A BILL

Making appropriations for the Departments of Commerce and Justice, Science, and Related Agencies for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2018, and for other purposes.

1 or improvement; purchase or construction of temporary
2 demountable exhibition structures for use abroad; pay-
3 ment of tort claims, in the manner authorized in the first
4 paragraph of section 2672 of title 28, United States Code,
5 when such claims arise in foreign countries; not to exceed
6 \$294,300 for official representation expenses abroad; pur-
7 chase of passenger motor vehicles for official use abroad,
8 not to exceed \$45,000 per vehicle; obtaining insurance on
9 official motor vehicles; and rental of tie lines,
10 \$480,000,000, to remain available until September 30,
11 2019, of which \$13,000,000 is to be derived from fees to
12 be retained and used by the International Trade Adminis-
13 tration, notwithstanding section 3302 of title 31, United
14 States Code: *Provided*, That, of amounts provided under
15 this heading, not less than \$16,400,000 shall be for China
16 antidumping and countervailing duty enforcement and
17 compliance activities: *Provided further*, That the provisions
18 of the first sentence of section 105(f) and all of section
19 108(c) of the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange
20 Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2455(f) and 2458(c)) shall apply
21 in carrying out these activities; and that for the purpose
22 of this Act, contributions under the provisions of the Mu-
23 tual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961 shall
24 include payment for assessments for services provided as
25 part of these activities.

1 BUREAU OF INDUSTRY AND SECURITY
2 OPERATIONS AND ADMINISTRATION

3 For necessary expenses for export administration and
4 national security activities of the Department of Com-
5 merce, including costs associated with the performance of
6 export administration field activities both domestically and
7 abroad; full medical coverage for dependent members of
8 immediate families of employees stationed overseas; em-
9 ployment of citizens of the United States and aliens by
10 contract for services abroad; payment of tort claims, in
11 the manner authorized in the first paragraph of section
12 2672 of title 28, United States Code, when such claims
13 arise in foreign countries; not to exceed \$13,500 for offi-
14 cial representation expenses abroad; awards of compensa-
15 tion to informers under the Export Administration Act of
16 1979, and as authorized by section 1(b) of the Act of June
17 15, 1917 (40 Stat. 223; 22 U.S.C. 401(b)); and purchase
18 of passenger motor vehicles for official use and motor vehi-
19 cles for law enforcement use with special requirement vehi-
20 cles eligible for purchase without regard to any price limi-
21 tation otherwise established by law, \$112,500,000, to re-
22 main available until expended: *Provided*, That the provi-
23 sions of the first sentence of section 105(f) and all of sec-
24 tion 108(c) of the Mutual Educational and Cultural Ex-
25 change Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2455(f) and 2458(c)) shall

1 apply in carrying out these activities: *Provided further*,
2 That payments and contributions collected and accepted
3 for materials or services provided as part of such activities
4 may be retained for use in covering the cost of such activi-
5 ties, and for providing information to the public with re-
6 spect to the export administration and national security
7 activities of the Department of Commerce and other ex-
8 port control programs of the United States and other gov-
9 ernments.

10 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION

11 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

12 For grants for economic development assistance as
13 provided by the Public Works and Economic Development
14 Act of 1965, for trade adjustment assistance, and for
15 grants authorized by section 27 of the Stevenson-Wydler
16 Technology Innovation Act of 1980 (15 U.S.C. 3722),
17 \$140,000,000, to remain available until expended.

18 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

19 For necessary expenses of administering the eco-
20 nomic development assistance programs as provided for by
21 law, \$36,000,000: *Provided*, That these funds may be used
22 to monitor projects approved pursuant to title I of the
23 Public Works Employment Act of 1976, title II of the
24 Trade Act of 1974, section 27 of the Stevenson-Wydler

1 Technology Innovation Act of 1980 (15 U.S.C. 3722), and
2 the Community Emergency Drought Relief Act of 1977.

3 MINORITY BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT AGENCY

4 MINORITY BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

5 For necessary expenses of the Department of Com-
6 merce in fostering, promoting, and developing minority
7 business enterprise, including expenses of grants, con-
8 tracts, and other agreements with public or private organi-
9 zations, \$34,000,000.

10 BUREAU OF ECONOMIC ANALYSIS

11 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

12 For necessary expenses, as authorized by law, of eco-
13 nomic and statistical analysis programs of the Department
14 of Commerce, \$96,000,000, to remain available until Sep-
15 tember 30, 2019.

16 BUREAU OF THE CENSUS

17 CURRENT SURVEYS AND PROGRAMS

18 For necessary expenses for collecting, compiling, ana-
19 lyzing, preparing and publishing statistics, provided for by
20 law, \$256,000,000: *Provided*, That, from amounts pro-
21 vided herein, funds may be used for promotion, outreach,
22 and marketing activities: *Provided further*, That the Bu-
23 reau of the Census shall collect and analyze data for the
24 Annual Social and Economic Supplement to the Current
25 Population Survey using the same health insurance ques-

1 tions included in previous years, in addition to the revised
2 questions implemented in the Current Population Survey
3 beginning in February 2014.

4 PERIODIC CENSUSES AND PROGRAMS
5 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

6 For necessary expenses for collecting, compiling, ana-
7 lyzing, preparing and publishing statistics for periodic cen-
8 suses and programs provided for by law, \$1,251,000,000,
9 to remain available until September 30, 2019: *Provided*,
10 That, from amounts provided herein, funds may be used
11 for promotion, outreach, and marketing activities: *Pro-*
12 *vided further*, That within the amounts appropriated,
13 \$2,580,000 shall be transferred to the “Office of Inspector
14 General” account for activities associated with carrying
15 out investigations and audits related to the Bureau of the
16 Census: *Provided further*, That not more than 50 percent
17 of the amounts made available under this heading for in-
18 formation technology related to 2020 census delivery, in-
19 cluding the Census Enterprise Data Collection and Proc-
20 essing (CEDCaP) program, may be obligated until the
21 Secretary submits to the Committees on Appropriations
22 of the House of Representatives and the Senate a plan
23 for expenditure that: (1) identifies for each CEDCaP
24 project/investment over \$25,000: (A) the functional and
25 performance capabilities to be delivered and the mission

1 benefits to be realized; (B) the estimated lifecycle cost, in-
2 cluding estimates for development as well as maintenance
3 and operations; and (C) key milestones to be met; (2) de-
4 tails for each project/investment: (A) reasons for any cost
5 and schedule variances; and (B) top risks and mitigation
6 strategies; and (3) has been submitted to the Government
7 Accountability Office.

