 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Trans-Sahara Counter-
- 5 terrorism Partnership Program Act of 2021".

1 SEC. 2. SENSE OF CONGRESS.

2 It is the sense of Congress that—

3 (1) terrorist and violent extremist organiza4 tions, such as Al Qaeda in the Islamic Maghreb,
5 Boko Haram, the Islamic State of West Africa, and
6 other affiliated groups, have killed tens of thousands
7 of innocent civilians, displaced populations, desta8 bilized local and national governments, and caused
9 mass human suffering in the affected communities;

10 (2) poor governance, political and economic
11 marginalization, and lack of accountability for
12 human rights abuses by security forces are drivers
13 of extremism;

(3) it is in the national security interest of the
United States to combat the spread of terrorism and
violent extremism and build the capacity of partner
countries to combat these threats in Africa;

(4) terrorist and violent extremist organizations
exploit vulnerable and marginalized communities
suffering from poverty, lack of economic opportunity
(particularly among youth populations), corruption,
and weak governance; and

(5) a comprehensive, coordinated interagency
approach is needed to develop an effective strategy
to address the security challenges in the SahelMaghreb, appropriately allocate resources, de-con-

flict programs, and maximize the effectiveness of
 United States defense, diplomatic, and development
 capabilities.

4 SEC. 3. STATEMENT OF POLICY.

5 It is the policy of the United States to assist coun-6 tries in North and West Africa, and other allies and part-7 ners active in those regions, in combating terrorism and 8 violent extremism through a coordinated interagency ap-9 proach with a consistent strategy that appropriately bal-10 ances security activities with diplomatic and development 11 efforts to address the political, socioeconomic, governance, 12 and development challenges in North and West Africa that contribute to terrorism and violent extremism. 13

14SEC. 4. TRANS-SAHARA COUNTERTERRORISM PARTNER-15SHIP PROGRAM.

16 (a) TRANS-SAHARA COUNTERTERRORISM PARTNER-17 SHIP PROGRAM.—

18 (1) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary of State, 19 in consultation with the Secretary of Defense and 20 the Administrator of the United States Agency for 21 International Development, shall establish a partner-22 ship program, to be known as the "Trans-Sahara 23 Counterterrorism Partnership (TSCTP) Program" 24 to coordinate all programs, projects, and activities of 25 the United States Government in countries in North

and West Africa that are conducted for any of the
 following purposes:

(A) To improve governance and the capacities of countries in North and West Africa to
deliver basic services, particularly with at-risk
communities, as a means of countering terrorism and violent extremism by enhancing
state legitimacy and authority and countering
corruption.

10 (B) To address the factors that make peo11 ple and communities vulnerable to recruitment
12 by terrorist and violent extremist organizations,
13 including economic vulnerability and mistrust of
14 government and government security forces,
15 through activities such as—

16 (i) supporting strategies that increase17 youth employment opportunities;

18 (ii) promoting girls' education and19 women's political participation;

20 (iii) strengthening local governance21 and civil society capacity;

22 (iv) improving government trans-23 parency and accountability;

24 (v) fighting corruption;

1	(vi) improving access to economic op-
2	portunities; and
3	(vii) other development activities nec-
4	essary to support community resilience.
5	(C) To strengthen the rule of law in such
6	countries, including by enhancing the capability
7	of the judicial institutions to independently,
8	transparently, and credibly deter, investigate,
9	and prosecute acts of terrorism and violent ex-
10	tremism.
11	(D) To improve the ability of military and
12	law enforcement entities in partner countries to
13	detect, disrupt, respond to, and prosecute vio-
14	lent extremist and terrorist activity while re-
15	specting human rights, and to cooperate with
16	the United States and other partner countries
17	on counterterrorism and counter-extremism ef-
18	forts.
19	(E) To enhance the border security capac-
20	ity of partner countries, including the ability to
21	monitor, detain, and interdict terrorists.
22	(F) To identify, monitor, disrupt, and
23	counter the human capital and financing pipe-
24	lines of terrorism.

