DIVISION A – COMMERCE, JUSTICE, SCIENCE, AND RELATED AGENCIES APPROPRIATIONS ACT, 2026

The joint explanatory statement accompanying this division is approved and indicates congressional intent. Unless otherwise noted, the language set forth in House Report 119–272 (“the House report”) and the Senate Report 119–44 (“the Senate report”) carries the same weight as language included in this joint explanatory statement and should be complied with unless specifically addressed to the contrary in this joint explanatory statement or the act. While some language is repeated for emphasis, it is not intended to negate the language referred to above unless expressly provided herein. In cases where the House report and the Senate report direct the submission of a report, such report is to be submitted to both the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations (“the Committees”).

Each department and agency funded in this act shall follow the directions set forth in this act and the accompanying explanatory statement and shall not reallocate resources or reorganize activities except as provided herein. Reprogramming procedures shall apply to: funds provided in this act; unobligated balances from previous appropriations acts that are available for obligation or expenditure in fiscal year 2026; and non-appropriated resources such as fee collections that are used to meet program requirements in fiscal year 2026. These procedures are specified in section 505 of this act.

Any reprogramming request shall include any out-year budgetary impacts and a separate accounting of program or mission impacts on estimated carryover funds. Any program, project, or activity cited in this explanatory statement, the House report, or the Senate report and not changed by this act, shall be construed as the position of the Congress and shall not be subject to reductions or reprogramming without prior approval of the Committees. Further, any department or agency funded in this act that plans a reduction-in-force shall notify the Committees by letter no later than 45 days in advance of the date of any such planned personnel action.

When a department or agency submits a reprogramming or transfer request to the Committees and does not receive identical responses, it shall be the responsibility of the department or agency seeking the reprogramming to reconcile the differences between the two bodies before proceeding. If reconciliation is not possible, the items in disagreement in the reprogramming or transfer request shall be considered unapproved. Departments and agencies shall not submit reprogramming notifications after July 1, 2026, except in extraordinary

circumstances. Any such notification shall include a description of the extraordinary circumstances.

In compliance with section 528 of this act, each department and agency funded in this act shall submit spending plans, signed by the respective department or agency head, for the Committees' review not later than 45 days after the date of enactment of this act.

In lieu of Senate language regarding "Access to High-Quality Affordable Child Care for Federal Employees", the agreement directs each department or agency funded in this act to report to the Committees, within 180 days of the date of enactment of this act, and include in annual budget justifications thereafter, on their efforts to help provide access to high-quality affordable child care for the children of those Federal employees. The reports shall detail all current programs or efforts that assist department or agency employees with child care, identify programs-including for recruitment and retention-that assist with child care, provide the number of employees utilizing such programs, and detail associated costs.

The Committee acknowledges that there is room for improvement in the system used to identify and recover indirect cost rates under the Uniform Guidance, particularly with respect to the need for greater transparency into these costs. Various models have been suggested to achieve these improvements, including the Financial Accountability in Research (Fair) model advanced by the Joint Associations Group on Indirect Costs (JAG), which the Committee believes merit further consideration.

TITLE I
DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

INTERNATIONAL TRADE ADMINISTRATION

OPERATIONS AND ADMINISTRATION

The agreement includes \$582,000,000 in total resources for the International Trade Administration (ITA). This amount is offset by \$20,000,000 in estimated fee collections, resulting in a direct appropriation of \$562,000,000. The agreement directs ITA to apply reductions amongst the business units proportionally, to the extent practicable to maintain current staffing levels.

Travel and Tourism.—The agreement provides up to \$3,500,000 for ITA to continue implementing the “Visit America Act.”

Promoting U.S. Competitiveness in Infrastructure.—The agreement directs ITA's Office of Trade Remedy Compliance to enhance ongoing efforts to facilitate the use of U.S. developed construction codes in foreign markets to increase market access for U.S. exporters of construction-related goods and services and to counteract the People's Republic of China's (PRC) influence. Through the PRC's Belt and Road Initiative, the PRC forces the use of PRC construction standards in recipient countries. PRC standards align with Chinese manufacturing and construction practices that are less rigorous than U.S. developed construction codes and encourage low cost over strong quality construction, creating a “race to the bottom” that disadvantages U.S. industry in affected markets.

Rural Export Assistance.—The agreement provides up to \$1,000,000 for rural export centers and not less than \$1,000,000 for the National Rural Export Center.

BUREAU OF INDUSTRY AND SECURITY

OPERATIONS AND ADMINISTRATION

The agreement includes \$235,000,000 for the Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS).

Enforcement of Export Licenses.—The agreement strongly supports the Department's efforts to keep America at the forefront of cutting-edge technologies, particularly those with significant national security implications like high end semiconductors for artificial intelligence. In recognition of the need to tightly control these technologies, the agreement provides an increase

of not less than \$10,000,000 above the fiscal year 2024 enacted level for the enforcement of the restrictions on end uses and end users for products classified under Export Control Classification Number 3A090 and related technologies. Further, BIS shall provide a briefing to the Committees, within 45 days of enactment of this act, on how BIS is complying with 50 U.S.C. 4815(c) for applications to export to entities located in the PRC for such products.

Semiconductor Manufacturing International Corporation.—In lieu of House language under this heading, the agreement directs BIS to review all licenses issued to entities to export to Huawei, Semiconductor Manufacturing International Corporation, or any of their subsidiaries and, through the interagency license review process, rescind licenses, as appropriate. The agreement directs BIS to report to the Committees no later than 30 days after enactment of this act on the implementation of this directive.

Emerging and Foundational Technologies.—In lieu of House language under this heading, the agreement directs BIS to continue ongoing assessment of all technologies identified by the Office of National Science and Technology Council in February 2024 as “critical and emerging technologies,” for the purpose of preventing foreign adversaries from obtaining U.S. emerging and foundational technologies. BIS is further directed to report to the Committees no later than 180 days after enactment of this act on the implementation of this directive.

Taiwan and Finland Export Control Officers.—The agreement includes not less than \$2,000,000 to support the hiring of export control officers in the increasingly important jurisdictions of Taiwan and Finland.

Revision of Firearms License Requirements.—Due to BIS’s rescission of interim final rule “Revision of Firearms License Requirements” (89 FR 34680), the agreement does not adopt the Senate report language under this heading.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION

The agreement includes \$466,000,000 for the programs and administrative expenses of the Economic Development Administration (EDA).

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

The agreement includes \$400,000,000 for Economic Development Assistance Programs. Funds are to be distributed as follows:

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes \$66,000,000 for EDA salaries and expenses.

MINORITY BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT AGENCY

MINORITY BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

The agreement includes \$50,000,000 for the Minority Business Development Agency (MBDA), to perform the statutory functions of MBDA as authorized under the Minority Business

Development Act of 2021 (division K of Public Law 117–58), including support for Business Center operations.

Office of Native American Business Development.—The agreement adopts House language under this heading and provides \$2,500,000.

Native Entities.—The agreement adopts the Senate language under this heading.

MBDA Transfer.—The agreement does not adopt the Senate language under this heading to eliminate the authority to transfer MBDA funds.

ECONOMIC AND STATISTICAL ANALYSIS

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes \$118,000,000 for Economic and Statistical Analysis (ESA), including up to \$7,748,000 for the Office of the Under Secretary for Economic Affairs.

BUREAU OF THE CENSUS

The agreement includes \$1,490,349,000 for the Bureau of the Census (“Census Bureau”).

CURRENT SURVEYS AND PROGRAMS

The bill provides \$318,500,000 for the Current Surveys and Programs account.

PERIODIC CENSUSES AND PROGRAMS

The bill provides \$1,171,849,000 in direct appropriations for the Periodic Censuses and Programs account.

NATIONAL TELECOMMUNICATIONS AND INFORMATION ADMINISTRATION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes \$50,000,000 for the salaries and expenses of the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA).

Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD) Coordination.—In lieu of language in the House report under this heading and the heading “Rate Regulation,” the agreement directs NTIA to ensure BEAD awards comply with section 60102(h)(5)(D) of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (Public Law 117–58).

Broadband Investments under the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA).—No later than 30 days after enactment of this act, NTIA shall provide a briefing to the Committees on its plans and timeline for expending all remaining funds provided by IIJA for the BEAD program.

FACILITIES MANAGEMENT AND CONSTRUCTION

The agreement includes \$1,000,000 for necessary expenses for the design, construction, alteration, improvement, maintenance, and repair of buildings and facilities managed by NTIA.

UNITED STATES PATENT AND TRADEMARK OFFICE

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

(INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

The agreement includes language making available to the United States Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO) \$4,956,000,000, to be derived from offsetting fee collections estimated for fiscal year 2026 by the Congressional Budget Office.

Northern New England Community Outreach Office.—The agreement adopts the Senate language regarding the Northern New England Community Outreach Office. In addition, the agreement directs USPTO to expand the quarterly updates required under such language to include the status of all community outreach office locations nationwide, consistent with the implementation of the Unleashing American Innovators Act of 2022 (division W of Public Law 117-328).

NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF STANDARDS AND TECHNOLOGY

The agreement includes \$1,847,136,000 for the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST).

SCIENTIFIC AND TECHNICAL RESEARCH AND SERVICES

(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The agreement provides \$1,249,239,000 for NIST's Scientific and Technical Research and Services (STRS) account. The agreement provides up to the fiscal year 2024 enacted level for the Senate directions on “Cybersecurity”, “Circular Economy”, “Pyrrhotite Testing and Mitigation”, “Regenerative Medicine Standards”, and “Dr. David Satcher Cybersecurity Education Grant Program”.

Forensic Sciences.—The agreement provides up to \$22,000,000 for forensic science research, including up to \$3,500,000 to support the Organization of Scientific Area Committees, up to \$1,500,000 for a competitive Standards Development Organization grant, and up to \$1,500,000 to support technical merit evaluations.