8 NATIONAL TELECOMMUNICATIONS AND INFORMATION

9 ADMINISTRATION

10 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

11 For necessary expenses, as provided for by law, of
12 the National Telecommunications and Information Ad-
13 ministration (NTIA), \$30,000,000: *Provided*, That, not-
14 withstanding 31 U.S.C. 1535(d), the Secretary of Com-
15 merce shall charge Federal agencies for costs incurred in
16 spectrum management, analysis, operations, and related
17 services, and such fees shall be retained and used as off-
18 setting collections for costs of such spectrum services, to
19 remain available until expended: *Provided further*, That
20 the Secretary of Commerce is authorized to retain and use
21 as offsetting collections all funds transferred, or previously
22 transferred, from other Government agencies for all costs
23 incurred in telecommunications research, engineering, and
24 related activities by the Institute for Telecommunication
25 Sciences of NTIA, in furtherance of its assigned functions

1 under this paragraph, and such funds received from other
2 Government agencies shall remain available until ex-
3 pended.

4 PUBLIC TELECOMMUNICATIONS FACILITIES, PLANNING
5 AND CONSTRUCTION

6 For the administration of prior-year grants, recov-
7 eries and unobligated balances of funds previously appro-
8 priated are available for the administration of all open
9 grants until their expiration.

10 UNITED STATES PATENT AND TRADEMARK OFFICE

11 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

12 (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

13 For necessary expenses of the United States Patent
14 and Trademark Office (USPTO) provided for by law, in-
15 cluding defense of suits instituted against the Under Sec-
16 retary of Commerce for Intellectual Property and Director
17 of the USPTO, \$3,500,000,000, to remain available until
18 expended: *Provided*, That the sum herein appropriated
19 from the general fund shall be reduced as offsetting collec-
20 tions of fees and surcharges assessed and collected by the
21 USPTO under any law are received during fiscal year
22 2018, so as to result in a fiscal year 2018 appropriation
23 from the general fund estimated at \$0: *Provided further*,
24 That during fiscal year 2018, should the total amount of
25 such offsetting collections be less than \$3,500,000,000

1 this amount shall be reduced accordingly: *Provided fur-*
2 *ther*, That any amount received in excess of
3 \$3,500,000,000 in fiscal year 2018 and deposited in the
4 Patent and Trademark Fee Reserve Fund shall remain
5 available until expended: *Provided further*, That the Direc-
6 tor of USPTO shall submit a spending plan to the Com-
7 mittees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives
8 and the Senate for any amounts made available by the
9 preceding proviso and such spending plan shall be treated
10 as a reprogramming under section 505 of this Act and
11 shall not be available for obligation or expenditure except
12 in compliance with the procedures set forth in that section:
13 *Provided further*, That any amounts reprogrammed in ac-
14 cordance with the preceding proviso shall be transferred
15 to the United States Patent and Trademark Office “Sala-
16 ries and Expenses” account: *Provided further*, That from
17 amounts provided herein, not to exceed \$900 shall be
18 made available in fiscal year 2018 for official reception
19 and representation expenses: *Provided further*, That in fis-
20 cal year 2018 from the amounts made available for “Sala-
21 ries and Expenses” for the USPTO, the amounts nec-
22 essary to pay (1) the difference between the percentage
23 of basic pay contributed by the USPTO and employees
24 under section 8334(a) of title 5, United States Code, and
25 the normal cost percentage (as defined by section

1 8331(17) of that title) as provided by the Office of Per-
2 sonnel Management (OPM) for USPTO’s specific use, of
3 basic pay, of employees subject to subchapter III of chap-
4 ter 83 of that title, and (2) the present value of the other-
5 wise unfunded accruing costs, as determined by OPM for
6 USPTO’s specific use of post-retirement life insurance
7 and post-retirement health benefits coverage for all
8 USPTO employees who are enrolled in Federal Employees
9 Health Benefits (FEHB) and Federal Employees Group
10 Life Insurance (FEGLI), shall be transferred to the Civil
11 Service Retirement and Disability Fund, the FEGLI
12 Fund, and the FEHB Fund, as appropriate, and shall be
13 available for the authorized purposes of those accounts:
14 *Provided further*, That any differences between the present
15 value factors published in OPM’s yearly 300 series benefit
16 letters and the factors that OPM provides for USPTO’s
17 specific use shall be recognized as an imputed cost on
18 USPTO’s financial statements, where applicable: *Provided*
19 *further*, That, notwithstanding any other provision of law,
20 all fees and surcharges assessed and collected by USPTO
21 are available for USPTO only pursuant to section 42(c)
22 of title 35, United States Code, as amended by section
23 22 of the Leahy-Smith America Invents Act (Public Law
24 112–29): *Provided further*, That within the amounts ap-
25 propriated, \$2,000,000 shall be transferred to the “Office

1 of Inspector General” account for activities associated
2 with carrying out investigations and audits related to the
3 USPTO.

4 NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF STANDARDS AND TECHNOLOGY
5 SCIENTIFIC AND TECHNICAL RESEARCH AND SERVICES
6 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

7 For necessary expenses of the National Institute of
8 Standards and Technology (NIST), \$660,000,000, to re-
9 main available until expended, of which not to exceed
10 \$9,000,000 may be transferred to the “Working Capital
11 Fund”: *Provided*, That not to exceed \$5,000 shall be for
12 official reception and representation expenses: *Provided*
13 *further*, That NIST may provide local transportation for
14 summer undergraduate research fellowship program par-
15 ticipants.

16 INDUSTRIAL TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

17 For necessary expenses for industrial technology
18 services, \$105,000,000, to remain available until ex-
19 pended, of which \$100,000,000 shall be for the Hollings
20 Manufacturing Extension Partnership, and of which
21 \$5,000,000 shall be for the National Network for Manu-
22 facturing Innovation.