1	(G) To support the free expression and op-
2	erations of independent, local-language media,
3	particularly in rural areas, while countering the
4	media operations and recruitment propaganda
5	of terrorist and violent extremist organizations.
6	(2) Assistance framework.—Activities car-
7	ried out under the TSCTP Program shall—
8	(A) be carried out in countries where the
9	Secretary of State, in consultation with the Sec-
10	retary of Defense and the Administrator of the
11	United States Agency for International Devel-
12	opment, determines that there is an adequate
13	level of partner country commitment, and has
14	considered partner country needs, absorptive
15	capacity, sustainment capacity, and efforts of
16	other donors in the sector;
17	(B) have clearly defined outcomes;
18	(C) be closely coordinated among United
19	States diplomatic and development missions,
20	United States Africa Command, and relevant
21	participating departments and agencies;
22	(D) have specific plans with robust indica-
23	tors to regularly monitor and evaluate outcomes
24	and impact;

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1	(E) complement and enhance efforts to
2	promote democratic governance, the rule of law,
3	human rights, and economic growth;
4	(F) in the case of train and equip pro-
5	grams, complement longer-term security sector
6	institution-building; and
7	(G) have mechanisms in place to track re-
8	sources and routinely monitor and evaluate the
9	efficacy of relevant programs.
10	(3) Consultation.—In coordinating activities
11	through the TSCTP Program, the Secretary of
12	State shall also establish a coordination mechanism
13	that ensures periodic consultation with, as appro-
14	priate, the Director of National Intelligence, the Sec-
15	retary of the Treasury, the Attorney General, the
16	Chief Executive Officer of the United States Agency
17	for Global Media (formerly known as the Broad-
18	casting Board of Governors), and the heads of other
19	relevant Federal departments and agencies, as deter-
20	mined by the President.
21	(4) Congressional notification.—Not later
22	than 15 days before obligating amounts for an activ-
23	ity of the TSCTP Program pursuant to paragraph
24	(1), the Secretary of State shall submit a notifica-
25	tion to the appropriate congressional committees, in

1	accordance with the requirements of section 634A of
2	the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C.
3	2394–1), that includes the following:
4	(A) The foreign country and entity, as ap-
5	plicable, whose capabilities are to be enhanced
6	in accordance with the purposes specified in
7	paragraph (1).
8	(B) The amount, type, and purpose of sup-
9	port to be provided.
10	(C) An assessment of the capacity of the
11	foreign country to effectively implement, benefit
12	from, or utilize the assistance to be provided for
13	the intended purpose.
14	(D) The anticipated implementation
15	timeline for the activity.
16	(E) As applicable, a description of the
17	plans to sustain any military or security equip-
18	ment provided beyond the completion date of
19	such activity, and the estimated cost and source
20	of funds to support such sustainment.
21	(b) INTERNATIONAL COORDINATION.—Efforts car-
22	ried out under this section shall take into account partner
23	country counterterrorism, counter-extremism, and devel-
24	opment strategies and, to the extent practicable, shall be
25	aligned with such strategies. Such efforts shall be coordi-

nated with counterterrorism and counter-extremism activi ties and programs in the areas of defense, diplomacy, and
 development carried out by other like-minded donors and
 international organizations in the relevant country.

5 (c) STRATEGIES.—Not later than 270 days after the 6 date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State, 7 in consultation with the Secretary of Defense and the Ad-8 ministrator of the United States Agency for International 9 Development and other relevant Federal Government 10 agencies, shall submit to the appropriate congressional 11 committees the following strategies:

12 (1) A COMPREHENSIVE FIVE-YEAR STRATEGY 13 FOR THE SAHEL-MAGHREB.—A comprehensive five-14 year strategy for the Sahel-Maghreb, including de-15 tails related to whole-of-government efforts in the 16 areas of defense, diplomacy, and development to ad-17 vance the national security, economic, and humani-18 tarian interests of the United States, including—

