A BILL

Making further continuing appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Further Extending
5 Government Funding Act”.

1 **SEC. 3. REFERENCES.**

2 Except as expressly provided otherwise, any reference
3 to “this Act” contained in any division of this Act shall
4 be treated as referring only to the provisions of that divi-
5 sion.

6 **DIVISION A—FURTHER CONTINUING**
7 **APPROPRIATIONS ACT, 2022**

8 SEC. 101. The Continuing Appropriations Act, 2022
9 (division A of Public Law 117–43) is amended—

10 (1) by striking the date specified in section
11 106(3) and inserting “February 18, 2022”;

12 (2) in section 118, by striking “first quarter”
13 and inserting “first and second quarters”;

14 (3) in section 137, by striking “\$22,080,000”
15 and inserting “\$44,838,000” and by striking
16 “\$2,261,000” and inserting “\$4,547,000”; and

17 (4) by adding after section 157 the following
18 new sections:

19 “SEC. 158. Section 9(i)(2) of the Food and Nutrition
20 Act of 2008 (7 U.S.C. 2018(i)(2)) shall be applied by sub-

1 stituting the date specified in section 106(3) of this Act
2 for ‘December 31, 2021’.

3 “SEC. 159. Section 533 of title V of division B of
4 Public Law 116–260 is repealed.

5 “SEC. 160. (a) Notwithstanding section 101, section
6 748 of title VII of division E of Public Law 116–260 shall
7 be applied during the period covered by this Act by—

8 “(1) substituting ‘2023’ for ‘2022’;

9 “(2) substituting ‘2022’ for ‘2021’ each place it
10 appears;

11 “(3) substituting ‘2021’ for ‘2020’ each place it
12 appears; and

13 “(4) substituting ‘section 748 of division E of
14 Public Law 116–260, as in effect on September 30,
15 2021’ for ‘section 749 of division C of Public Law
16 116–93’ each place it appears.

17 “(b) Subsection (a) shall not take effect until the first
18 day of the first applicable pay period beginning on or after
19 January 1, 2022.

20 “SEC. 161. Section 302 of the Universal Service
21 Antideficiency Temporary Suspension Act shall be applied
22 by substituting the date specified in section 106(3) of this
23 Act for ‘December 31, 2021’ each place it appears.

24 “SEC. 162. In addition to amounts otherwise pro-
25 vided by this Act, there is appropriated \$1,600,000,000,

1 for an additional amount for fiscal year 2022, to remain
2 available until September 30, 2024, for the account speci-
3 fied and for the activities specified, in section 141 of this
4 Act.

5 “SEC. 163. During the period covered by this Act,
6 section 506(a)(1) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961
7 (22 U.S.C. 2318) shall be applied by substituting
8 ‘\$200,000,000’ for ‘\$100,000,000’.”.

9 This division may be cited as the “Further Con-
10 tinuing Appropriations Act, 2022”.

11 **DIVISION B—ADDITIONAL AFGHANISTAN**
12 **SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS**
13 **ACT, 2022**

14 The following sums are appropriated, out of any
15 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
16 fiscal year ending September 30, 2022, and for other pur-
17 poses, namely:

18 TITLE I

19 DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE

20 MILITARY PERSONNEL

21 MILITARY PERSONNEL, ARMY

22 For an additional amount for “Military Personnel,
23 Army”, \$128,000,000, to remain available until Sep-
24 tember 30, 2022, for support of Operation Allies Welcome
25 by the Department of Defense.

1 MILITARY PERSONNEL, NAVY

2 For an additional amount for “Military Personnel,
3 Navy”, \$7,000,000, to remain available until September
4 30, 2022, for support of Operation Allies Welcome by the
5 Department of Defense.

6 MILITARY PERSONNEL, MARINE CORPS

7 For an additional amount for “Military Personnel,
8 Marine Corps”, \$32,000,000, to remain available until
9 September 30, 2022, for support of Operation Allies Wel-
10 come by the Department of Defense.

11 MILITARY PERSONNEL, AIR FORCE

12 For an additional amount for “Military Personnel,
13 Air Force”, \$145,000,000, to remain available until Sep-
14 tember 30, 2022, for support of Operation Allies Welcome
15 by the Department of Defense.

16 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

17 OVERSEAS HUMANITARIAN, DISASTER, AND CIVIC AID

18 For an additional amount for “Overseas Human-
19 tarian, Disaster, and Civic Aid”, \$4,000,000,000, to re-
20 main available until September 30, 2023, for support of
21 Operation Allies Welcome by the Department of Defense.

22 GENERAL PROVISIONS—THIS TITLE

23 SEC. 1101. Not later than 30 days after the date of
24 enactment of this Act, and every 30 days thereafter
25 through fiscal year 2022, the Secretary of Defense shall

1 provide a written report to the congressional defense com-
2 mittees describing the execution of funds provided in this
3 title, including the amounts obligated and expended, in
4 total and since the previous report; the nature of the costs
5 incurred or services provided by such funds; and any reim-
6 bursements or funds transferred by another Federal agen-
7 cy to the Department of Defense which relates to the pur-
8 pose of the funds provided by this title.

