

James P. Ziliak, Ph.D.

Dr. James P. Ziliak holds the Carol Martin Gatton Endowed Chair in Microeconomics in the Department of Economics at the University of Kentucky, where he is also Founding Director of the Center for Poverty Research. He received BA and BS degrees in economics and sociology from Purdue University, and his Ph.D. in Economics from Indiana University. He served as assistant and associate professor of economics at the University of Oregon, and has held visiting positions at the Brookings Institution, University College London, University of Michigan, and University of Wisconsin. His research expertise is in the areas of labor economics, poverty, food insecurity, and tax and transfer policy. He currently is the PI on the *Research Program in Childhood Hunger*, funded by the Food and Nutrition Service in the USDA, and the *FoodAPS Research Initiative*, funded by the Economic Research Service in the USDA. He served as a member of the Institute of Medicine *Committee on Examination of the Adequacy of Food Resources and SNAP Allotments*, and as Chair of the National Academies of Science, Committee on National Statistics *Workshop on Research Gaps and Opportunities on the Causes and Consequences of Child Hunger*. He edited the volumes *Welfare Reform and its Long Term Consequences for America's Poor* published by Cambridge University Press (2009) and *Appalachian Legacy: Economic Opportunity after the War on Poverty* published by Brookings Institution Press (2012). He also served as co-editor of *Income Volatility and Food Assistance in the United States* (W.E. Upjohn Institute, 2008) and the forthcoming book *SNAP Matters: How Food Stamps Affect Health and Well Being* (Stanford University Press, 2015).