Critical and Emerging Technologies.—The agreement includes no less than the fiscal year 2024 enacted level to support NIST's standards development work across areas of critical and emerging technology.

Artificial Intelligence (AI).—The agreement provides no less than \$55,000,000 for NIST's ongoing AI research and measurement science efforts. Within the funds provided, up to \$10,000,000 is to expand on NIST's AI efforts through the U.S. Center for AI Standards and Innovation to advance AI research, standards, and testing. The agreement adopts House direction under the heading “Evaluation of Chinese and U.S. AI Capabilities” and Senate direction under the headings “AI Model Evaluations” and “Foreign AI Model Evaluations”.

NIST Center of Excellence and Full-Scale Testing Center for Building Technologies.—The agreement adopts Senate language regarding the establishment of a NIST Center of Excellence and Full-Scale Testing Center for Building Technologies.

Unmanned Aerial Systems (UAS) Training for First Responders.—The agreement supports NIST working to collaborate and facilitate credentialing with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Center of Excellence for Unmanned Aerial Systems Research (ASSURE) on course development, delivery, and credentialing based on NIST's standard test method and directs that a focus be on first responders in underserved communities.

Climate and Energy Measurement, Tools, and Testbeds.—The agreement includes no less than \$52,000,000 for the program.

NIST STRS Community Project Funding/NIST External Projects.—The agreement includes \$405,331,366 for NIST STRS Community Project Funding/NIST External Projects. The agreement directs NIST to provide the funding for the projects listed in the table titled,

“Community Project Funding/Congressionally Directed Spending” at the end of this joint explanatory statement in the corresponding amounts. The agreement further directs NIST to perform the same level of oversight and due diligence as with any other external partners.

INDUSTRIAL TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

The agreement includes \$212,000,000 for Industrial Technology Services (ITS), including \$175,000,000 for the Hollings Manufacturing Extension Partnership (MEP). The agreement also provides \$37,000,000 for the Manufacturing USA Program.

Hollings Manufacturing Extension Partnership Program (MEP).—In recognition of strong bicameral and bipartisan Congressional support, the agreement continues strong support for the MEP program and provides \$175,000,000. The Secretary is directed to continue the program under the same terms and conditions as were required in fiscal year 2024, and to issue awards at no less than the amounts in fiscal year 2024. Further, the agreement directs that no funds are provided to execute or plan for a program that reduces the number of active MEP Centers and that the Secretary shall minimize, by rapidly executing funding competitions and renewing existing Centers in a timely manner, the periods of time when no MEP Center is active in any State or Puerto Rico. The Committees direct the Secretary that any planned revision of the program, including the one outlined in the June 2025 renewal documents, shall be submitted as part of the fiscal year 2027 budget request, and shall not be carried out without explicit approval from the Committees in the respective full-year appropriations act, and shall comply with the MEP Program authorizations and requirements contained in 15 U.S.C. 278k. The agreement further directs that no less than 85 percent of appropriated funds be allocated directly to MEP Centers through base awards, competitive, or expansion award pilot programs.

In-Space Manufacturing.—The agreement adopts Senate language on “In-Space Manufacturing.”

Quarterly Briefings.—The agreement adopts House language on “Reporting on CHIPS Awards Upside Sharing and Funding Milestones” and further directs NIST to provide these updates as quarterly briefings to the Committees. These briefings should review NIST’s execution of the funding provided under the CHIPS and Science Act, Public Law 117–167, including a summary of the activities undertaken, hiring and staffing levels, funds obligated and expended, and the plans and timelines for obligation of all remaining funds for each of the authorized activities as specified by section 9902 and each subsection of 9906, respectively, of Public Law 116–283. The agreement further directs NIST to provide quarterly briefings on the CHIPS Research and Development Office (CRDO) which detail a summary of the activities undertaken by the CRDO, hiring and staffing levels, funds obligated and expended, and the plans and timelines for obligation of all remaining funds for each of the authorized activities in Public Law 116–283.

CREATING HELPFUL INCENTIVES TO PRODUCE SEMICONDUCTORS (CHIPS) FOR AMERICA FUND

Division A of Public Law 117–167 established the CHIPS for America Fund. The agreement allocates the funds according to the amounts listed in the following table.

CONSTRUCTION OF RESEARCH FACILITIES

The agreement provides \$385,897,000 for NIST construction, of which \$128,000,000 is available for Safety, Capacity, Maintenance, and Major Repairs (SCMMR). The agreement directs NIST to provide quarterly updates to the Committees on its efforts to address its maintenance backlog.

NIST Extramural Construction.—The agreement includes \$257,897,000 for NIST Extramural Construction and directs NIST to provide the funding for the projects listed in the table titled, “Community Project Funding/Congressionally Directed Spending” at the end of this joint explanatory statement in the corresponding amounts. The agreement further directs NIST to perform the same level of oversight and due diligence as with any other external partners.

NATIONAL OCEANIC AND ATMOSPHERIC ADMINISTRATION

The agreement directs the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) to incorporate the funding levels established in both the table and the narrative direction when executing its budget for fiscal year 2026.

Quarterly Briefings.—The agreement directs the Department of Commerce and NOAA to provide quarterly briefings to the Committees on all NOAA satellite programs, National Weather Service operations, and Office of Marine and Aviation Operations activities and procurements, not

later than 30 days after the end of each fiscal quarter, and to provide prompt interim updates in the event of any reprogramming, system failure, or construction delay.

Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) Funding.—The agreement does not include a requirement for the submission of a fiscal year 2026 spend plan for funds provided under the IIJA.

OPERATIONS, RESEARCH, AND FACILITIES

(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The agreement includes a total program level of \$4,968,036,000 under this account, for NOAA's coastal, fisheries, marine, weather, satellite, and other programs. This total funding level includes \$4,540,392,000 in direct appropriations, a transfer of \$399,644,000 from balances in the "Promote and Develop Fishery Products and Research Pertaining to American Fisheries" fund, and \$28,000,000 derived from recoveries of prior year obligations. The following narrative descriptions and tables identify the specific activities and funding levels included in this act.

National Ocean Service (NOS).—\$677,202,000 is for NOS Operations, Research, and Facilities.

National Centers for Coastal Ocean Science (NCCOS).—The agreement provides \$55,000,000 for NCCOS and directs NCCOS to continue efforts related to coastal sustainability and resilience.

Coral Reef Research Coordination Institutes.—The agreement reiterates the language in the House report under the captions “Research Coordination Institutes” and “Coral Reef Research Coordination Institutes” and provides not less than \$1,000,000 for the establishment of these institutes, to be equally divided between the Atlantic Coral Reef Research Coordination Institute and the Pacific Coral Reef Research Coordination Institute.

Coastal Zone Management Grants.—NOAA shall report to the Committees, not less than 120 days of enactment of this act, on ongoing efforts to work with local governments, States, and other partners to achieve the objectives of the Coastal Zone Management Grants while, to the extent practicable, limiting impacts on wildfire prevention, timber and energy production, housing construction, and military-related activities.

National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS).—\$1,121,703,000 is for NMFS Operations, Research, and Facilities.

Fisheries Surveys.—The agreement adopts Senate direction under “Fisheries Surveys” and provides a total increase of \$7,000,000 above the fiscal year 2024 enacted level within Fisheries Data Collections, Surveys, and Assessments.

Fishery Survey Contingency Fund.—The agreement adopts Senate direction “Fishery Survey Contingency Fund” and provides not less than \$2,000,000.

Seafood Import Monitoring Program (SIMP).—The agreement includes \$6,200,000 for SIMP and to move forward with implementation of the Action Plan to Improve the U.S. Seafood Import Monitoring Program.

U.S. Commercial Space-Based Radio Frequency Detection Technologies.—The agreement adopts House and Senate direction and provides not less than \$1,000,000 to operationalize commercial space-based radio frequency data collection capabilities to detect and track foreign vessels engaged in illegal, unreported, and unregulated fishing.

Oyster Resilience in the Northern Gulf of America.—The agreement adopts House and Senate direction and provides not less than \$1,500,000 for collaborative academic research addressing oyster reefs in the Northern Gulf Coast.

Oyster Aquaculture, Research, and Restoration.—The agreement adopts House report language and provides up to \$5,000,000 to enhance development of oyster aquaculture and habitat improvements, map oyster bed conditions, monitor water quality, and increase partnerships.

South Atlantic Reef Fish.—The agreement adopts House direction and provides \$2,500,000 to provide enhanced fisheries independent data collection of South Atlantic reef fish stocks conducted through the Southeast Fishery-Independent Survey.

Mitchell Act Hatcheries.—The agreement provides \$4,000,000 above the fiscal year 2024 enacted level for the operation and maintenance of Mitchell Act hatcheries and directs NOAA to continue genetic stock identification for salmon recovery and management. The agreement also reiterates Senate direction regarding administrative expenses for the program.

Chesapeake Bay Oyster Restoration.—The agreement adopts Senate direction under the heading “Chesapeake Bay Office” and provides \$1,500,000 above the fiscal year 2024 enacted level within Habitat Conservation and Restoration to support oyster restoration in the Chesapeake Bay. In addition, NOAA is directed to brief the Committees, no later than 90 days after the enactment of this act, on the agency’s plans to improve the performance of underperforming oyster restoration, recovery, or enhancement activities in the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries, as well as strategies to increase the availability of oysters for managed commercial harvest resulting from this federal support without compromising ecosystem restoration outcomes.

Office of Oceanic and Atmospheric Research (OAR).—\$588,881,000 is for OAR Operations, Research, and Facilities. The agreement adopts the President’s budget request proposal to transition the U.S. Weather Research Program, Tornado Severe Storm Research/Phased Array Radar, and Joint Technology Transfer Initiative activities to the National Weather Service.