9 SEC. 1102. Notwithstanding any other provision of
10 law, funds provided by this title shall only be for the pur-
11 poses specified, and shall not be subject to any transfer
12 authority provided by law.

19 OPERATIONS AND SUPPORT

20 For an additional amount for “Operations and Sup-
21 port”, \$147,456,000, to remain available until September
22 30, 2022, for necessary expenses in support of Operation
23 Allies Welcome, including the provision of staffing and
24 support services for Safe Havens: *Provided*, That amounts
25 provided under this heading in this Act may be transferred

1 by the Secretary of Homeland Security to other appropria-
2 tions in the Department of Homeland Security only for
3 necessary expenses of Operation Allies Welcome and not
4 for any other purpose: *Provided further*, That amounts
5 made available under this heading in this Act shall be
6 available in addition to any other appropriations available
7 for the same purpose, including appropriations available
8 pursuant to the authority of section 506(a)(2) of the For-
9 eign Assistance Act of 1961: *Provided further*, That, be-
10 ginning not later than January 31, 2022, the Office of
11 the Secretary shall report monthly to the Committees on
12 Appropriations of the Senate and the House of Represent-
13 atives on the use of transfer authority provided under this
14 heading in this Act.

CDC-WIDE ACTIVITIES AND PROGRAM SUPPORT

For an additional amount for “CDC-Wide Activities
21 and Program Support”, \$8,000,000, to remain available
22 until September 30, 2022, for support of Operation Allies
23 Welcome for medical support, screening, and other related
24 public health activities related to Afghan arrivals and refu-
25 gees.

1 ADMINISTRATION FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES
2 REFUGEE AND ENTRANT ASSISTANCE

3 For an additional amount for “Refugee and Entrant
4 Assistance”, \$1,263,728,000, to remain available until
5 September 30, 2023, for support of Operation Allies Wel-
6 come for carrying out refugee and entrant assistance ac-
7 tivities in support of citizens or nationals of Afghanistan
8 paroled into the United States under section 212(d)(5) of
9 the Immigration and Nationality Act and citizens or na-
10 tionals of Afghanistan for whom such refugee and entrant
11 assistance activities are authorized: *Provided, That*
12 amounts made available under this heading in this Act
13 may be used for grants or contracts with qualified non-
14 profit organizations to provide culturally and linguistically
15 appropriate services, including wrap-around services dur-
16 ing temporary housing and after resettlement, housing as-
17 sistance, medical assistance, legal assistance, education
18 services, and case management assistance: *Provided fur-*
19 *ther,* That the Director of the Office of Refugee Resettle-
20 ment, in carrying out section 412(c)(1)(A) of the Immi-
21 gration and Nationality Act with amounts made available
22 under this heading in this Act, may allocate such amounts
23 among the States in a manner that accounts for the most
24 current data available.

3 ADMINISTRATION OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS
4 DIPLOMATIC PROGRAMS

5 For an additional amount for “Diplomatic Pro-
6 grams”, \$44,300,000, to remain available until expended,
7 for support for Operation Allies Welcome and related ef-
8 forts by the Department of State, including additional re-
9 locations of individuals at risk as a result of the situation
10 in Afghanistan and related expenses, and to reimburse the
11 account under this heading in prior Acts making appro-
12 priations for the Department of State, foreign operations,
13 and related programs for obligations previously incurred.

14 EMERGENCIES IN THE DIPLOMATIC AND CONSULAR
15 SERVICE

16 For an additional amount for “Emergencies in the
17 Diplomatic and Consular Service”, \$36,000,000, to re-
18 main available until expended, for support for Operation
19 Allies Welcome and related efforts by the Department of
20 State, including additional relocations of individuals at
21 risk as a result of the situation in Afghanistan and related
22 expenses, and to reimburse the account under this heading
23 in prior Acts making appropriations for the Department
24 of State, foreign operations, and related programs for obli-
25 gations previously incurred.

1 BILATERAL ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE

2 DEPARTMENT OF STATE

3 UNITED STATES EMERGENCY REFUGEE AND MIGRATION

4 ASSISTANCE FUND

5 For an additional amount for “United States Emer-
6 gency Refugee and Migration Assistance Fund”,
7 \$1,200,000,000, to remain available until expended, not-
8 withstanding section 2(e)(2) of the Migration and Refugee
9 Assistance Act of 1962 (22 U.S.C. 2601(e)(2)), for sup-
10 port for Operation Allies Welcome and related efforts by
11 the Department of State, including additional relocations
12 of individuals at risk as a result of the situation in Af-
13 ghanistan and related expenses.

14 GENERAL PROVISION—THIS TITLE

15 SEC. 1401. The Secretary of State shall include in
16 the reports required by section 2402 of title IV of the Af-
17 ghanistan Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2022 (divi-
18 sion C of Public Law 117–43) the proposed uses of funds
19 appropriated under this title.

