A BILL

To require the Comptroller General of the United States to review all clean water-related technical assistance authorities of the Environmental Protection Agency, and for other purposes.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "Water Resources Tech-
5	nical Assistance Review Act".
6	SEC. 2. GAO REPORT ON CLEAN WATER TECHNICAL ASSIST-
7	ANCE.
8	(a) In General.—Not later than 1 year after the date
9	of enactment of this Act, the Comptroller General of the
10	United States shall initiate a comprehensive review of all
11	covered technical assistance.
12	(b) Requirements.—The Comptroller General shall
13	include in the review required under subsection (a) the fol-
14	lowing:
15	(1) A description of all covered technical assist-
16	ance available to States, Tribes, local governments,
17	and non-governmental organizations, including—
18	(A) the regions and populations that are
19	served through the provision of technical assist-
20	ance; and
21	(B) a summary of the activities and actions
22	carried out through covered technical assistance
23	during the 5-year period preceding this Act.
24	(2) A comprehensive review of how the Adminis-
25	trator of the Environmental Protection Agency,

1	through the Water Technical Assistance initiative
2	(known as "WaterTA initiative"), identifies, selects,
3	and partners with technical assistance providers to
4	support communities, including—
5	(A) a description of the criteria, evaluation
6	process, and contracting mechanisms used for se-
7	lecting such providers;
8	(B) a description of the extent of coordina-
9	tion with State, Tribal, and regional partners in
10	the selection and deployment of such providers;
11	(C) a description of how such providers are
12	matched to meet the needs of local communities,
13	including any pre-engagement scoping activities
14	$or\ community\ consultations;$
15	(D) a description of how such providers
16	identify communities in need of technical assist-
17	ance, including economically distressed commu-
18	nities, and conduct outreach to such commu-
19	nities;
20	(E) a description of the scope and types of
21	assistance delivered through such initiative; and
22	(F) a list of communities that received tech-
23	nical assistance support through such initiative,
24	including the type and cost of assistance received
25	by each such community and a summary of the

1	outcomes associated with the provision of such
2	assistance.
3	(3) An analysis of any duplication of covered
4	technical assistance available through multiple pro-
5	grams of the Environmental Protection Agency.
6	(4) An evaluation of how the provision of covered
7	technical assistance builds capacity in communities
8	to access other water infrastructure programs carried
9	out by the Administrator.
10	(5) An assessment of the needs of economically
11	distressed communities eligible to receive assistance
12	under a clean water infrastructure program carried
13	out by the Administrator that are not addressed
14	through covered technical assistance.
15	(6) An evaluation of how the Administrator car-
16	ries out covered technical assistance in coordination
17	with other Federal agencies providing technical as-
18	sistance related to water infrastructure.
19	(7) An evaluation of how covered technical as-
20	sistance supports communities in understanding,
21	identifying, and implementing alternative and cost-
22	effective technologies and features of treatment works
23	that achieve long-term savings and improved out-
24	comes in addressing water quality challenges.

1	(c) Report.—Upon the completion of the review con-
2	ducted under subsection (a), the Comptroller General shall
3	submit to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastruc-
4	ture of the House of Representatives and the Committee on
5	Environment and Public Works of the Senate a report con-
6	taining—
7	(1) the findings of such review; and
8	(2) any recommendations to improve covered
9	technical assistance.
10	(d) Plan for Compliance.—Not later than 90 days
11	after the Comptroller General submits the report required
12	under subsection (c), and annually thereafter for a period
13	of 5 years, the Administrator shall submit to the Committee
14	on Transportation and Infrastructure of the House of Rep-
15	resentatives and the Committee on Environment and Public
16	Works of the Senate a plan detailing any actions the Ad-
17	ministrator has taken to comply with the recommendations
18	contained in such a report.
19	(e) Covered Technical Assistance Defined.—In
20	this section, the term "covered technical assistance" means
21	a technical assistance authority, initiative, or program of
22	the Environmental Protection Agency that is related to
23	clean water infrastructure.