Regional Integrated Sciences and Assessments (RISA) Program.—The agreement provides not less than \$17,000,000 for the RISA program, including up to \$1,000,000 for increased staff capacity at the Southern Climate Impacts Planning Program. In addition, NOAA shall reestablish programs in the Northwest and South Atlantic to ensure maximum coverage around the Nation.

Severe Weather Research.—The agreement recognizes the growing impacts of extreme weather events on public safety, infrastructure, and the economy, and the importance of advancing research, modeling, and prediction capabilities. Within available funds, the agreement directs NOAA to provide to the Committees, no later than 90 days after enactment of this act, a written assessment of the potential role, mission, and benefits of an extreme weather federally funded research and development center (FFRDC), including how it could complement existing NOAA programs and partnerships. The assessment should address possible organizational models, opportunities for collaboration with academic institutions, other federal agencies, and the private sector, and any anticipated resource requirements. In preparing this assessment, NOAA is encouraged to consult with relevant stakeholders and to consider how such an FFRDC could strengthen the nation's capabilities in extreme weather prediction, data assimilation, and applied research.

Aircraft Based Observation Program.—The agreement adopts the House report language under this heading and Senate report under the heading “Observations” and provides an increase of \$2,500,000 above the fiscal year 2024 enacted level to support the deployment of commercial aviation-based atmospheric data.

National Mesonet Program.—The agreement adopts House language and provides \$30,000,000 for the National Mesonet Program to expand observations, including up to \$1,500,000 for the cost associated with the National Mesonet Program Office.

National Data Buoy Center.—The agreement adopts the House language and provides an increase of up to \$5,000,000 above the fiscal year 2024 enacted level for NDBC.

Monitoring of Atmospheric Rivers.—The agreement adopts House and Senate direction and provides not less than \$3,000,000 for the monitoring of atmospheric rivers.

Aviation Accession Training Program.—The agreement adopts Senate direction and provides not less than \$2,500,000 for NOAA's aviation accession training program.

NOAA Community Project Funding/NOAA Special Projects.—The agreement directs NOAA to provide funding for the projects listed in the table titled "Community Project Funding/Congressionally Directed Spending" at the end of this joint explanatory statement in the corresponding amounts, consistent with NOAA's existing authorities, jurisdictions, and procedures, as appropriate. NOAA shall perform the same level of oversight and due diligence regarding these projects as with any other external partners.

Geostationary Extended Observations (GeoXO).—The agreement endorses a GeoXO architecture incorporating advanced imaging and atmospheric sounding capabilities on both East and West geostationary satellites. It underscores the value of sustaining these core capabilities across orbital positions to support ongoing coverage, operational resilience, and data redundancy for weather forecasting and hazard monitoring, while encouraging NOAA to address cost, schedule, and technical risks in line with this framework.

Systems/Services Architecture and Engineering (SAE).—The agreement adopts Senate direction under this heading and House direction under the heading “Joint Venture Program” and provides \$43,252,000 for SAE for the continuation of the commercial data purchase and commercial weather data pilot programs, including up to \$5,000,000 for procuring private sector hyperspectral microwave sounder data and other space weather observations.

NOAA Construction.—The agreement adopts the Senate report direction on inclusion of a table regarding the use of funds for NOAA Construction.

Vessel Recapitalization.—The agreement provides \$65,000,000, including sufficient funding to complete the Class A vessels. NOAA shall consider integrating autonomous platforms into the fleet to close critical gaps and boost data yields for mapping, charting, ocean exploration, and fisheries surveys.

PACIFIC COASTAL SALMON RECOVERY

The agreement includes \$65,000,000 for the Pacific Coastal Salmon Recovery Fund (PCSRF) and directs that funds will be available to Tribes without a matching requirement. NOAA is directed to report on how its current priorities meet the intent of the PCSRF to support the recovery and protection of all declining salmon stocks.

FISHERIES DISASTER ASSISTANCE

The agreement provides \$300,000 for Fisheries Disaster Assistance.

FISHERMEN'S CONTINGENCY FUND

The agreement includes \$349,000 for the Fishermen's Contingency Fund.

FISHERIES FINANCE PROGRAM ACCOUNT

The agreement includes language under this heading limiting obligations of direct loans to \$24,000,000 for Individual Fishing Quota loans and \$150,000,000 for traditional direct loans.

RECREATIONAL QUOTA ENTITY FUND

The agreement allows for the halibut recreational quota entity as authorized under section 106 of the Driftnet Modernization and Bycatch Reduction Act (title I of division S of Public Law 117-328).

DEPARTMENTAL MANAGEMENT

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes \$92,500,000 for Departmental Management salaries and expenses.

Spending Plans.—The agreement adopts Senate language on spending plans which are critical for the work of the Committees.

Employee Access to High-quality Affordable Child Care.—In lieu of Senate language under this heading, the agreement directs the Department to follow the direction ~~under the same~~ heading in the front matter of this explanatory statement.

RENOVATION AND MODERNIZATION

The agreement includes a total of \$1,142,000 for the Renovation and Modernization account.

OFFICE OF INSPECTOR GENERAL

The agreement includes a total of \$48,000,000 for the Office of Inspector General (OIG).

GENERAL PROVISIONS—DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The agreement includes the following general provisions for the Department of Commerce: Section 101 makes funds available for advanced payments only upon certification of officials, designated by the Secretary, that such payments are considered to be in the public interest.

Section 102 makes appropriations for Department of Commerce salaries and expenses available for hire of passenger motor vehicles, for services, and for uniforms and allowances as authorized by law.

Section 103 provides the authority to transfer funds between Department of Commerce appropriation accounts and requires 15 days advance notification to the Committees on Appropriations for certain actions.

Section 104 provides congressional notification requirements for NOAA satellite programs and includes life cycle cost estimates for certain weather satellite programs.

Section 105 provides for reimbursement for services within Department of Commerce buildings.

Section 106 clarifies that grant recipients under the Department of Commerce may deter child pornography, copyright infringement, or any other unlawful activity over their networks.

Section 107 provides the NOAA Administrator with the authority to avail NOAA of resources, with the consent of those supplying the resources, to carry out responsibilities of any statute administered by NOAA.

Section 108 prohibits the National Technical Information Service from charging for certain services.

Section 109 allows NOAA to be reimbursed by Federal and non-Federal entities for performing certain activities.

Section 110 provides the Economics and Statistics Administration certain authority to enter into cooperative agreements.

Section 111 allows the Secretary of Commerce to waive up to 50 percent of the cost sharing requirements for funds provided in this act under section 315 of the Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972.

Section 112 sets limitations on the Department's ability to obligate unobligated balances of expired discretionary funds transferred to the Nonrecurring Expenses Fund.

Section 113 allows the NOAA Administrator to establish an alternative or fixed rate for relocation allowance, including permanent change of station allowance.

Section 114 requires NWS to maintain staffing levels to perform statutory functions.

TITLE II
DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE
JUSTICE OPERATIONS, MANAGEMENT, AND ACCOUNTABILITY

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes \$140,000,000 for Justice Operations, Management, and Accountability.

Timely Responses to Committee Inquiries and Meeting Report Deadlines.—The Committee has both budgetary and oversight responsibilities, and requests for additional information from the Chairs, Vice Chair, Ranking Member, or their Committee staff to any Department component should be treated as a priority for the Department and responded to both courteously and expeditiously. The Committee again reminds the Department that deadlines directed in Committee reports or explanatory statement language are not merely suggestions. The Department is to immediately submit reports that remain outstanding from fiscal year 2024. Efforts should be immediately undertaken not only to submit these delayed reports, but also to ensure that full and complete information is provided.

Voting Rights and Election Administrator Threats.—In lieu of the directives under “Election Threats Task Force” and “Voting Rights” in the Senate report, the agreement encourages the Department to devote appropriate resources to investigate credible threats made against individuals associated with the electoral process, such as election administrators, and encourages the Department to make all policies and procedures related to the rights and protections offered to such individuals publicly available on its website. The agreement further encourages the Attorney General to provide appropriate resources to ensure voting rights are protected, pursuant to the U.S. Constitution, Federal law, and proper adherence to the precedents of the U.S. Supreme Court.

Addressing Cargo Theft.—In lieu of the language contained under the caption “Cargo Theft Prosecution,” within the heading for the Executive Office for U.S. Attorneys in the House report, the agreement adopts the directives under the caption “Combatting Cargo Theft” in the Senate report.

Opioid Reduction Task Force.—In lieu of the directives under this caption in the House report, the agreement encourages the Department to take the actions described on this matter.

Settlement Agreement Oversight.—In lieu of the House report language under this caption, the agreement directs the Department to provide a briefing, no later than 60 days after the enactment of this act, on transfers from Department of Justice appropriations accounts for the payment of settlements as an alternative to payments from the Judgment Fund.

Pregnancy Center Vandalism.—In lieu of the directive under this caption in the House report, the agreement encourages the Department to provide the described report on the matter.

Conflicts of Interest.—In lieu of the language under this caption in the House report, the agreement directs the Department to provide a briefing to the Committees, no later than 180 days after enactment of this act, on the Department’s Hatch Act policies.

FACE Act Enforcement.—In lieu of the directive under this caption in the House report, the agreement encourages the Department to brief the Committees on the matter within one year of the enactment of this act.

Community Relations Service (CRS).—In lieu of the language under this caption in the House report, the agreement encourages the Department to operate and manage CRS as efficiently as possible.

Contraband Vape Products.—In lieu of the requirements and directives under this caption in the House report, and those contained under the caption “Illegal E-Cigarette Coordination & Enforcement,” the agreement incorporates such requirements and directives to be executed by the Department and its component agencies, as described in the House report.

