The Committee on Rules, having had under consideration House Resolution ____, by a record vote of 8 to 4, report the same to the House with the recommendation that the resolution be adopted.

SUMMARY OF PROVISIONS OF THE RESOLUTION

The resolution provides for consideration of H.R. 8646, the Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agency Appropriations Act, 2027, under a structured rule. The resolution waives all points of order against consideration of the bill. The resolution provides one hour of general debate equally divided and controlled by the chair and ranking minority member of the Committee on Appropriations or their respective designees. The resolution provides that the bill shall be considered as read. The resolution waives all points of order against provisions in the bill for failure to comply with clause 2 or clause 5(a) of rule XXI. The resolution makes in order only those amendments printed in the report, amendments en bloc described in section 3, and pro forma amendments described in section 4. Each amendment shall be considered only in the order printed in the report, may be offered only by a Member designated in the report, shall be considered as read, shall be debatable for the time specified in the report equally divided and controlled by the proponent and an opponent, shall not be subject to amendment except as provided by section 4 of the resolution, and shall not be subject to a demand for division of the question. All points of order against the amendments printed in the report or amendments en bloc described in section 3 of the resolution are waived. The resolution provides that the chair of the Committee on Appropriations or his designee may offer amendments en bloc consisting of amendments printed in the report not earlier disposed of. Amendments en bloc shall be considered as read, shall be debatable for 20 minutes equally divided and controlled by the chair and ranking minority member of the Committee on Appropriations or their respective designees, shall not be subject to amendment except as provided by section 4 of the resolution, and shall not be subject to a demand for division of the question. The resolution provides that the chair and ranking minority member of the Committee on Appropriations or their respective designees may offer up to 10 pro forma amendments each at any point for the purpose of debate. The resolution provides for one motion to recommit. The resolution further provides for consideration of H.R. 7726, the Stop Child Care Scams Act of 2026, under a closed rule. The resolution waives all points of order against consideration of the bill. The resolution provides that, in lieu of the amendment in the nature of a substitute recommended by the Committee on Education and Workforce now printed in the bill, an amendment in the nature of a substitute consisting of the text of Rules Committee Print 119-32 shall be considered as adopted and the bill, as amended, shall be considered as read. The resolution waives all points of order against provisions in the bill, as amended. The resolution provides one hour of general debate equally divided and controlled by the chair and ranking minority member of the Committee on Education and Workforce or their respective designees. SUMMARY OF THE AMENDMENTS TO H.R. 8646 MADE IN ORDER

1. Boebert (CO): Redirects \$2 million in funding from Office of General Counsel to the Office of the Inspector General to prevent waste, fraud, and abuse. (10 minutes)
2. Boebert (CO): Redirects \$2 million in funding from FPAC Business Center to the Farm Service Agency (10 minutes)
3. Boebert (CO): Redirects \$2 million in funding from Office of the Chief Information Officer to Rural Development Programs (10 minutes)
4. Boebert (CO): Redirects \$2 million in funding from Office of the Chief Information Officer to Rural Utilities Service (10 minutes)
5. Boebert (CO): Redirects \$2 million in funding from Office of the Chief Information Officer to the Natural Resources Conservation Service Conservation Operations (10 minutes)
6. Buchanan (FL), Carter (LA): Increases and decreases the USDA Office of Inspector General by \$2 million for the purposes of enforcing existing animal fighting statutes. (10 minutes)
7. Figures (AL): Increases and decreases the United States Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC) account by \$2 million to encourage the CFTC to create a pilot program focused on improving digital access and financial literacy in rural communities. (10 minutes)
8. Figures (AL): Increases and decreases the Distance Learning, Telemedicine, and Broadband Program account by \$1 million to prioritize telemedicine and distance learning grant applications from rural applicants located more than 30 miles from a federally qualified health center or community mental health center, with a focus on those providing mental health and substance use disorder services. (10 minutes)
9. Flood (NE), Lee (NV), Bacon (NE): Redirects \$500,000 from the Office of the Chief Financial Officer to support the National Drought Mitigation Center to maintain and update critical drought-related tools used by producers, water-managers, and USDA; enhance new monitoring and modeling; and support USDA in anticipating and reducing the effects of extreme weather on U.S. agricultural producers, livestock, and the economy. (10 minutes)
10. Gosar (AZ), Biggs (AZ): Transfers \$2 million from the Chief Information Officer to APHIS port of entry inspections for New World Screwworm. (10 minutes)
11. Leger Fernández (NM), Peters (CA), Carbajal (CA): Increases and decreases funding for the Agricultural Research Service by \$1,000,000 for the purpose of a conducting a comprehensive study on large-scale algae-based production for agricultural and livestock uses. (10 minutes)
12. Malliotakis (NY), Gosar (AZ), Lieu (CA), Mace (SC): Prohibits funding for the Center for Drug Evaluation and Research, Center for Biologics Evaluation and Research, or Center for Devices and Radiological Health within the Food and Drug Administration to issue or finalize guidance recommending or requiring testing in dogs. (10 minutes)