19(A) efforts to ensure coordination with20multilateral and bilateral partners, such as the21Joint Force of the Group of Five of the Sahel,22and with other relevant assistance frameworks;

(B) a public diplomacy strategy and actions to ensure that populations in the SahelMaghreb are aware of the development activi-

1	ties of the United States Government, especially
2	in countries with a significant Department of
3	Defense presence or engagement through train
4	and equip programs;
5	(C) activities aimed at supporting demo-
6	cratic institutions and countering violent extre-
7	mism with measurable goals and transparent
8	benchmarks;
9	(D) plans to help each partner country ad-
10	dress humanitarian and development needs and
11	to help prevent, respond to, and mitigate inter-
12	communal violence;
13	(E) a comprehensive plan to support secu-
14	rity sector reform in each partner country that
15	includes a detailed section on programs and ac-
16	tivities being undertaken by relevant stake-
17	holders and other international actors operating
18	in the sector and that incorporates as appro-
19	priate any lessons learned from previous initia-
20	tives to improve security sector governance; and
21	(F) a specific strategy for Mali that in-
22	cludes plans for sustained, high-level diplomatic
23	engagement with stakeholders, including coun-
24	tries in Europe and the Middle East with inter-
25	ests in the Sahel-Maghreb, regional govern-

ments, relevant multilateral organizations, sig natory groups of the 2015 Agreement for Peace
 and Reconciliation in Mali, and civil society ac tors.

5 (2) A COMPREHENSIVE FIVE-YEAR STRATEGY
6 FOR TSCTP PROGRAM COUNTERTERRORISM EF7 FORTS.—A comprehensive five-year strategy for the
8 TSCTP Program that includes—

9 (A) a clear statement of the objectives of 10 United States counterterrorism efforts in North 11 and West Africa with respect to the use of all forms of United States assistance to combat 12 terrorism and counter violent extremism, in-13 14 cluding efforts to build military and civilian law 15 enforcement capacity, strengthen the rule of 16 law, promote responsive and accountable gov-17 ernance, and address the root causes of ter-18 rorism and violent extremism;

(B) a plan for coordinating programs
through the TSCTP Program pursuant to subsection (a)(1), including an identification of
which agency or bureau of the Department of
State, as applicable, will be responsible for leading, coordinating, and conducting monitoring
and evaluation for each such program, and the

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process for enabling the leading agency or bureau to establish standards, compel partners to adhere to those standards, and report results;

4 (C) a plan to monitor, evaluate, and share
5 data and learning about the TSCTP Program
6 that includes quantifiable baselines, targets,
7 and results in accordance with monitoring and
8 evaluation provisions of sections 3 and 4 of the
9 Foreign Aid Transparency and Accountability
10 Act of 2016 (Public Law 114–191); and

(D) a plan for ensuring coordination and
compliance with related requirements in United
States law, including the Global Fragility Act of
2019 (title V of division J of the Further Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2020 (Public Law
116–94)).

17 (3) CONSULTATION.—Not later than 90 days
18 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the De19 partment of State shall consult with appropriate
20 congressional committees on progress made towards
21 developing the strategies required in paragraphs (1)
22 and (2).

23 (d) SUPPORTING MATERIAL IN ANNUAL BUDGET
24 REQUEST.—The Secretary of State shall include in the
25 budget materials submitted to Congress in support of the

President's annual budget request (submitted to Congress 1 pursuant to section 1105 of title 31, United States Code) 2 3 for each fiscal year beginning after the date of the enact-4 ment of this Act, and annually thereafter for five years, 5 a description of the requirements, activities, and planned 6 allocation of amounts requested by the TSCTP Program. This requirement does not apply to activities of the De-7 8 partment of Defense conducted pursuant to authorities 9 under title 10, United States Code.