Burglary Tourism.—In lieu of the language under this caption in the House report and under the caption “Hiring Additional Intelligence Analysts” under the subheading “Federal Bureau of Investigation, Salaries and Expenses” in the House report, the agreement encourages the Department to work with Federal, State, and local law enforcement agencies to address the issue of burglary tourism.

Utah Feasibility Study.—In lieu of the directives under this caption contained in the heading “Federal Prison System, Buildings and Facilities” in the House report, the agreement directs the Department to conduct the feasibility study as described therein.

Departmental Communications with the Appropriations Committees.—The Committees on Appropriations have long-maintained a collaborative working relationship with the Justice Management Division (JMD). In this context, the agreement expresses disappointment in JMD’s responsiveness to resource-related inquiries. In many cases, the Committees lack necessary

information to determine the appropriate resource requirements for the Department's components and programs. The agreement directs JMD to provide a briefing, within 30 days of the enactment of this act, on the steps necessary to restore the longstanding collaborative relationship.

Federal Drug-Free School Zones.—The agreement directs the Department to appropriately enforce the Federal Drug-Free School Zones Act (21 U.S.C. 860), to ensure that areas with young children, including schools and playgrounds, remain drug-free.

JUSTICE INFORMATION SHARING TECHNOLOGY
(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The agreement includes \$38,460,000 for Justice Information Sharing Technology.

Mass Spectrometry Technology.—In lieu of the language under this caption in the House report, the agreement directs the Department to provide a briefing within 90 days of enactment of this act, on opportunities for deploying Matrix-Assisted Laser Desorption/Ionization Time of Flight (MALDI-TOF) mass spectrometry technology, potential pilot locations, cost-effectiveness, and implementation timelines.

EXECUTIVE OFFICE FOR IMMIGRATION REVIEW
(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The agreement includes \$800,000,000 for the Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR), of which \$10,000,000 is derived by a transfer from the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services Immigration Examinations Fee Account.

Disposition of EOIR Adjudications.—In lieu of the directive pertaining to respondents' attendance at each court hearing contained in the caption "Immigration Case Backlog" in the House report, and the directive contained in the caption "Operational and Adjudicatory Transparency" in the Senate report, the agreement adopts the directives under the heading "Disposition of EOIR Adjudications" for cases in fiscal year 2026 contained in the Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying Public Law 118-42.

Case Adjudication and Immigration Judge Training.—In lieu of Section 554 of the House bill and the directives contained under the caption "Immigration Judge Training," in the Senate report, the agreement directs EOIR to refrain from incentivizing any immigration judge (IJ) to close or dismiss any case without adjudicating the merits of the case; directs EOIR to review its

training, to retrain all judges currently on a probationary period or on detail to EOIR, and to increase the frequency and availability of training for IJs outside the probationary period; and further directs EOIR to ensure IJ training emphasizes due process and humanitarian protections.

Staffing Levels for Immigration Judges and Support Teams.—The agreement adopts the longstanding directives in the Senate report under this caption. The agreement further directs EOIR to include a full quarterly accounting of all detailees serving as IJs, including the number; duration; home agency, department, bureau and PPA; and source of funds—reimbursable or not—for each such detailee. These reports shall be accompanied by quarterly briefings to the Committees covering all such topics.

Legal Orientation Program (LOP).—In lieu of the Senate language under this caption, the agreement provides no less than \$27,500,000 for services provided by LOP. The agreement incorporates the directive continued under this caption in the Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying Public Law 118–42.

Translation Services.—The agreement supports EOIR’s “commitment to providing professional interpretive services in all appropriate cases,” as noted in the Director’s Memorandum 25-20 of February 6, 2025, and therefore encourages EOIR to offer translation services so that the respondents can fully comprehend and participate in their immigration hearings.

OFFICE OF INSPECTOR GENERAL

The agreement includes \$139,000,000 for the Office of Inspector General.

Office of Inspector General Review of Implementation of the Direct Appropriation to BOP.—The agreement adopts the language under this caption in the Senate report and encourages the Office of Inspector General to conduct reviews of funds provided in Public Law 119–21 to other Department bureaus and programs as well.

UNITED STATES PAROLE COMMISSION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes \$13,000,000 for the salaries and expenses of the United States Parole Commission.

LEGAL ACTIVITIES

SALARIES AND EXPENSES, GENERAL LEGAL ACTIVITIES

(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The agreement includes \$900,000,000 for General Legal Activities. The agreement does not adopt the decision unit funding table included the House report under this heading.

In lieu of the language in the House report regarding the International Child Sexual Exploitation Database (ICSE), combatting child exploitation, and the Computer Crime and Intellectual Property Section, the agreement encourages the Department to dedicate adequate resources to support these objectives.

Trade Fraud Task Force.—No less than \$2,000,000 shall be used to carry out the activities of the Trade Fraud Task Force.

Deinstitutionalization.—In lieu of the directives under this caption in the House report, the agreement encourages the Department to take the actions described regarding this matter.

Litigation Strike Team.—In lieu of the language under the caption “Litigation Strike Team” in the House report, the agreement adopts the language under the caption “U.S. Forest Service Litigation” contained in the Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying Public Law 118–42.

Tortious Interference with a Federal Property Contract.—In lieu of the language in the House report under this caption, the agreement encourages the Department to allocate adequate resources to represent Federal interests in property contracts.

Animal Welfare.—In lieu of the language in the House report under this caption, the agreement encourages the Department to allocate adequate resources toward vigorously prosecuting violations of animal welfare laws.

VACCINE INJURY COMPENSATION TRUST FUND

The agreement includes a reimbursement of \$22,700,000 for Department expenses associated with litigating cases under the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act of 1986 (Public Law 99–660).

SALARIES AND EXPENSES, ANTITRUST DIVISION

The agreement includes \$245,000,000 for the Antitrust Division. The Congressional Budget Office estimates a resource level of \$310,000,000.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES, UNITED STATES ATTORNEYS

The agreement includes \$2,621,000,000 for the Executive Office for United States Attorneys and the 94 United States Attorneys' offices.

Prosecutorial Data.—In lieu of the House language regarding “District of Columbia Crime Statistics” and the Senate language regarding “Report on Declinations”, the agreement directs the Department to provide a briefing to the Committees thereon.

Report on the D.C. Five.—In lieu of the directives under this caption in the House report, the agreement encourages the Department to provide a briefing to the Committees on all actions previously taken by the Department on this issue within 180 days after the enactment of this act.

UNITED STATES TRUSTEE SYSTEM FUND

The agreement includes \$205,000,000 for the United States Trustee Program.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES, FOREIGN CLAIMS SETTLEMENT COMMISSION

The agreement includes \$2,504,000 for the Foreign Claims Settlement Commission.

FEES AND EXPENSES OF WITNESSES

The agreement includes \$320,000,000 for Fees and Expenses of Witnesses. The agreement expects that no funds will be obligated for expert witness services, including the payment of fees and expenses of expert witnesses, from any other DOJ accounts other than Fees and Expenses of Witnesses.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES, COMMUNITY RELATIONS SERVICE (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The agreement includes \$20,000,000 for the Community Relations Service.

ASSETS FORFEITURE FUND

The agreement includes \$20,514,000 for the Assets Forfeiture Fund.

UNITED STATES MARSHALS SERVICE SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes \$1,702,000,000 for the salaries and expenses of the United States Marshals Service (USMS).

Judicial Security.—The agreement directs USMS to dedicate the highest practicable funding towards the USMS Judicial and Courthouse Security Program.

CONSTRUCTION

The agreement includes \$8,000,000 for construction and related expenses in space controlled, occupied, or utilized by the USMS for prisoner holding and related support.

FEDERAL PRISONER DETENTION

The agreement includes \$2,236,000,000 for Federal Prisoner Detention.

NATIONAL SECURITY DIVISION SALARIES AND EXPENSES (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The agreement includes \$117,200,000 for the salaries and expenses of the National Security Division (NSD).

Countering Espionage by the CCP.—In lieu of the directives under the caption “Countering Espionage by the PRC,” in the House report, the agreement encourages the Department to focus on countering espionage and influence efforts against American businesses, research institutions, and academia emanating from the CCP.

INTERAGENCY LAW ENFORCEMENT

INTERAGENCY CRIME AND DRUG ENFORCEMENT

The agreement provides \$300,000,000 to continue the inter-governmental drug interdiction work of the Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Forces (OCDETF).

Reporting.—Working with state and local law enforcement partners, OCDETF historically investigated and prosecuted major drug trafficking, money laundering, and other high priority transnational organized crime networks. Because the Department is instead participating in a new task force co-led by the Department of Homeland Security, the agreement directs DOJ to provide both a written report and in-person briefing quarterly to the Committees detailing how funds under the Interagency Crime and Drug Enforcement sub-heading have been used to investigate and reduce: the availability of illegal drugs; violence, corruption, and other criminal activity associated with the drug trade. The first such briefing shall occur not more than 90 days after the enactment of this act.

FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes \$10,609,456,000 for the salaries and expenses of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI).

FBI Drug Control Funding.—In lieu of the House recommendation under this title, the agreement recommends no less than \$180,000,000 for the purposes described therein.

Total Cost of Ownership of Hardware.—In lieu of the directives under this caption, the agreement encourages the FBI to provide a briefing to the Committees, no later than 180 days after the enactment of this act, on the feasibility of conducting the described analysis.

National Bioforensic Analysis Center.—The agreement provides up to \$21,840,000 for the FBI’s role at the NBFAC. (NBFAC)

Supporting Law Enforcement Through ViCAP Modernization and Training.—In lieu of the directives under this caption, the agreement encourages the FBI to provide a briefing to the Committees, no later than 180 days after the enactment of this act, on the feasibility of conducting the described analysis.