23 CONSTRUCTION OF RESEARCH FACILITIES

24 For construction of new research facilities, including
25 architectural and engineering design, and for renovation

1 and maintenance of existing facilities, not otherwise pro-
2 vided for the National Institute of Standards and Tech-
3 nology, as authorized by sections 13 through 15 of the
4 National Institute of Standards and Technology Act (15
5 U.S.C. 278c–278e), \$100,000,000, to remain available
6 until expended: *Provided*, That the Secretary of Commerce
7 shall include in the budget justification materials that the
8 Secretary submits to Congress in support of the Depart-
9 ment of Commerce budget (as submitted with the budget
10 of the President under section 1105(a) of title 31, United
11 States Code) an estimate for each National Institute of
12 Standards and Technology construction project having a
13 total multi-year program cost of more than \$5,000,000,
14 and simultaneously the budget justification materials shall
15 include an estimate of the budgetary requirements for
16 each such project for each of the 5 subsequent fiscal years.

17 NATIONAL OCEANIC AND ATMOSPHERIC

18 ADMINISTRATION

19 OPERATIONS, RESEARCH, AND FACILITIES

20 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

21 For necessary expenses of activities authorized by law
22 for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration,
23 including maintenance, operation, and hire of aircraft and
24 vessels; grants, contracts, or other payments to nonprofit
25 organizations for the purposes of conducting activities

1 pursuant to cooperative agreements; and relocation of fa-
2 cilities, \$3,260,199,000, to remain available until Sep-
3 tember 30, 2019, except that funds provided for coopera-
4 tive enforcement shall remain available until September
5 30, 2020: *Provided*, That fees and donations received by
6 the National Ocean Service for the management of na-
7 tional marine sanctuaries may be retained and used for
8 the salaries and expenses associated with those activities,
9 notwithstanding section 3302 of title 31, United States
10 Code: *Provided further*, That in addition, \$144,000,000
11 shall be derived by transfer from the fund entitled “Pro-
12 mote and Develop Fishery Products and Research Per-
13 taining to American Fisheries”, which shall only be used
14 for fishery activities related to the Saltonstall-Kennedy
15 Grant Program, Cooperative Research, Annual Stock As-
16 sessments, Survey and Monitoring Projects, Interjurisdic-
17 tional Fisheries Grants, and Fish Information Networks:
18 *Provided further*, That of the \$3,431,699,000 provided for
19 in direct obligations under this heading, \$3,260,199,000
20 is appropriated from the general fund, \$144,000,000 is
21 provided by transfer and \$27,500,000 is derived from re-
22 coveries of prior year obligations: *Provided further*, That
23 any deviation from the amounts designated for specific ac-
24 tivities in the report accompanying this Act, or any use
25 of deobligated balances of funds provided under this head-

1 ing in previous years, shall be subject to the procedures
2 set forth in section 505 of this Act: *Provided further*, That
3 in addition, for necessary retired pay expenses under the
4 Retired Serviceman's Family Protection and Survivor
5 Benefits Plan, and for payments for the medical care of
6 retired personnel and their dependents under the Depend-
7 ents' Medical Care Act (10 U.S.C. ch. 55), such sums as
8 may be necessary.

9 PROCUREMENT, ACQUISITION AND CONSTRUCTION

10 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

11 For procurement, acquisition and construction of
12 capital assets, including alteration and modification costs,
13 of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration,
14 \$1,643,110,000, to remain available until September 30,
15 2020, except that funds provided for acquisition and con-
16 struction of vessels and construction of facilities shall re-
17 main available until expended: *Provided*, That of the
18 \$1,656,110,000 provided for in direct obligations under
19 this heading, \$1,643,110,000 is appropriated from the
20 general fund and \$13,000,000 is provided from recoveries
21 of prior year obligations: *Provided further*, That any devi-
22 ation from the amounts designated for specific activities
23 in the report accompanying this Act, or any use of
24 deobligated balances of funds provided under this heading
25 in previous years, shall be subject to the procedures set

1 forth in section 505 of this Act: *Provided further*, That
2 the Secretary of Commerce shall include in budget jus-
3 tification materials that the Secretary submits to Congress
4 in support of the Department of Commerce budget (as
5 submitted with the budget of the President under section
6 1105(a) of title 31, United States Code) an estimate for
7 each National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration
8 procurement, acquisition or construction project having a
9 total of more than \$5,000,000 and simultaneously the
10 budget justification shall include an estimate of the budg-
11 etary requirements for each such project for each of the
12 5 subsequent fiscal years: *Provided further*, That, within
13 the amounts appropriated, \$1,302,000 shall be transferred
14 to the “Office of Inspector General” account for activities
15 associated with carrying out investigations and audits re-
16 lated to satellite procurement, acquisition and construc-
17 tion.

18 PACIFIC COASTAL SALMON RECOVERY

19 For necessary expenses associated with the restora-
20 tion of Pacific salmon populations, \$65,000,000, to re-
21 main available until September 30, 2019: *Provided*, That,
22 of the funds provided herein, the Secretary of Commerce
23 may issue grants to the States of Washington, Oregon,
24 Idaho, Nevada, California, and Alaska, and to the Feder-
25 ally recognized tribes of the Columbia River and Pacific

1 Coast (including Alaska), for projects necessary for con-
2 servation of salmon and steelhead populations that are
3 listed as threatened or endangered, or that are identified
4 by a State as at-risk to be so listed, for maintaining popu-
5 lations necessary for exercise of tribal treaty fishing rights
6 or native subsistence fishing, or for conservation of Pacific
7 coastal salmon and steelhead habitat, based on guidelines
8 to be developed by the Secretary of Commerce: *Provided*
9 *further*, That all funds shall be allocated based on sci-
10 entific and other merit principles and shall not be available
11 for marketing activities: *Provided further*, That funds dis-
12 bursed to States shall be subject to a matching require-
13 ment of funds or documented in-kind contributions of at
14 least 33 percent of the Federal funds.

15 FISHermen's CONTINGENCY FUND

16 For carrying out the provisions of title IV of Public
17 Law 95-372, not to exceed \$350,000, to be derived from
18 receipts collected pursuant to that Act, to remain available
19 until expended.

20 FISHERIES FINANCE PROGRAM ACCOUNT

21 Subject to section 502 of the Congressional Budget
22 Act of 1974, during fiscal year 2018, obligations of direct
23 loans may not exceed \$24,000,000 for Individual Fishing
24 Quota loans and not to exceed \$100,000,000 for tradi-

1 tional direct loans as authorized by the Merchant Marine
2 Act of 1936.

3 DEPARTMENTAL MANAGEMENT

4 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

5 For necessary expenses for the management of the
6 Department of Commerce provided for by law, including
7 not to exceed \$4,500 for official reception and representa-
8 tion, \$58,000,000.