10 (e) MONITORING AND EVALUATION OF PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES.—Not later than one year after the date 11 12 of the enactment of this Act, and annually thereafter for 13 five years, the Secretary of State, in consultation with the Secretary of Defense and the Administrator of the United 14 15 States Agency for International Development, shall submit to the appropriate congressional committees a report that 16 describes-17

(1) the progress made in meeting the objectives
of the strategies required under paragraphs (1) and
(2) of subsection (c), including any lessons learned
in carrying out TSCTP Program activities and any
recommendations for improving such programs and
activities;

(2) the efforts taken to coordinate, de-conflict,
 and streamline TSCTP Program activities to maxi mize resource effectiveness;
 (3) the extent to which each partner country

(5) the extent to when each partner country
has demonstrated the ability to absorb the equipment or training provided in the previous year under
the TSCTP Program, and where applicable, the ability to maintain and appropriately utilize such equipment;

(4) the extent to which each partner country is
investing its own resources to advance the goals described in subsection (a)(1) or is demonstrating a
commitment and willingness to cooperate with the
United States to advance such goals;

(5) the actions taken by the government of each
partner country receiving assistance under the
TSCTP Program to combat corruption, improve
transparency and accountability, and promote other
forms of democratic governance;

(6) the assistance provided in each of the three
preceding fiscal years under this program, broken
down by partner country, to include the type, statutory authorization, and purpose of all United States
security assistance provided to the country pursuant
to authorities under title 10, United States Code,

the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2151
 et seq.), or any other "train and equip" authorities
 of the Department of Defense; and

4 (7) any changes or updates to the Comprehen5 sive Five-Year Strategy for the TSCTP Program re6 quired under paragraph (2) of subsection (c) neces7 sitated by the findings in this annual report.

8 (f) REPORTING REQUIREMENT RELATED TO AUDIT 9 OF BUREAU OF AFRICAN AFFAIRS MONITORING AND CO-10 ORDINATION OF THETRANS-SAHARA COUNTERTER-RORISM PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM.—Not later than 90 11 12 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, and every 13 120 days thereafter until all 13 recommendations in the September 2020 Department of State Office of Inspector 14 15 General audit entitled "Audit of the Department of State Bureau of African Affairs Monitoring and Coordination 16 of the Trans-Sahara Counterterrorism Partnership Pro-17 gram" (AUD-MERO-20-42) are closed or until the date 18 that is three years after the date of the enactment of this 19 Act, whichever is earlier, the Secretary of State shall sub-20 21 mit to the appropriate congressional committees a report 22 that identifies—

23 (1) which of the 13 recommendations in AUD24 MERO-20-42 have not been closed;

(2) a description of progress made since the
 last report toward closing each recommendation
 identified under paragraph (1);

4 (3) additional resources needed, including as5 sessment of staffing capacity, if any, to complete ac6 tion required to close each recommendation identi7 fied under paragraph (1); and

8 (4) the anticipated timeline for completion of 9 action required to close each recommendation identi-10 fied under paragraph (1), including application of all 11 recommendations into all existing security assistance 12 programs managed by the Department of State 13 under the TSCTP Program.

14 (g) PROGRAM ADMINISTRATION.—Not later than 120 15 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State shall report to Congress plans for con-16 17 ducting a written review of a representative sample of each 18 of the security assistance programs administered by the 19 Bureau of African Affairs to identify potential waste, 20 fraud, abuse, inefficiencies, or deficiencies. The review 21 shall include an analysis of staff capacity, including 22 human resource needs, available resources, procedural 23 guidance, and monitoring and evaluation processes to en-24 sure the Bureau of African Affairs is managing programs efficiently and effectively. 25

1 (h) FORM.—The strategies required under para-2 graphs (1) and (2) of subsection (c) and the reports re-3 quired under subsections (e), (f), and (g) shall be sub-4 mitted in unclassified form but may include a classified 5 annex.

6 (i) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEES DE7 FINED.—In this section, the term "appropriate congres8 sional committees" means—

9 (1) the Committee on Foreign Relations, the
10 Committee on Armed Services, the Committee on
11 Appropriations, and the Select Committee on Intel12 ligence of the Senate; and

(2) the Committee on Foreign Affairs, the
Committee on Armed Services, the Committee on
Appropriations, and the Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence of the House of Representatives.