Criminal Gang Activity in Jail and Prison Systems Software Procurement.—In lieu of the language under this caption, the agreement directs the FBI to provide a briefing on the subject no later than 180 days after ~~of~~ enactment of this act.

Aircraft Usage.—The agreement does not adopt the Senate language under this heading.

CONSTRUCTION

The agreement includes \$15,000,000 for FBI construction.

DRUG ENFORCEMENT ADMINISTRATION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes a direct appropriation of \$2,580,340,000 for the salaries and expenses of the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). In addition, DEA expects to derive \$669,660,000 from fees deposited in the Diversion Control Fee Account to carry out the Diversion Control Program, resulting in \$3,250,000,000 in total spending authority.

Fentanyl Wastewater Testing and Epidemiology.—The agreement recommends up to \$2,000,000 to accelerate testing for fentanyl, as described in the House report under this caption.

Breakthrough Therapy.—In lieu of the House language under this caption, the agreement adopts the Senate report language under the caption “Insomnia Pharmaceuticals.”

BUREAU OF ALCOHOL, TOBACCO, FIREARMS AND EXPLOSIVES

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes \$1,585,000,000 for the salaries and expenses of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF).

Preventing Firearm Straw Purchases.—The agreement adopts the Senate language under this heading.

National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN).—In lieu of the language in the House report under this caption, the agreement expresses strong support for NIBIN and directs ATF to support and expand it to the highest degree practicable.

Zero-Tolerance Policy.—In lieu of the directives under this caption in the House report, the agreement directs the Department to submit a report on activities relating to the Department's Zero-Tolerance Policy, within 180 days after the enactment of this act.

Unauthorized Release of Trace Data.—In lieu of the language under this caption in the House report, the agreement encourages the Department to take appropriate steps on the matter.

National Services Center.—In lieu of the language under this caption in the Senate report, the agreement acknowledges receipt of the requested report.

FEDERAL PRISON SYSTEM

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The agreement includes \$8,100,000,000 for the salaries and expenses of the Federal Prison System. Of the amount made available under this heading, no less than the fiscal year 2024 level shall be used for land mobile radio (LMR) communication and video security upgrades.

BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES

The agreement includes \$279,762,000 for the construction, acquisition, modernization, maintenance, and repair of prison and detention facilities housing Federal inmates.

Modernization and Repair Backlog.—The agreement adopts the language under this caption in the House report and expects BOP to apply funds provided in fiscal year 2026 to reduce its longstanding Modernization and Repair (M&R) backlog and directs BOP to prioritize funding for repairs that protect life and safety, including but not limited to operator-controlled and sliding mechanical security devices.

LIMITATION ON ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES, FEDERAL PRISON INDUSTRIES, INCORPORATED

The agreement includes a limitation on administrative expenses of \$2,700,000 for Federal Prison Industries, Incorporated.

STATE AND LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITIES

In total, the agreement includes \$4,486,800,000 for state and local law enforcement and crime prevention programs. This amount includes \$4,184,000,000 in discretionary budget authority, \$100,000,000 derived by transfer from the Crime Victims Fund, and \$202,000,000 scored as mandatory for Public Safety Officer Benefits. The Department is directed to submit an annual report, within 90 days of enactment, on grant programs that have not received a sufficient number of qualified applicants.

Additional Resources for Grant Funding.—In addition to the resources provided in this act, the agreement recognizes that additional funds have been made available to certain grant programs by Public Law 117–159 and Public Law 119–21.

Fiscal Year 2026 Spending Plan.—The agreement reiterates the direction provided in Senate Report 113–78 that the Department shall detail, as part of its spending plan for fiscal year 2026 and future years, the actual costs for each grantmaking component with respect to training, technical assistance, research and statistics, and peer review for the prior fiscal year, along with estimates of planned expenditures by each grantmaking component in each of these categories for the current year and the budget year.

Distinct Grantmaking Components.—The agreement directs the Department to maintain the Office on Violence Against Women and Office of Community Oriented Policing Services as distinct organizational grantmaking entities within the Department.

Grants Transfer Authority.—The agreement emphasizes the importance of the grant portfolio and the Committees' intent that funds appropriated for Department grant programs remain dedicated to grantmaking purposes. The agreement directs that no more than 3.5 percent of the funds made available by this act for grants, programs, or activities administered by the Office on Violence Against Women, the Office of Justice Programs, or the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services may be transferred, reprogrammed, or otherwise made available to any non-grantmaking office, component, or activity of the Department of Justice, except as otherwise expressly provided by this act.

Grant Programs Crosswalks.—The Department is directed to provide the Committees, as part of the spend plan submitted pursuant to section 528 of this act, a crosswalk of the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), and Community Oriented Policing Services Office (COPS) grant program solicitations, which includes the same level of information and detail as was provided to the Committee with respect to the solicitations of the Department's grant program offices in fiscal year 2024. (S)

Byrne JAG Precipitous Increase in Crime Funds.—The agreement directs the Department to provide, in the fiscal year 2026 spend plan submitted pursuant to section 528 of this act, a detailed accounting of how each solicitation for funds reserved under section 506(b)(1) of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (34 U.S.C. 10157) satisfies the requirement that such funds be used "to combat, address, or otherwise respond to precipitous or extraordinary increases in crime, or in a type or types of crime."

Notice of Funding Opportunities.—The agreement directs the Department that the notices of funding opportunities for the grants, contracts, cooperative agreements, and other assistance provided for by the Office on Violence Against Women, Office of Justice Programs, and the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services shall be publicly posted no later than 90 days after the date of enactment of this act.

STOP School Violence Act.—The agreement directs the Department to report, no later than 90 days after the enactment of this Act, on a plan to improve the timing and duration of the grant period to enable the improved quality of applications and increased participation in the application process. The agreement adopts the House report language on "STOP School Violence Act Report" and the Senate report language on the "STOP School Violence Act". (LC)

Crime Victims Fund.—The agreement allows for obligations of \$1,950,000,000 from the Crime Victims Fund. In an effort to appropriately balance support for the breadth of victims and related services, the agreement provides \$100,000,000 of this amount to support Violence Against Women Prevention and Prosecution Programs. This transfer is necessary to provide critical support for victims in the current fiscal environment.

Statutory Set-Asides.—The underlying statutes for several grant programs, including Services, Training, Officers, and Prosecutors (STOP) Grants and Sexual Assault Services Program (SASP) grants, outline set-asides for Tribal governments and coalitions, culturally specific community-based organizations, and organizations providing services to underserved populations. OVW shall ensure that the full amounts provided for in the authorizing statutes are awarded expeditiously.

The agreement provides \$55,000,000 for the Research, Evaluation and Statistics account. These funds are distributed as follows:

Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program.—The Department is directed to continue following the directives in House Report 117–97 adopted by Public Law 117–103 on “Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (Byrne JAG) Formula program”, and in the joint explanatory statement accompanying Public Law 117–103 on “Uses of Byrne-JAG Funds.” In lieu of the House report language on “Byrne JAG Funds for Automated License Plate Reader Systems (ALPRs)”, the agreement highlights that Byrne JAG funds may be used by state, local, and Tribal law enforcement for ALPRs.

Non-Lethal Drone Technology.—In lieu of the House report language on “Non-Lethal Drone Technology”, the agreement directs the Department to provide a briefing within 60 days of the enactment of this act detailing the Department’s plan to implement Section 8603 and Section 8604 of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2026 (Public Law 119–60).

Capital Litigation Improvement and Wrongful Conviction Review.—The agreement provides \$11,500,000 for Capital Litigation Improvement and Wrongful Conviction Review and adopts the Senate direction.

Improving Gun Crime Investigations.—The agreement provides \$13,000,000 for Project Safe Neighborhoods and, within these funds, encourages the Department to award grants at no less than the fiscal 2025 level for the implementation and development of automated ballistics imaging triage technology to support timely, evidence-based investigations of gun crimes. Such technology would assist law enforcement entities in rapidly scanning ballistics evidence, improving access to crime gun intelligence, and streamlining evidence submission to the National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN).

State Criminal Alien Assistance Program (SCAAP).—The agreement includes \$202,500,000 for SCAAP and notes that Public Law 119–21 provided additional grant funds to the Department “for initiatives associated with investigating and prosecuting violent crime; criminal enforcement initiatives; and immigration enforcement and removal efforts” and for the “temporary criminal detention of aliens”. The agreement notes that these purposes are aligned with the purposes of SCAAP which provides federal payments to states and localities that incurred correctional officer salary costs for incarcerating undocumented criminal aliens.

Forensic Genetic Genealogical (FGG) DNA.—Within amounts provided for the Office of Justice Programs, the agreement directs the Department to support efforts to use FGG to investigate unsolved violent crimes, without regard to the status of an applicant agency’s sexual assault kit inventory. Further, the Department is encouraged to revisit the FGG DNA Analysis 2019 Policy and to fund additional grants for the use of FGG technology under other appropriate programs including, but not limited to, the National Missing and Unidentified Persons System (NamUs) program.

Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Use Program (COSSUP).—The agreement provides \$12,000,000 within COSSUP for grants to local nonprofits preventing substance use and misuse. BJA shall provide awards to local non-profits working with law enforcement and community coalitions to educate youth in schools and in extracurricular programming on drug prevention. The agreement further directs the Department to prioritize nonprofit organizations with comprehensive approaches to combatting substance use, including investigations, treatment, and education.

Combating Violence and Hate Crimes at Houses of Worship and Faith-Based Organizations.—The agreement directs the Department to allocate no less than \$5,000,000 from the funds available under 34 U.S.C. 10157(b) to support State and local law enforcement agencies seeking to enhance security measures for at-risk religious institutions and to address the precipitous increases in hate crimes targeting individuals on the basis of religion.