9 RENOVATION AND MODERNIZATION

10 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

11 For necessary expenses for the renovation and mod-
12 ernization of the Herbert C. Hoover Building, \$1,000,000,
13 to remain available until expended: *Provided*, That the
14 Secretary of Commerce may transfer up to \$8,224,000 to
15 this account from funds available to the Department of
16 Commerce: *Provided further*, That the transfer authority
17 provided in the first proviso is in addition to any other
18 transfer authority contained in this Act: *Provided further*,
19 That any transfer pursuant to the authority provided
20 under this heading shall be treated as a reprogramming
21 under section 505 of this Act and shall not be available
22 for obligation or expenditure except in compliance with the
23 procedures set forth in that section.

1 OFFICE OF INSPECTOR GENERAL

2 For necessary expenses of the Office of Inspector
3 General in carrying out the provisions of the Inspector
4 General Act of 1978 (5 U.S.C. App.), \$32,744,000.

5 GENERAL PROVISIONS—DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE
6 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

7 SEC. 101. During the current fiscal year, applicable
8 appropriations and funds made available to the Depart-
9 ment of Commerce by this Act shall be available for the
10 activities specified in the Act of October 26, 1949 (15
11 U.S.C. 1514), to the extent and in the manner prescribed
12 by the Act, and, notwithstanding 31 U.S.C. 3324, may
13 be used for advanced payments not otherwise authorized
14 only upon the certification of officials designated by the
15 Secretary of Commerce that such payments are in the
16 public interest.

17 SEC. 102. During the current fiscal year, appropria-
18 tions made available to the Department of Commerce by
19 this Act for salaries and expenses shall be available for
20 hire of passenger motor vehicles as authorized by 31
21 U.S.C. 1343 and 1344; services as authorized by 5 U.S.C.
22 3109; and uniforms or allowances therefor, as authorized
23 by law (5 U.S.C. 5901–5902).

24 SEC. 103. Not to exceed 5 percent of any appropria-
25 tion made available for the current fiscal year for the De-

1 partment of Commerce in this Act may be transferred be-
2 tween such appropriations, but no such appropriation shall
3 be increased by more than 10 percent by any such trans-
4 fers: *Provided*, That any transfer pursuant to this section
5 shall be treated as a reprogramming of funds under sec-
6 tion 505 of this Act and shall not be available for obliga-
7 tion or expenditure except in compliance with the proce-
8 dures set forth in that section: *Provided further*, That the
9 Secretary of Commerce shall notify the Committees on Ap-
10 propriations at least 15 days in advance of the acquisition
11 or disposal of any capital asset (including land, structures,
12 and equipment) not specifically provided for in this Act
13 or any other law appropriating funds for the Department
14 of Commerce.

15 SEC. 104. The requirements set forth by section 105
16 of the Commerce, Justice, Science, and Related Agencies
17 Appropriations Act, 2012 (Public Law 112–55), as
18 amended by section 105 of title I of division B of Public
19 Law 113–6, are hereby adopted by reference and made
20 applicable with respect to fiscal year 2018: *Provided*, That
21 the life cycle cost for the Joint Polar Satellite System is
22 \$11,322,125,000 and the life cycle cost for the Geo-
23 stationary Operational Environmental Satellite R-Series
24 Program is \$10,828,059,000.

1 SEC. 105. Notwithstanding any other provision of
2 law, the Secretary may furnish services (including but not
3 limited to utilities, telecommunications, and security serv-
4 ices) necessary to support the operation, maintenance, and
5 improvement of space that persons, firms, or organizations
6 are authorized, pursuant to the Public Buildings Coopera-
7 tive Use Act of 1976 or other authority, to use or occupy
8 in the Herbert C. Hoover Building, Washington, DC, or
9 other buildings, the maintenance, operation, and protec-
10 tion of which has been delegated to the Secretary from
11 the Administrator of General Services pursuant to the
12 Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949
13 on a reimbursable or non-reimbursable basis. Amounts re-
14 ceived as reimbursement for services provided under this
15 section or the authority under which the use or occupancy
16 of the space is authorized, up to \$200,000, shall be cred-
17 ited to the appropriation or fund which initially bears the
18 costs of such services.

19 SEC. 106. Nothing in this title shall be construed to
20 prevent a grant recipient from deterring child pornog-
21 raphy, copyright infringement, or any other unlawful ac-
22 tivity over its networks.

23 SEC. 107. The Administrator of the National Oceanic
24 and Atmospheric Administration is authorized to use, with
25 their consent, with reimbursement and subject to the lim-

1 its of available appropriations, the land, services, equip-
2 ment, personnel, and facilities of any department, agency,
3 or instrumentality of the United States, or of any State,
4 local government, Indian tribal government, Territory, or
5 possession, or of any political subdivision thereof, or of
6 any foreign government or international organization, for
7 purposes related to carrying out the responsibilities of any
8 statute administered by the National Oceanic and Atmos-
9 pheric Administration.

10 SEC. 108. The National Technical Information Serv-
11 ice shall not charge any customer for a copy of any report
12 or document generated by the Legislative Branch unless
13 the Service has provided information to the customer on
14 how an electronic copy of such report or document may
15 be accessed and downloaded for free online. Should a cus-
16 tomer still require the Service to provide a printed or dig-
17 ital copy of the report or document, the charge shall be
18 limited to recovering the Service's cost of processing, re-
19 producing, and delivering such report or document.

20 SEC. 109. To carry out the responsibilities of the Na-
21 tional Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA),
22 the Administrator of NOAA is authorized to: (1) enter
23 into grants and cooperative agreements with; (2) use on
24 a non-reimbursable basis land, services, equipment, per-

12 ration of a term of office of a Commissioner, the Commis-
13 sioner may continue to act until a successor has been ap-
14 pointed.

16 SALARIES AND EXPENSES, GENERAL LEGAL ACTIVITIES

17 For expenses necessary for the legal activities of the
18 Department of Justice, not otherwise provided for, includ-
19 ing not to exceed \$20,000 for expenses of collecting evi-
20 dence, to be expended under the direction of, and to be
21 accounted for solely under the certificate of, the Attorney
22 General; the administration of pardon and clemency peti-

24 the District of Columbia, \$897,500,000, of which not to
25 exceed \$20,000,000 for litigation support contracts shall

17 the 1990 Act;

21 address opioid abuse reduction consistent with un-

11 (4) \$2,000,000 for child abuse training pro-
12 grams for judicial personnel and practitioners, as
13 authorized by section 222 of the Victims of Child
14 Abuse Act of 1990.