13. Malliotakis (NY), Mace (SC), Lieu (CA): Prohibits the National Institute of Food and Agriculture within the Department of Agriculture from funding painful research on dogs and cats. (10 minutes)
14. Ogles (TN): Ensures FDA does not deprioritize review, inspection, import screening, or shortage-mitigation activities for sterile injectable cancer drugs that are currently listed in shortage and keeps the agency focused on restoring access to critical cancer treatments without weakening FDA's safety standards. (10 minutes)
15. Ogles (TN): Prevents FDA from requiring a separate REMS safety program for a biosimilar when FDA has already determined the biosimilar and reference product present the same serious risks and require the same safety controls. It reduces duplicative regulatory burdens that can delay lower-cost biosimilar competition without weakening FDA's underlying safety authority. (10 minutes)
16. Pettersen (CO), Moolenaar (MI): Increases and decreases the National Institute of Food and Agriculture, Research and Education Activities by \$10,000,000 for the purposes of research using data and tools available from commercial weather services for wildfire and drought mitigation measures. (10 minutes)
17. Stanton (AZ), Vasquez (NM): Increases and decreases the Farm Services Agency account by \$5 million to provide funding for USDA to revise the Livestock Indemnity Program and Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program to provide compensation to producers for both confirmed and probable Mexican wolf attacks on livestock. (10 minutes)
18. Stanton (AZ): Increases and decreases funding for the Agricultural Research Service by \$2 million for the purpose of conducting research on soil erosion and soil health in the arid and semiarid West to reduce risk of exposure to coccidioidomycosis, or "Valley Fever." (10 minutes)
19. Steube (FL): Strikes funding (\$900,000,000) for Food for Peace Title II Grants, transfers to Spending Reduction Account. (10 minutes)
20. Steube (FL): Strikes provision providing \$240,000,000 for the McGovern-Dole International Food for Education and Child Nutrition Program Grants. (10 minutes)
21. Subramanyam (VA): Increase and decrease the value-added agricultural product market development grants account by \$10,000,000 to emphasize the importance of value-added agricultural businesses and agritourism farms in the health of American farm economy. (10 minutes)
22. Sykes (OH): Increases and decreases funding for the Food and Drug Administration by \$1 million to emphasize the importance of infant formula and toddler food safety and to demonstrate support for the FDA to consider requiring manufacturers to implement an environmental monitoring regime for contaminants, including *cronobacter* spp., salmonella, and botulism. (10 minutes)
23. Thompson (CA), Valadao (CA), Costa (CA): Increases/Decreases \$7,000,000 to APHIS Account to provide needed funding to address the Glassy Wing Sharp Shooter infestation discovered in California. (10 minutes)
24. Thompson (PA): Provides \$2 million to fund the Grants for Youth Organizations program. Decreases the Office of the General Counsel by \$2 million. (10 minutes)