Byrne Discretionary Community Project Grants/Byrne Discretionary Grants (“projects”).—The agreement provides \$537,978,926 for projects to prevent crime, improve the criminal justice system, provide victim services, and for other related activities. The agreement directs the Department to provide the funding for the projects listed in the table titled, “Community Project Funding/Congressionally Directed Spending” at the end of this joint explanatory statement in the corresponding amounts, which are incorporated by reference in this act.

School Resource Officers.—In lieu of the Senate report language, the agreement directs the COPS Office, within 180 days of the enactment of this Act, to provide a report detailing the requirements and procedures regarding written memoranda of understanding and training requirements, including clear definitions of officers' roles and responsibilities on campus for any COPS Hiring grant funds used to hire school resource officers. (L.C.)

Community Oriented Policing Services, Technology and Equipment Community Projects/COPS Law Enforcement Technology and Equipment ("projects").—The agreement provides \$401,406,387 for grants to state, local, Tribal, territorial, and other entities to develop and acquire effective equipment, technologies, and interoperable communications that assist in responding to and preventing crime. The agreement notes that the projects included in this statement should help improve police effectiveness and the flow of information among law enforcement agencies, local government service providers, and the communities they serve. Equipment funded under this program should meet any applicable requirements of the National Institute of Standards and Technology's Office of Law Enforcement Standards. The agreement directs the Department to provide the funding for the projects listed in the table titled, "Community Project Funding/Congressionally Directed Spending" at the end of this joint explanatory statement in the corresponding amounts, which are incorporated by reference in this act.

GENERAL PROVISIONS—DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

S

Section 201 makes available additional reception and representation funding for the Attorney General from the amounts provided in this title.

Section 202 prohibits the use of funds to pay for an abortion, except in the case of rape or incest, or to preserve the life of the mother.

Section 203 prohibits the use of funds to require any person to perform or facilitate the performance of an abortion.

Section 204 establishes that the Director of the Bureau of Prisons is obliged to provide escort services to an inmate receiving an abortion outside of a Federal facility, except where this obligation conflicts with the preceding section.

Section 205 establishes requirements and procedures for transfer proposals.

Section 206 prohibits the use of funds for transporting prisoners classified as maximum or high security, other than to a facility certified by the BOP as appropriately secure.

Section 207 prohibits the use of funds for the purchase or rental by Federal prisons of audiovisual or electronic media or equipment, services and materials used primarily for recreational purposes, except for those items and services needed for inmate training, religious, or educational purposes.

Section 208 requires review by the Deputy Attorney General and the Department Investment Review Board prior to the obligation or expenditure of funds for major information technology projects.

Section 209 requires the Department to follow reprogramming procedures prior to any deviation from the program amounts specified in this title or the reuse of specified deobligated funds provided in previous years.

Section 210 prohibits the use of funds for A-76 competitions for work performed by employees of BOP or Federal Prison Industries, Inc.

Section 211 prohibits U.S. Attorneys from holding additional responsibilities that exempt U.S. Attorneys from statutory residency requirements.

Section 212 permits up to 2 percent of grant funds made available to be used for criminal justice research, evaluation and statistics by the National Institute of Justice and the Bureau of Justice Statistics and designates up to 2 percent of grant funds for training and technical assistance.

Section 213 provides cost-share waivers for certain grant programs.

Section 214 waives the requirement that the Attorney General reserve certain funds from amounts provided for offender incarceration.

Section 215 prohibits funds, other than funds for the national instant criminal background check system established under the Brady Handgun Violence Prevention Act, from being used to facilitate the transfer of an operable firearm to a known or suspected agent of a drug cartel where law enforcement personnel do not continuously monitor or control such firearm.

Section 216 places limitations on the obligation of funds from certain DOJ accounts and funding sources.

Section 217 allows certain funding to be made available for use in Performance Partnership Pilots.

Section 218 establishes reporting requirements for the Department's Crime Victims Fund, the Working Capital Fund, the Three Percent Fund, and the Assets Forfeiture Fund.

Section 219 places limitations on the Department's performance of live tissue training.

Section 220 prohibits the Department from targeting or investigating parents who peacefully protest at school board meetings and are not suspected of engaging in unlawful activity.

Section 221 prohibits the Department from investigating or prosecuting religious institutions on the basis of their religious beliefs.

TITLE III

SCIENCE

OFFICE OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY POLICY

The agreement includes \$7,965,000 for the Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP).

Open Access.—The Committees recognize that OSTP may be in the process of repealing the August 25, 2022, Memorandum to Executive Departments and Agencies entitled, “Ensuring Free, Immediate, and Equitable Access to Federally Funded Research”. No later than 30 days after the enactment of this act, OSTP is directed to provide the Committees with a briefing on the status of this action.

Ensuring American Space Superiority.—No later than 60 days after the enactment of this act, OSTP shall provide the Committees a briefing detailing its plan to execute its responsibilities outlined in the Executive Order of December 18, 2025, entitled “Ensuring American Space Superiority”. OSTP is directed to assume any costs encumbered to date in support of the National Space Council.

NATIONAL AERONAUTICS AND SPACE ADMINISTRATION

The agreement includes \$24,438,336,000 for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA). The agreement retains the House and Senate directions to NASA to improve communications with the Committees about mission cost and schedule, including the House language requiring a briefing within 30 days of submission of its annual budget request on reserves, along with the confidence level, if appropriate, assumed in the proposed funding level for each directorate, theme, program, project, or activity, as well as the Senate’s direction to NASA to promptly inform the Committees of major reviews in addition to regular oversight in a timely fashion.

SCIENCE

The agreement includes \$7,250,000,000 for Science and directs NASA to provide funding as described in the subsequent table, which is codified in the bill, and detailed in the text below. The agreement expects that NASA will not propose to transfer Science funding out of the Directorate other than to Construction and Environmental Compliance and Restoration for construction needs related to the Directorate. The agreement continues support for the scientific value and exploration provided by NASA Science missions in Earth Science, Planetary Science, Astrophysics, Heliophysics, and Biological and Physical Sciences.

Commercial Satellite Data Acquisition (CSDA).—The agreement includes \$55,300,000 for CSDA.

Landsat Next.—The agreement provides \$110,000,000 for the Landsat Next mission. NASA shall continue development of the three superspectral instruments, with a launch target for the first satellite by the end of 2031, and the remaining two satellites phased thereafter, to ensure uninterrupted continuity of the Landsat data record and maximum use of the Landsat 9 and Landsat Next satellite series.

Earth System Modeling.—In preparing the plan required under this paragraph in the Senate report, NASA shall ensure that Goddard Institute for Space Studies (GISS) employees are able to continue work with minimal disruption, including by considering a physical location of GISS near its previous location that supports GISS's strong academic partnerships.

Commercial Lunar Payload Services (CLPS).—The agreement approves the proposed transfer of the CLPS program from the Science Mission Directorate (SMD) to the Exploration Systems Development Mission Directorate (ESDMD), and further direction is included within Exploration.

High End Computing Capability.—The agreement adopts Senate funding and direction regarding “High End Computing Capability” and accepts the proposal to consolidate the capability within Planetary Science.

Uranus Orbiter and Probe.—The agreement provides up to \$10,000,000 for formulation of the Uranus Orbiter and Probe mission.

Mars Future Missions.—As proposed in the budget, the agreement does not support the existing Mars Sample Return (MSR) program. However, the technological capabilities being developed in the MSR program are not only critical to the success of future science missions but also to human exploration of the Moon and Mars. Therefore, the agreement provides the request of \$110,000,000 for the Mars Future Missions program, including existing MSR efforts, to support radar, spectroscopy, entry, descent, and landing systems, and translational precursor technologies that will enable science missions for the next decade, including lunar and Mars missions. NASA shall coordinate efforts between SMD and ESDMD on the advancement of these important technologies.

Space Weather.—The agreement includes no less than the fiscal year 2024 enacted level for Space Weather.

Magnetospheric Multiscale (MMS) Mission.—The agreement provides no less than \$23,000,000 from within current and prior year resources to continue the MMS mission.

AERONAUTICS

The agreement includes \$935,000,000 for Aeronautics.

Advanced Air Mobility Systems.—The agreement includes up to \$10,000,000 for the Air Traffic Management eXploration safe autonomous flight enabling infrastructure.

Assured Autonomy Research.—The agreement includes up to \$12,000,000 to continue partnering with industry for the comprehensive research, development, test, and evaluation necessary to enable NASA's flight testing of avionics and related technologies to plan and implement flight demonstration tests with industry partners.

Advanced Materials Research.—The agreement adopts the Senate direction and provides not less than \$30,000,000 for High-Rate Composite Aircraft Manufacturing (HiCAM) and \$15,000,000 for Hi-Rate Ceramic Matrix Composites (CMCs).

Advancing a New Generation of Domestic Aircraft.—The agreement includes \$40,000,000 for the Electrified Powertrain Flight Demonstration project and adopts the House language.

SPACE TECHNOLOGY

The agreement includes \$920,500,000 for Space Technology.

Nuclear Thermal Propulsion (NTP).—The agreement provides not less than \$110,000,000 and up to \$120,000,000 for NTP and directs that NASA shall ensure that NTP efforts are integrated with NASA's human exploration missions, with a focus on supporting future crewed missions beyond low Earth orbit, including to Mars.

Nuclear Electric Propulsion (NEP).—The agreement includes up to \$50,000,000 for NEP to continue efforts toward the development of a high-power nuclear electric propulsion demonstration, of which up to \$10,000,000 is for the design of test articles to enable a flight demonstration. The agreement encourages NASA to consider the scalability of nuclear power conversion development to enhance reactor and radiator efficiency to support future missions.

Transfer to Exploration.—Not later than 90 days after enactment of this act, NASA is directed to submit a detailed plan outlining a development strategy for NTP and NEP as well as a proposal to transition nuclear propulsion activities from Space Technology to ESDMD's Mars

Campaign Office. NASA shall provide the organizational, budgetary, and contractual changes required to implement this transfer, including an updated program plan and schedule for the flight demonstration.