15 PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER BENEFITS

16 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

17 For payments and expenses authorized under section
18 1001(a)(4) of title I of the Omnibus Crime Control and
19 Safe Streets Act of 1968, such sums as are necessary (in-
20 cluding amounts for administrative costs), to remain avail-
21 able until expended; and \$16,300,000 for payments au-
22 thorized by section 1201(b) of such Act and for edu-
23 cational assistance authorized by section 1218 of such Act,
24 to remain available until expended: *Provided*, That not-
25 withstanding section 205 of this Act, upon a determina-

1 tion by the Attorney General that emergent circumstances
2 require additional funding for such disability and edu-
3 cation payments, the Attorney General may transfer such
4 amounts to “Public Safety Officer Benefits” from avail-
5 able appropriations for the Department of Justice as may
6 be necessary to respond to such circumstances: *Provided*
7 *further*, That any transfer pursuant to the preceding pro-
8 viso shall be treated as a reprogramming under section
9 505 of this Act and shall not be available for obligation
10 or expenditure except in compliance with the procedures

13 COMMUNITY ORIENTED POLICING SERVICES PROGRAMS

14 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

15 For grants, contracts, cooperative agreements, and
16 other assistance, the following amounts are made available
17 until expended: *Provided*, That any balances made avail-
18 able through prior year deobligations shall only be avail-
19 able in accordance with section 505 of this Act—

20 (1) \$11,000,000 for anti-methamphetamine-re-
21 lated activities, which shall be transferred to the
22 Drug Enforcement Administration upon enactment
23 of this Act;

24 (2) \$10,000,000 is for activities authorized by
25 the POLICE Act of 2016 (Public Law 114–199);

1 shall be available to the Attorney General for official re-
2 ception and representation expenses.

3 SEC. 202. None of the funds appropriated by this
4 title shall be available to pay for an abortion, except where
5 the life of the mother would be endangered if the fetus
6 were carried to term, or in the case of rape or incest: *Pro-*
7 *vided*, That should this prohibition be declared unconstitu-
8 tional by a court of competent jurisdiction, this section
9 shall be null and void.

10 SEC. 203. None of the funds appropriated under this
11 title shall be used to require any person to perform, or
12 facilitate in any way the performance of, any abortion.

13 SEC. 204. Nothing in the preceding section shall re-
14 move the obligation of the Director of the Bureau of Pris-
15 ons to provide escort services necessary for a female in-
16 mate to receive such service outside the Federal facility:
17 *Provided*, That nothing in this section in any way dimin-
18 ishes the effect of section 203 intended to address the phil-
19 osophical beliefs of individual employees of the Bureau of
20 Prisons.

21 SEC. 205. Not to exceed 5 percent of any appropria-
22 tion made available for the current fiscal year for the De-
23 partment of Justice in this Act may be transferred be-
24 tween such appropriations, but no such appropriation, ex-
25 cept as otherwise specifically provided, shall be increased

1 by more than 10 percent by any such transfers: *Provided*,
2 That any transfer pursuant to this section shall be treated
3 as a reprogramming of funds under section 505 of this
4 Act and shall not be available for obligation except in com-
5 pliance with the procedures set forth in that section.

6 SEC. 206. None of the funds made available under
7 this title may be used by the Federal Bureau of Prisons
8 or the United States Marshals Service for the purpose of
9 transporting an individual who is a prisoner pursuant to
10 conviction for crime under State or Federal law and is
11 classified as a maximum or high security prisoner, other
12 than to a prison or other facility certified by the Federal
13 Bureau of Prisons as appropriately secure for housing
14 such a prisoner.

15 SEC. 207. (a) None of the funds appropriated by this
16 Act may be used by Federal prisons to purchase cable tele-
17 vision services, or to rent or purchase audiovisual or elec-
18 tronic media or equipment used primarily for recreational
19 purposes.

20 (b) Subsection (a) does not preclude the rental, main-
21 tenance, or purchase of audiovisual or electronic media or
22 equipment for inmate training, religious, or educational
23 programs.

24 SEC. 208. None of the funds made available under
25 this title shall be obligated or expended for any new or

1 enhanced information technology program having total es-
2 timated development costs in excess of \$100,000,000, un-
3 less the Deputy Attorney General and the investment re-
4 view board certify to the Committees on Appropriations
5 of the House of Representatives and the Senate that the
6 information technology program has appropriate program
7 management controls and contractor oversight mecha-
8 nisms in place, and that the program is compatible with
9 the enterprise architecture of the Department of Justice.

10 SEC. 209. The notification thresholds and procedures
11 set forth in section 505 of this Act shall apply to devi-
12 ations from the amounts designated for specific activities
13 in this Act and in the report accompanying this Act, and
14 to any use of deobligated balances of funds provided under
15 this title in previous years.

16 SEC. 210. None of the funds appropriated by this Act
17 may be used to plan for, begin, continue, finish, process,
18 or approve a public-private competition under the Office
19 of Management and Budget Circular A-76 or any suc-
20 cessor administrative regulation, directive, or policy for
21 work performed by employees of Federal Prison Indus-
22 tries, Incorporated.

23 SEC. 211. Notwithstanding any other provision of
24 law, no funds shall be available for the salary, benefits,
25 or expenses of any United States Attorney assigned dual

1 or additional responsibilities by the Attorney General or
2 his designee that exempt that United States Attorney
3 from the residency requirements of section 545 of title 28,
4 United States Code.

5 SEC. 212. At the discretion of the Attorney General,
6 and in addition to any amounts that otherwise may be
7 available (or authorized to be made available) by law, with
8 respect to funds appropriated by this title under the head-
9 ings “Research, Evaluation and Statistics”, “State and
10 Local Law Enforcement Assistance”, and “Juvenile Jus-
11 tice Programs”—

12 (1) up to 3 percent of funds made available to
13 the Office of Justice Programs for grant or reim-
14 bursement programs may be used by such Office to
15 provide training and technical assistance; and

16 (2) up to 3 percent of funds made available for
17 grant or reimbursement programs under such head-
18 ings, except for amounts appropriated specifically for
19 research, evaluation, or statistical programs adminis-
20 tered by the National Institute of Justice and the
21 Bureau of Justice Statistics, shall be transferred to
22 and merged with funds provided to the National In-
23 stitute of Justice and the Bureau of Justice Statis-
24 tics, to be used by them for research, evaluation, or

1 statistical purposes, without regard to the authoriza-
2 tions for such grant or reimbursement programs.

