizens and the international
17	community have called for changes to the Hong
18	Kong Police's crowd control tactics and these re-
19	quests have gone unheeded by the Hong Kong Spe-
20	cial Administrative Region Government.
21	SEC. 3. STATEMENT OF POLICY.
22	It is the policy of the United States—
23	(1) to restrict the export of security assistance
24	and crime control and detection instruments and
25	equipment to any government that engages in a con-
26	sistent pattern of gross violations of internationally

1	recognized human rights, consistent with the re-
2	quirements of section 502B(a) of the Foreign Assist-