Flight Opportunities Program.—The agreement includes \$27,000,000 for the Flight Opportunities Program, including \$5,000,000 to support payload development and flight of K–12 and collegiate educational payloads.

Center for Robotics and Space Mobility.—The agreement adopts House and Senate language regarding “Center for Robotics and Space Mobility (ROMO)” within Space Technology to establish a center at the Goddard Space Flight Center and provides \$10,000,000.

Small Business Engagement.—The agreement encourages NASA to continue to obligate not less than 3.2 percent of its annual extramural research and development budget through awards to small businesses despite the current lapse in Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) authorization. If new SBIR or Small Business Technology Transfer authorization legislation is enacted that modifies the mandated level of support for small businesses, NASA shall ensure that it adheres to that new level.

EXPLORATION

The agreement includes \$7,783,000,000 for Exploration and allocates the funds as designated in the table below.

Artemis Campaign.—The agreement rejects the proposed termination of the Space Launch System (SLS) and Orion programs following Artemis III. In any future competition for Artemis launch services, the agreement directs NASA to include an SLS-based option, unless otherwise directed by Congress. The agreement further prohibits the reallocation of funds from the Artemis Moon to Mars Transportation account, unless and until a commercial alternative is demonstrated to meet or exceed the capabilities of the SLS and Orion systems. Not later 30 days of the enactment of this act, and quarterly thereafter, NASA shall provide the Committees a briefing detailing any updates on the Human Landing System (HLS) program, the progress made in the HLS program, any anticipated changes to program cost or schedule, and any other relevant issues related to the HLS program.

Fabrication Laboratory (FabLab) Demonstration.—In lieu of the House language the agreement adopts the Senate language on “In-Space Manufacturing” within Space Technology.

Commercial Lunar Payload Services.—The agreement accepts the transfer of CLPS from the SMD to Exploration (ESDMD) and provides a total of not less than \$250,000,000 for CLPS including up to \$65,000,000 provided in Planetary Science to ensure a smooth transition. Within 60 days of the enactment of this act, the agreement directs NASA to provide a briefing on any CLPS program modifications resulting from the move of the program from the SMD to ESDMD.

Fission Surface Power (FSP).—The agreement provides \$250,000,000 for FSP. The agreement directs NASA to brief the Committees semi-annually on NASA’s plans to advance this critical technology, including work with the Department of Energy, American universities, and the private sector to ensure that the ESDMD is leveraging all available sources of knowledge and expertise to meet NASA’s ambitious timeline for FSP maturation and deployment. The first such briefing shall be provided not less than 180 days after enactment of this act.

SPACE OPERATIONS

The agreement provides \$4,175,000,000 for Space Operations.

International Space Station (ISS).—For fiscal year 2026, \$1,490,000,000 is available for the ISS, \$1,240,000,000 in discretionary funding provided by this act, and \$250,000,000 provided in Public Law 119–21. The agreement includes House and Senate direction to maintain the fullest possible utilization of the ISS.

Commercial Low Earth Orbit Destinations (CLD).—The agreement provides \$273,200,000 for the CLD program. NASA is directed to brief the Committees no later than 60 days after the enactment of this act on its plans to ensure that at least one provider is available to provide services upon the decommissioning of the International Space Station (ISS).

Space Cargo Vehicle Emergency Crew Return Capability.—The agreement includes up to \$5,000,000 for modification and certification activities necessary to convert a U.S. commercial cargo reentry vehicle to safely reenter and land crew on a runway within the continental United States.

Small Satellite Cross-Link Systems.—The agreement includes \$10,000,000 to align NASA’s relay networks to transmit large volumes of science and Earth remote sensing data to users via high-speed (V-band), low latency links. This should provide an expanded educational opportunity for individuals studying SmallSat Cross-Link Systems.

Space Communications.—The agreement includes not less than then fiscal year 2024 enacted level for the Near Space Network and Deep Space Network and includes the House direction and funding level under the heading “NASA Near Space Network (NSN) and Deep Space Network (DSN) Services”.

SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING, AND MATHEMATICS ENGAGEMENT

The agreement includes \$143,000,000 for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) Engagement, and allocates the funds as designated in the table below.

SAFETY, SECURITY AND MISSION SERVICES

The agreement includes \$3,000,000,000 for Safety, Security and Mission Services (SSMS).

NASA Headquarters.—The agreement directs NASA to provide a briefing on the future of NASA Headquarters, including any plans for NASA to move staff outside of the Washington D.C. region, within 180 days of the enactment of this act.

Goddard Space Flight Center Consolidation.—The Committees have reviewed reports regarding facility and building closures at NASA Goddard Space Flight Center's Greenbelt campus and are concerned about potential negative impacts to operations and capabilities at the Center. The agreement directs NASA to preserve all the technical and scientific world-class capabilities at Goddard, including those that will be used to complete any mission funded in fiscal year 2026 by Congress during any campus consolidation. In addition, the agreement directs NASA to, no later than 30 days after the enactment of this act, contract a study with the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine regarding the current technical and scientific capabilities housed at Goddard, what capabilities are positioned to ensure long-term success of the NASA mission, including for future cutting-edge scientific discovery and crewed space exploration, and what facilities are needed to house and operate those capabilities.

NASA Community Projects/NASA Special Projects.—Within the appropriation for SSMS, the agreement provides \$58,417,135 for NASA Community Projects/NASA Special Projects. The agreement directs NASA to provide the funding for the projects listed in the table titled, "Community Project Funding/Congressionally Directed Spending" at the end of this joint explanatory statement in the corresponding amounts. The agreement further directs NASA to perform the same level of oversight and due diligence as with any other external partners.

CONSTRUCTION AND ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE AND RESTORATION

The agreement includes \$185,336,000 for Construction and Environmental Compliance and Restoration.

OFFICE OF INSPECTOR GENERAL

The agreement includes \$46,500,000 for the Office of Inspector General.

ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

(INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

The agreement allows for certain transfers of funds.

The agreement includes a provision providing NASA the authority to combine amounts from one or more of its Science, Aeronautics, Space Technology, Exploration, and Space Operations appropriations with amounts from the STEM Engagement appropriation to jointly fund discrete projects or activities, through contracts, grants, or cooperative agreements, that serve these purposes. NASA is directed to provide notification of the Agency's intent to award a contract, grant, or cooperative agreement that would be jointly funded under this authority, no less than 15 days prior to award.

The agreement permits a transfer of funds into NASA's Working Capital Fund.

The agreement includes bill language creating a NASA Nonrecurring Expenses Fund.

NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION

The agreement includes \$8,750,000,000 for the National Science Foundation (NSF).

RESEARCH AND RELATED ACTIVITIES

The agreement includes \$7,176,500,000 for Research and Related Activities (R&RA). In developing the spending plan and allocating funds, the agreement directs NSF to equitably distribute funding to support all basic research directorates within R&RA, as well as the Technology, Innovation and Partnerships Directorate. No directorate shall receive more than a 5 percent reduction relative to the fiscal year 2024 enacted level.

Established Program to Stimulate Competitive Research (EPSCoR).—The agreement provides \$250,000,000 for the EPSCoR program and adopts the direction in both the House and Senate reports.

Regional Innovation Engines (NSF Engines).—The agreement provides up to \$200,000,000 for the NSF Engines.

National Artificial Intelligence Research Resource (NAIRR) Pilot Program.—The agreement provides \$30,000,000 for the NAIRR.

Astronomy and Astrophysics Decadal Survey Priority Facilities.—The agreement provides not less than \$30,000,000 for NSF to support the development of next generation astronomy facilities recommended in the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine Decadal Survey on Astronomy and Astrophysics 2020 (Astro2020) and adopts House and Senate direction. The agreement also reiterates Senate direction that NSF shall immediately advance both U.S. Extremely Large Telescopes into final design review, at no cost to the Federal Government. Not later than 45 days after enactment of this act, NSF shall brief the Committees about how the Foundation intends to implement this congressional direction and adopts House direction requesting regular program updates thereafter.

HBCUs Excellence in Research.—The agreement provides \$25,000,000 for the HBCUs Excellence in Research program.

Laser Interferometer Gravitational-Wave Observatory (LIGO).—The agreement adopts Senate direction on LIGO and provides not less than \$49,000,000.

The agreement provides \$251,000,000 for Major Research Equipment and Facilities Construction to support the Antarctic Infrastructure Recapitalization, the Leadership-Class Computing Facility, and Mid-scale Research Infrastructure.

STEM EDUCATION

The agreement includes \$938,250,000 for STEM Education.

NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION STEM EDUCATION

AGENCY OPERATIONS AND AWARD MANAGEMENT

The agreement includes \$355,000,000 for Agency Operations and Award Management (AOAM) and accepts NSF's proposal to shift budget activities with an agency-wide benefit from AOAM to R&RA.

OFFICE OF THE NATIONAL SCIENCE BOARD

The agreement includes \$5,090,000 for the National Science Board.

OFFICE OF INSPECTOR GENERAL

The agreement includes \$24,160,000 for the Office of Inspector General.

ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The agreement includes two administrative provisions. The first establishes thresholds for the transfer of funds. The second provision is regarding notification prior to acquisition or disposal of certain assets.

The agreement includes \$14,350,000 for the Commission on Civil Rights.

EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY COMMISSION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes \$435,382,000 for the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC).

Client Privacy.—In lieu of the directive under this caption in the Senate report, the agreement directs EEOC to report to the Committees, within 60 days after the enactment of this act, on measures the Commission is undertaking to control access from other governmental entities to personal EEOC inquiry and charge information.

INTERNATIONAL TRADE COMMISSION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes \$122,000,000 for the International Trade Commission (ITC).