3 SEC. 213. At the discretion of the Attorney General,
4 and in addition to any amounts that otherwise may be
5 available (or authorized to be made available) by law, up
6 to 7 percent of funds made available for grant or reim-
7 bursement programs—

8 (1) under the heading “State and Local Law
9 Enforcement Assistance” (except for funds made
10 available under paragraphs (1), (2), and (9) under
11 such heading); and

12 (2) under the headings “Juvenile Justice Pro-
13 grams” (except for funds made available under para-
14 graph (3) under such heading) and “Community
15 Oriented Policing Services Programs”, to be trans-
16 ferred to and merged with funds made available
17 under the heading “State and Local Law Enforce-
18 ment Assistance”,

19 shall be available for tribal criminal justice assistance
20 without regard to the authorizations for such grant or re-
21 imbursement programs.

22 SEC. 214. Notwithstanding any other provision of
23 law, section 20109(a) of subtitle A of title II of the Violent
24 Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994 (42

1 U.S.C. 13709(a)) shall not apply to amounts made avail-
2 able by this or any other Act.

3 SEC. 215. None of the funds made available under
4 this or any other Act, for fiscal year 2018 and each fiscal
5 year thereafter, other than for the national instant crimi-
6 nal background check system established under section
7 103 of the Brady Handgun Violence Prevention Act (18
8 U.S.C. 922 note), may be used by a Federal law enforce-
9 ment officer to facilitate the transfer of an operable fire-
10 arm to an individual if the Federal law enforcement officer
11 knows or suspects that the individual is an agent of a drug
12 cartel, unless law enforcement personnel of the United
13 States continuously monitor or control the firearm at all
14 times.

15 SEC. 216. (a) None of the income retained in the De-
16 partment of Justice Working Capital Fund pursuant to
17 title I of Public Law 102–140 (105 Stat. 784; 28 U.S.C.
18 527 note) shall be available for obligation during fiscal
19 year 2018, except up to \$40,000,000 may be obligated for
20 implementation of a unified Department of Justice finan-
21 cial management system.

22 (b) Not to exceed \$30,000,000 of the unobligated bal-
23 ances transferred to the capital account of the Department
24 of Justice Working Capital Fund pursuant to title I of
25 Public Law 102–140 (105 Stat. 784; 28 U.S.C. 527 note)

1 shall be available for obligation in fiscal year 2018, and
2 any use, obligation, transfer or allocation of such funds
3 shall be treated as a reprogramming of funds under sec-
4 tion 505 of this Act.

5 (c) Not to exceed \$10,000,000 of the excess unobli-
6 gated balances available under section 524(c)(8)(E) of
7 title 28, United States Code, shall be available for obliga-
8 tion during fiscal year 2018, and any use, obligation,
9 transfer or allocation of such funds shall be treated as a
10 reprogramming of funds under section 505 of this Act.

11 This title may be cited as the “Department of Justice
12 Appropriations Act, 2018”.

15 OFFICE OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY POLICY

16 For necessary expenses of the Office of Science and
17 Technology Policy, in carrying out the purposes of the Na-
18 tional Science and Technology Policy, Organization, and
19 Priorities Act of 1976 (42 U.S.C. 6601 et seq.), hire of
20 passenger motor vehicles, and services as authorized by
21 section 3109 of title 5, United States Code, not to exceed
22 \$2,250 for official reception and representation expenses,
23 and rental of conference rooms in the District of Colum-
24 bia, \$5,544,000.

1 NATIONAL AERONAUTICS AND SPACE ADMINISTRATION
2 SCIENCE

3 For necessary expenses, not otherwise provided for,
4 in the conduct and support of science research and devel-
5 opment activities, including research, development, oper-
6 ations, support, and services; maintenance and repair, fa-
7 cility planning and design; space flight, spacecraft control,
8 and communications activities; program management; per-
9 sonnel and related costs, including uniforms or allowances
10 therefor, as authorized by sections 5901 and 5902 of title
11 5, United States Code; travel expenses; purchase and hire
12 of passenger motor vehicles; and purchase, lease, charter,
13 maintenance, and operation of mission and administrative
14 aircraft, \$5,858,500,000, to remain available until Sep-
15 tember 30, 2019: *Provided*, That the formulation and de-
16 velopment costs (with development cost as defined under
17 section 30104 of title 51, United States Code) for the
18 James Webb Space Telescope shall not exceed
19 \$8,000,000,000: *Provided further*, That should the indi-
20 vidual identified under subsection (c)(2)(E) of section
21 30104 of title 51, United States Code, as responsible for
22 the James Webb Space Telescope determine that the de-
23 velopment cost of the program is likely to exceed that limi-
24 tation, the individual shall immediately notify the Admin-
25 istrator and the increase shall be treated as if it meets

1 the 30 percent threshold described in subsection (f) of sec-
2 tion 30104: *Provided further*, That, of the amounts pro-
3 vided, \$495,000,000 is for an orbiter and a lander to meet
4 the science goals for the Jupiter Europa mission as out-
5 lined in the most recent planetary science decadal survey:
6 *Provided further*, That the National Aeronautics and
7 Space Administration shall use the Space Launch System
8 as the launch vehicles for the Jupiter Europa mission,
9 plan for an orbiter launch no later than 2022 and a lander
10 launch no later than 2024, and include in the fiscal year
11 2019 budget the 5-year funding profile necessary to
12 achieve these goals.

13 AERONAUTICS

14 For necessary expenses, not otherwise provided for,
15 in the conduct and support of aeronautics research and
16 development activities, including research, development,
17 operations, support, and services; maintenance and repair,
18 facility planning and design; space flight, spacecraft con-
19 trol, and communications activities; program manage-
20 ment; personnel and related costs, including uniforms or
21 allowances therefor, as authorized by sections 5901 and
22 5902 of title 5, United States Code; travel expenses; pur-
23 chase and hire of passenger motor vehicles; and purchase,
24 lease, charter, maintenance, and operation of mission and

1 administrative aircraft, \$660,000,000, to remain available
2 until September 30, 2019.