20 TITLE V

21 GENERAL PROVISIONS—THIS ACT

22 SEC. 1501. Each amount appropriated or made avail-
23 able by this Act is in addition to amounts otherwise appro-
24 priated for the fiscal year involved.

1 SEC. 1502. No part of any appropriation contained
2 in this Act shall remain available for obligation beyond
3 the current fiscal year unless expressly so provided herein.

4 SEC. 1503. Unless otherwise provided for by this Act,
5 the additional amounts appropriated by this Act to appro-
6 priations accounts shall be available under the authorities
7 and conditions applicable to such appropriations accounts
8 for fiscal year 2022.

9 SEC. 1504. Each amount provided by this division is
10 designated by the Congress as being for an emergency re-
11 quirement pursuant to section 4001(a)(1) and section
12 4001(b) of S. Con. Res. 14 (117th Congress), the concur-
13 rent resolution on the budget for fiscal year 2022.

14 SEC. 1505. Not later than January 15, 2022, the Di-
15 rector of the Office of Management and Budget shall pro-
16 vide to the Committees on Appropriations of the House
17 of Representatives and the Senate a written report on Op-
18 eration Allies Welcome: *Provided*, That such report shall
19 describe the strategy and transition plan leading to the
20 conclusion of Operation Allies Welcome; a plan, including
21 timeline, for relocating all Afghans currently residing at
22 Department of Defense facilities to longer-term housing;
23 the activities and responsibilities assigned to each Federal
24 agency involved in such strategy and transition plan; and

1 an estimate of the costs from each such agency for car-
2 rying out such strategy and transition plan.

3 This division may be cited as the “Additional Afghan-
4 istan Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2022”.

6 **TITLE I—EXTENSIONS**

7 **SEC. 2101. EXTENSION OF AUTHORITY TO MAKE CERTAIN**
8 **APPOINTMENTS FOR NATIONAL DISASTER**
9 **MEDICAL SYSTEM.**

10 Section 2812(c)(4)(B) of the Public Health Service
11 Act (42 U.S.C. 300hh–11(c)(4)(B)) is amended by strik-
12 ing “December 3, 2021” and inserting “February 18,
13 2022”.

14 **SEC. 2102. EXTENSION OF ADDITIONAL SPECIAL ASSESS-**
15 **MENT.**

16 Section 3014(a) of title 18, United States Code, is
17 amended by striking “December 31, 2021” and inserting
18 “February 18, 2022”.

19 **SEC. 2103. EXTENSION OF TEMPORARY ORDER FOR**
20 **FENTANYL-RELATED SUBSTANCES.**

21 Effective as if included in the enactment of the Tem-
22 porary Reauthorization and Study of the Emergency
23 Scheduling of Fentanyl Analogues Act (Public Law 116–
24 114), section 2 of such Act (as amended by Public Law

1 117–43) is amended by striking “January 28, 2022” and
2 inserting “February 18, 2022”.

3 **SEC. 2104. EXTENDING INCREASED FMAP FOR CERTAIN**
4 **TERRITORIES.**

5 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 1905(ff)(3) of the Social
6 Security Act (42 U.S.C. 1396d(ff)(3)) is amended by
7 striking “December 3, 2021” and inserting “February 18,
8 2022”.

9 (b) REDUCTION OF MEDICARE IMPROVEMENT
10 FUND.—Section 1898(b)(1) of the Social Security Act (42
11 U.S.C. 1395iii(b)(1)) is amended by striking
12 “\$69,000,000” and inserting “\$56,000,000”.

13 **TITLE II—BUDGETARY EFFECTS**

14 **SEC. 2201. BUDGETARY EFFECTS.**

15 (a) STATUTORY PAYGO SCORECARDS.—The budg-
16 etary effects of this division shall not be entered on either
17 PAYGO scorecard maintained pursuant to section 4(d) of
18 the Statutory Pay-As-You-Go Act of 2010.

19 (b) SENATE PAYGO SCORECARDS.—The budgetary
20 effects of this division shall not be entered on any PAYGO
21 scorecard maintained for purposes of section 4106 of H.
22 Con. Res. 71 (115th Congress).

23 (c) CLASSIFICATION OF BUDGETARY EFFECTS.—
24 Notwithstanding Rule 3 of the Budget Scorekeeping
25 Guidelines set forth in the joint explanatory statement of

1 the committee of conference accompanying Conference Re-
2 port 105–217 and section 250(c)(8) of the Balanced
3 Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, the
4 budgetary effects of this division shall not be estimated—
5 (1) for purposes of section 251 of such Act;
6 (2) for purposes of an allocation to the Com-
7 mittee on Appropriations pursuant to section 302(a)
8 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974; and
9 (3) for purposes of paragraph (4)(C) of section
10 3 of the Statutory Pay-As-You-Go Act of 2010 as
11 being included in an appropriation Act.