LEGAL SERVICES CORPORATION

PAYMENT TO THE LEGAL SERVICES CORPORATION

The agreement includes \$540,000,000 for the Legal Services Corporation (LSC).

ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

The bill includes language permitting LSC grantees to operate with boards of directors composed of no less than 33 percent attorneys without requiring appointment by bar associations.

MARINE MAMMAL COMMISSION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes \$4,300,000 for the Marine Mammal Commission.

OFFICE OF THE UNITED STATES TRADE REPRESENTATIVE

The agreement includes a total of \$88,000,000 for the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR).

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes \$65,000,000 for the salaries and expenses of USTR.

TRADE ENFORCEMENT TRUST FUND
(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The agreement includes \$23,000,000, which is to be derived from the Trade Enforcement Trust Fund, for trade enforcement activities and transfers authorized by the Trade Facilitation and Trade Enforcement Act of 2015.

STATE JUSTICE INSTITUTE

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement includes \$7,640,000 for the State Justice Institute.

TITLE V

GENERAL PROVISIONS

(INCLUDING TRANSFERS AND RESCISSIONS OF FUNDS)

The agreement includes the following general provisions:

Section 501 prohibits the use of funds for publicity or propaganda purposes unless expressly authorized by law.

Section 502 prohibits any appropriation contained in this act from remaining available for obligation beyond the current fiscal year unless expressly provided.

Section 503 provides that the expenditure of any appropriation contained in this act for any consulting service through procurement contracts shall be limited to those contracts where such expenditures are a matter of public record and available for public inspection, except where otherwise provided under existing law or existing Executive order issued pursuant to existing law.

Section 504 provides that if any provision of this act or the application of such provision to any person or circumstance shall be held invalid, the remainder of this act and the application of other provisions shall not be affected.

Section 505 prohibits a reprogramming of funds that: (1) creates or initiates a new program, project, or activity; (2) eliminates a program, project, or activity; (3) increases funds or personnel by any means for any project or activity for which funds have been denied or restricted; (4) relocates an office or employee; (5) reorganizes or renames offices, programs, or activities; (6) contracts out or privatizes any function or activity presently performed by Federal employees; (7) augments funds for existing programs, projects, or activities in excess of \$500,000 or 10 percent, whichever is less, or reduces by 10 percent funding for any existing program, project, or activity, or numbers of personnel by 10 percent; or (8) results from any general savings, including savings from a reduction in personnel, which would result in a change in existing programs, projects, or activities as approved by Congress; unless the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations are notified 15 days in advance of such reprogramming of funds.

Section 506 provides that if it is determined that any person intentionally affixes a “Made in America” label to any product that was not made in America that person shall not be eligible to receive any contract or subcontract with funds made available in this act. The section further provides that to the extent practicable, with respect to purchases of promotional items, funds made available under this act shall be used to purchase items manufactured, produced, or assembled in the United States or its territories or possessions.

Section 507 requires quarterly reporting to Congress on the status of balances of appropriations.

Section 508 provides that any costs incurred by a department or agency funded under this act resulting from, or to prevent, personnel actions taken in response to funding reductions in this act, or, for the Department of Commerce, from actions taken for the care and protection of loan collateral or grant property, shall be absorbed within the budgetary resources available to the department or agency, and provides transfer authority between appropriation accounts to carry out this provision, subject to reprogramming procedures.

Section 509 prohibits funds made available in this act from being used to promote the sale or export of tobacco or tobacco products or to seek the reduction or removal of foreign restrictions on the marketing of tobacco products, except for restrictions which are not applied equally to all tobacco or tobacco products of the same type. This provision is not intended to impact routine international trade services to all U.S. citizens, including the processing of applications to establish foreign trade zones.

Section 510 stipulates the obligations of certain receipts deposited into the Crime Victims Fund.

Section 511 prohibits the use of DOJ funds for programs that discriminate against or denigrate the religious or moral beliefs of students participating in such programs.

Section 512 prohibits the transfer of funds in this agreement to any department, agency, or instrumentality of the United States Government, except for transfers made by, or pursuant to authorities provided in, this agreement or any other appropriations act.

Section 513 requires certain timetables of audits performed by Inspectors General of the Departments of Commerce and Justice, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, the

National Science Foundation and the Legal Services Corporation and sets limits and restrictions on the awarding and use of grants or contracts funded by amounts appropriated by this act.

Section 514 prohibits funds for acquisition of certain information systems unless the acquiring department or agency has reviewed and assessed certain risks. Any acquisition of such an information system is contingent upon the development of a risk mitigation strategy and a determination that the acquisition is in the national interest. Each department or agency covered under section 514 shall submit a quarterly report to the Committees on Appropriations describing reviews and assessments of risk made pursuant to this section and any associated findings or determinations.

Section 515 prohibits the use of funds in this act to support or justify the use of torture by any official or contract employee of the United States Government.

Section 516 prohibits the use of funds to include certain language in trade agreements.

Section 517 prohibits the use of funds in this act to authorize or issue a National Security Letter (NSL) in contravention of certain laws authorizing the FBI to issue NSLs.

Section 518 requires congressional notification for any project within the Departments of Commerce or Justice, the National Science Foundation, or the National Aeronautics and Space Administration totaling more than \$75,000,000 that has cost increases of 10 percent or more.

Section 519 deems funds for intelligence or intelligence-related activities as authorized by the Congress until the enactment of the Intelligence Authorization Act for fiscal year 2026.

Section 520 prohibits contracts or grant awards in excess of \$5,000,000 unless the prospective contractor or grantee certifies that the organization has filed all Federal tax returns, has not been convicted of a criminal offense under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, and has no unpaid Federal tax assessment.

(RESCSSIONS)

Section 521 provides for rescissions of unobligated balances.

Section 522 prohibits the use of funds in this act for the purchase of first class or premium air travel in contravention of the Code of Federal Regulations.

Section 523 prohibits the use of funds to pay for the attendance of more than 50 department or agency employees, who are stationed in the United States, at any single conference outside the United States, unless the conference is: (1) a law enforcement training or operational event where the majority of Federal attendees are law enforcement personnel stationed outside the United

States; (2) a scientific conference for which the department or agency head has notified the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations that such attendance is in the national interest, along with the basis for such determination.

Section 524 requires any department, agency, or instrumentality of the United States Government receiving funds appropriated under this act to track and report on undisbursed balances in expired grant accounts.

Section 525 requires, when practicable, the use of funds in this act to purchase light bulbs that have the “Energy Star” or “Federal Energy Management Program” designation.

Section 526 prohibits the use of funds by NASA or OSTP to engage in bilateral activities with China or a Chinese-owned company or effectuate the hosting of official Chinese visitors at certain facilities unless the activities are authorized by subsequent legislation or NASA or OSTP have made a certification pursuant to subsections (c) and (d) of this section.

Section 527 prohibits the use of funds to establish or maintain a computer network that does not block pornography, except for law enforcement and victim assistance purposes.

Section 528 requires the departments and agencies funded in this act to submit spending plans.

Section 529 prohibits funds to pay for award or incentive fees for contractors with below satisfactory performance or performance that fails to meet the basic requirements of the contract. The heads of executive branch departments, agencies, boards, and commissions funded by this act are directed to require that all contracts within their purview that provide award fees link such fees to successful acquisition outcomes, specifying the terms of cost, schedule, and performance.

Section 530 prohibits the use of funds by DOJ or DEA in contravention of a certain section of the Agricultural Act of 2014.

Section 531 prohibits DOJ from preventing certain states from implementing state laws regarding the use of medical marijuana.

Section 532 requires quarterly reports from the Department of Commerce, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, and the National Science Foundation of travel to China.

Section 533 requires 10 percent of the funds for certain programs be allocated for assistance in persistent poverty counties.

Section 534 prohibits the use of funds in this act to require certain export licenses.

Section 535 prohibits the use of funds in this act to deny certain import applications regarding “curios or relics” firearms, parts, or ammunition.

Section 536 prohibits funds from being used to deny the importation of shotgun models if no application for the importation of such models, in the same configuration, had been denied prior to January 1, 2011, on the basis that the shotgun was not particularly suitable for or readily adaptable to sporting purposes.

Section 537 prohibits the use of funds to implement the Arms Trade Treaty until the Senate approves a resolution of ratification for the Treaty.

Section 538 includes language regarding detainees held at Guantanamo Bay.

Section 539 includes language regarding facilities for housing detainees held at Guantanamo Bay.

Section 540 provides that the Department of Commerce and FBI may utilize funding to provide payments pursuant to section 901(i)(2) of title IX of division J of the Further Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2020.

Section 541 sets certain requirements for the allocations of funds related to the CHIPS Act of 2022 (Public Law 117-167).

Section 542 provides that the Department of Commerce, NASA, and NSF continue to apply the negotiated indirect costs rates.

Section 543 prohibits the use of funds made available by this act to move a Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives facility.

Section 544 includes repurposing amounts for Department of Commerce.

DISCLOSURE OF EARMARKS AND CONGRESSIONALLY DIRECTED SPENDING ITEMS

Following is a list of congressional earmarks and congressionally directed spending items (as defined in clause 9 of rule XXI of the Rules of the House of Representatives and rule XLIV of the Standing Rules of the Senate, respectively) included in the bill or this explanatory statement, along with the name of each House Member, Senator, Delegate, or Resident Commissioner who submitted a request to the Committee of jurisdiction for each item so identified. For each item, a Member is required to provide a certification that neither the Member nor the Member's immediate family has a financial interest, and each Senator is required to provide a certification that neither the Senator nor the Senator's immediate family has a pecuniary interest in such congressionally directed spending item. Neither the bill nor the explanatory statement contains any limited tax benefits or limited tariff benefits as defined in the applicable House and Senate rules.