3 SPACE TECHNOLOGY

4 For necessary expenses, not otherwise provided for,
5 in the conduct and support of space technology research
6 and development activities, including research, develop-
7 ment, operations, support, and services; maintenance and
8 repair, facility planning and design; space flight, space-
9 craft control, and communications activities; program
10 management; personnel and related costs, including uni-
11 forms or allowances therefor, as authorized by sections
12 5901 and 5902 of title 5, United States Code; travel ex-
13 penses; purchase and hire of passenger motor vehicles; and
14 purchase, lease, charter, maintenance, and operation of
15 mission and administrative aircraft, \$686,500,000, to re-
16 main available until September 30, 2019.

17 EXPLORATION

18 For necessary expenses, not otherwise provided for,
19 in the conduct and support of exploration research and
20 development activities, including research, development,
21 operations, support, and services; maintenance and repair,
22 facility planning and design; space flight, spacecraft con-
23 trol, and communications activities; program manage-
24 ment; personnel and related costs, including uniforms or
25 allowances therefor, as authorized by sections 5901 and

1 5902 of title 5, United States Code; travel expenses; pur-
2 chase and hire of passenger motor vehicles; and purchase,
3 lease, charter, maintenance, and operation of mission and
4 administrative aircraft, \$4,550,000,000, to remain avail-
5 able until September 30, 2019: *Provided*, That not less
6 than \$1,350,000,000 shall be for the Orion Multi-Purpose
7 Crew Vehicle: *Provided further*, That not less than
8 \$2,150,000,000 shall be for the Space Launch System
9 (SLS) launch vehicle, which shall have a lift capability not
10 less than 130 metric tons and which shall have core ele-
11 ments and an Exploration Upper Stage developed simulta-
12 neously: *Provided further*, That of the amounts provided
13 for SLS, not less than \$300,000,000 shall be for Explo-
14 ration Upper Stage development: *Provided further*, That
15 \$600,000,000 shall be for exploration ground systems:
16 *Provided further*, That the National Aeronautics and
17 Space Administration (NASA) shall provide to the Com-
18 mittees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives
19 and the Senate, concurrent with the annual budget sub-
20 mission, a 5-year budget profile for an integrated budget
21 that includes the Space Launch System, the Orion Multi-
22 Purpose Crew Vehicle, and associated ground systems,
23 that will meet the Exploration Mission 2 (EM-2) manage-
24 ment agreement launch date of no later than 2021 at a
25 success level equal to the Agency Baseline Commitment

1 for EM-2 of the Orion Multi-Purpose Crew Vehicle: *Pro-*
2 *vided further*, That \$450,000,000 shall be for exploration
3 research and development.

4 SPACE OPERATIONS

5 For necessary expenses, not otherwise provided for,
6 in the conduct and support of space operations research
7 and development activities, including research, develop-
8 ment, operations, support and services; space flight, space-
9 craft control and communications activities, including op-
10 erations, production, and services; maintenance and re-
11 pair, facility planning and design; program management;
12 personnel and related costs, including uniforms or allow-
13 ances therefor, as authorized by sections 5901 and 5902
14 of title 5, United States Code; travel expenses; purchase
15 and hire of passenger motor vehicles; and purchase, lease,
16 charter, maintenance and operation of mission and admin-
17 istrative aircraft, \$4,676,634,000, to remain available
18 until September 30, 2019.

19 EDUCATION

20 For necessary expenses, not otherwise provided for,
21 in the conduct and support of aerospace and aeronautical
22 education research and development activities, including
23 research, development, operations, support, and services;
24 program management; personnel and related costs, includ-
25 ing uniforms or allowances therefor, as authorized by sec-

1 tions 5901 and 5902 of title 5, United States Code; travel
2 expenses; purchase and hire of passenger motor vehicles;
3 and purchase, lease, charter, maintenance, and operation
4 of mission and administrative aircraft, \$90,000,000, to re-
5 main available until September 30, 2019, of which
6 \$18,000,000 shall be for the Experimental Program to
7 Stimulate Competitive Research and \$40,000,000 shall be
8 for the National Space Grant College and Fellowship Pro-
9 gram.

11 For necessary expenses, not otherwise provided for,
12 in the conduct and support of science, aeronautics, space
13 technology, exploration, space operations and education
14 research and development activities, including research,
15 development, operations, support, and services; mainte-
16 nance and repair, facility planning and design; space
17 flight, spacecraft control, and communications activities;
18 program management; personnel and related costs, includ-
19 ing uniforms or allowances therefor, as authorized by sec-
20 tions 5901 and 5902 of title 5, United States Code; travel
21 expenses; purchase and hire of passenger motor vehicles;
22 not to exceed \$63,000 for official reception and represen-
23 tation expenses; and purchase, lease, charter, mainte-
24 nance, and operation of mission and administrative air-

1 craft, \$2,826,200,000, to remain available until Sep-
2 tember 30, 2019.

3 CONSTRUCTION AND ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE AND
4 RESTORATION

5 For necessary expenses for construction of facilities
6 including repair, rehabilitation, revitalization, and modi-
7 fication of facilities, construction of new facilities and ad-
8 ditions to existing facilities, facility planning and design,
9 and restoration, and acquisition or condemnation of real
10 property, as authorized by law, and environmental compli-
11 ance and restoration, \$486,100,000, to remain available
12 until September 30, 2023: *Provided*, That proceeds from
13 leases deposited into this account shall be available for a
14 period of 5 years to the extent and in amounts as provided
15 in annual appropriations Acts: *Provided further*, That such
16 proceeds referred to in the preceding proviso shall be avail-
17 able for obligation for fiscal year 2018 in an amount not
18 to exceed \$9,470,300: *Provided further*, That each annual
19 budget request shall include an annual estimate of gross
20 receipts and collections and proposed use of all funds col-
21 lected pursuant to section 20145 of title 51, United States
22 Code.

23 OFFICE OF INSPECTOR GENERAL

24 For necessary expenses of the Office of Inspector
25 General in carrying out the Inspector General Act of 1978,

1 \$37,900,000, of which \$500,000 shall remain available
2 until September 30, 2019.

3 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS
4 (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

5 Funds for any announced prize otherwise authorized
6 shall remain available, without fiscal year limitation, until
7 a prize is claimed or the offer is withdrawn.

