RULES COMMITTEE PRINT 117-52 TEXT OF H.R. 4176, THE LGBTQI+ DATA INCLUSION ACT

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "LGBTQI+ Data In-3 clusion Act".

4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

5 The Congress finds the following:
6 (1) The National Academies on Sciences, Engi7 neering, and Medicine (NASEM), in their 2022 re8 port, found that complete and accurate demographic
9 information on the LGBTQI+ community should be
10 standardized and collected.

11 (2) Comprehensive statistics are needed to in-12 form public policy and Federal programs.

(3) The availability of data also has a critical
role in ensuring that any disparities in areas like
health outcomes, housing, and employment can be
addressed.

17 (4) As of the March release of the NASEM re-18 port, limited Federal surveys collect data on sexual

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orientation and gender, with none currently meas uring intersex populations.

3 SEC. 3. REQUIREMENT TO COLLECT DATA ON SEXUAL ORI4 ENTATION, GENDER IDENTITY, AND VARI5 ATIONS IN SEX CHARACTERISTICS.

6 (a) SURVEY REQUIREMENT.—Not later than 360
7 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the head
8 of any agency that collects information through a covered
9 survey shall establish data standards that require, with re10 gard to the survey, the following:

(1) REVIEW.—The review of existing data sets
to determine in which data sets information about
sexual orientation, gender identity, and variations in
sex characteristics is not included.

15 (2) METHODS.—An identification of appropriate methods to include questions on sexual orientation, gender identity, and variations in sex characteristics in covered surveys that facilitate categorization and voluntary participation and preserve
privacy and confidentiality.

(3) DATA COLLECTION.—The use of the appropriate methods identified in paragraph (2) to gather
data on sexual orientation, gender identity, and variations in sex characteristics.

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1 (4) ASSESSMENT.—The implementation of a 2 process to routinely assess needed changes in cov-3 ered survey methods related to asking questions on 4 sexual orientation, gender identity, and variations in 5 sex characteristics.

6 (b) DATA REPORTS; WAIVER.—

7 (1) DATA REPORTS.—Not later than 3 years
8 after the date of the enactment of this Act, any re9 port published by an agency that relies on covered
10 survey demographic data shall include information
11 on sexual orientation, gender identity, and variations
12 in sex characteristics.

(2) WAIVER.—The head of the statistical unit
of an agency may waive the requirement under paragraph (1), on a case-by-case basis, if the standards
and policies in subsection (c) can not be met.

17 (c) CONFIDENTIALITY.—Any information collected
18 relating to the sexual orientation, gender identity, or vari19 ations in sex characteristics of a covered survey partici20 pant shall be maintained in accordance with applicable
21 confidentiality and privacy laws, policies, and standards.

22 (d) Applicability.—

23 (1) CONSTRUCTION.—Nothing in this Act shall24 be construed to require an individual to disclose

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their sexual orientation, gender identity, or vari ations in sex characteristics to an agency.

3 (2) EXEMPTION FROM PENALTY.—An indi4 vidual is not subject to any fine or other penalty for
5 refusing to answer any survey question regarding
6 gender identity, sexual orientation, or variations in
7 sex characteristics, including any fine or penalty
8 under subchapter II of chapter 7 of title 13, United
9 States Code.

(e) RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.—Nothing in this section shall be construed to permit the use of information
collected under this section in a manner that would adversely affect any individual.

14 (f) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

15 (1) AGENCY.—The term "agency" has the
16 meaning given that term in section 551 of title 5,
17 United States Code.

18 (2) COVERED SURVEY.—The term "covered
19 survey" means a survey that includes demographic
20 data in which—

21 (A) a subject self-reports information; or
22 (B) a knowledgeable proxy provides infor23 mation about the subject or responds for all in24 dividuals in a household.

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(3) DEMOGRAPHIC DATA.—The term "demo graphic data" means information about the race or
 ethnicity, sex, and age of a survey participant or
 population.

5 (4) GENDER IDENTITY.—The term "gender 6 identity" means the gender-related identity, appear-7 ance, mannerism, or other gender-related char-8 acteristic of an individual, regardless of the des-9 ignated sex at birth of the individual.

10 (5) SEXUAL ORIENTATION.—The term "sexual
11 orientation" means how a person identifies in terms
12 of their emotional, romantic, or sexual attraction,
13 and includes identification as straight, heterosexual,
14 gay, lesbian, or bisexual, among other terms.

(6) SURVEY.—The term "survey" means a data
collection activity involving observation or a questionnaire for a sample of a population and includes
the decennial census.

19 (7) VARIATIONS IN SEX CHARACTERISTICS.—
20 The term "variations in sex characteristics"—

(A) means a physical trait present at birth
or naturally occurring at a later time (including
genitals, gonads, hormone function, and chromosome patterns), that differ from normative
expectations for male or female bodies regard-

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1	ing the development, appearance, or function of
2	sex-related characteristics; and
3	(B) is sometimes referred to as intersex
4	traits.

Amend the title so as to read: "A bill to improve Federal populations surveys by requiring the collection of voluntary, self-disclosed information on sexual orientation, gender identity, and variations in sex characteristics in certain surveys, and for other purposes.".

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