8 Not to exceed 5 percent of any appropriation made
9 available for the current fiscal year for the National Aero-
10 nautics and Space Administration in this Act may be
11 transferred between such appropriations, but no such ap-
12 propriation, except as otherwise specifically provided, shall
13 be increased by more than 10 percent by any such trans-
14 fers, except that “Construction and Environmental Com-
15 pliance and Restoration” may be increased up to 20 per-
16 cent by such transfers. Balances so transferred shall be
17 merged with and available for the same purposes and the

8 RESEARCH AND RELATED ACTIVITIES

9 For necessary expenses in carrying out the National
10 Science Foundation Act of 1950 (42 U.S.C. 1861 et seq.),
11 and Public Law 86–209 (42 U.S.C. 1880 et seq.); services
12 as authorized by section 3109 of title 5, United States
13 Code; maintenance and operation of aircraft and purchase
14 of flight services for research support; acquisition of air-
15 craft; and authorized travel; \$6,033,645,000, to remain
16 available until September 30, 2019, of which not to exceed
17 \$544,000,000 shall remain available until expended for
18 polar research and operations support, and for reimburse-
19 ment to other Federal agencies for operational and science
20 support and logistical and other related activities for the
21 United States Antarctic program: *Provided*, That receipts
22 for scientific support services and materials furnished by
23 the National Research Centers and other National Science
24 Foundation supported research facilities may be credited
25 to this appropriation.

1 MAJOR RESEARCH EQUIPMENT AND FACILITIES

2 CONSTRUCTION

3 For necessary expenses for the acquisition, construc-
4 tion, commissioning, and upgrading of major research
5 equipment, facilities, and other such capital assets pursu-
6 ant to the National Science Foundation Act of 1950 (42
7 U.S.C. 1861 et seq.), including authorized travel,
8 \$77,800,000, to remain available until expended.

9 EDUCATION AND HUMAN RESOURCES

10 For necessary expenses in carrying out science, math-
11 ematics and engineering education and human resources
12 programs and activities pursuant to the National Science
13 Foundation Act of 1950 (42 U.S.C. 1861 et seq.), includ-
14 ing services as authorized by section 3109 of title 5,
15 United States Code, authorized travel, and rental of con-
16 ference rooms in the District of Columbia, \$880,000,000,
17 to remain available until September 30, 2019.

18 AGENCY OPERATIONS AND AWARD MANAGEMENT

19 For agency operations and award management nec-
20 essary in carrying out the National Science Foundation
21 Act of 1950 (42 U.S.C. 1861 et seq.); services authorized
22 by section 3109 of title 5, United States Code; hire of pas-
23 senger motor vehicles; uniforms or allowances therefor, as
24 authorized by sections 5901 and 5902 of title 5, United
25 States Code; rental of conference rooms in the District of

1 Columbia; and reimbursement of the Department of
2 Homeland Security for security guard services;
3 \$328,510,000: *Provided*, That not to exceed \$8,280 is for
4 official reception and representation expenses: *Provided*
5 *further*, That contracts may be entered into under this
6 heading in fiscal year 2018 for maintenance and operation
7 of facilities and for other services to be provided during
8 the next fiscal year.

9 OFFICE OF THE NATIONAL SCIENCE BOARD

10 For necessary expenses (including payment of sala-
11 ries, authorized travel, hire of passenger motor vehicles,
12 the rental of conference rooms in the District of Columbia,
13 and the employment of experts and consultants under sec-
14 tion 3109 of title 5, United States Code) involved in car-
15 rying out section 4 of the National Science Foundation
16 Act of 1950 (42 U.S.C. 1863) and Public Law 86–209
17 (42 U.S.C. 1880 et seq.), \$4,370,000: *Provided*, That not
18 to exceed \$2,500 shall be available for official reception
19 and representation expenses.

20 OFFICE OF INSPECTOR GENERAL

21 For necessary expenses of the Office of Inspector
22 General as authorized by the Inspector General Act of
23 1978, \$15,200,000, of which \$400,000 shall remain avail-
24 able until September 30, 2019.

1 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS
2 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

3 Not to exceed 5 percent of any appropriation made
4 available for the current fiscal year for the National
5 Science Foundation in this Act may be transferred be-
6 tween such appropriations, but no such appropriation shall
7 be increased by more than 15 percent by any such trans-
8 fers. Any transfer pursuant to this paragraph shall be
9 treated as a reprogramming of funds under section 505
10 of this Act and shall not be available for obligation except
11 in compliance with the procedures set forth in that section.

4 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

5 For necessary expenses of the Commission on Civil
6 Rights, including hire of passenger motor vehicles,
7 \$9,183,000: *Provided*, That none of the funds appro-
8 priated in this paragraph may be used to employ any indi-
9 viduals under Schedule C of subpart C of part 213 of title
10 5 of the Code of Federal Regulations exclusive of one spe-
11 cial assistant for each Commissioner: *Provided further*,
12 That none of the funds appropriated in this paragraph
13 shall be used to reimburse Commissioners for more than
14 75 billable days, with the exception of the chairperson,
15 who is permitted 125 billable days: *Provided further*, That
16 none of the funds appropriated in this paragraph shall be
17 used for any activity or expense that is not explicitly au-
18 thorized by section 3 of the Civil Rights Commission Act
19 of 1983 (42 U.S.C. 1975a).

20 EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY COMMISSION
21 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

22 For necessary expenses of the Equal Employment
23 Opportunity Commission as authorized by title VII of the
24 Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Age Discrimination in Em-
25 ployment Act of 1967, the Equal Pay Act of 1963, the

1 Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, section 501 of
2 the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Civil Rights Act of
3 1991, the Genetic Information Nondiscrimination Act
4 (GINA) of 2008 (Public Law 110–233), the ADA Amend-
5 ments Act of 2008 (Public Law 110–325), and the Lilly
6 Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009 (Public Law 111–2), in-
7 cluding services as authorized by section 3109 of title 5,
8 United States Code; hire of passenger motor vehicles as
9 authorized by section 1343(b) of title 31, United States
10 Code; nonmonetary awards to private citizens; and up to

3 LEGAL SERVICES CORPORATION

4 PAYMENT TO THE LEGAL SERVICES CORPORATION

5 For payment to the Legal Services Corporation to
6 carry out the purposes of the Legal Services Corporation
7 Act of 1974, \$300,000,000, of which \$267,000,000 is for
8 basic field programs and required independent audits;
9 \$5,000,000 is for the Office of Inspector General, of which
10 such amounts as may be necessary may be used to conduct
11 additional audits of recipients; \$19,000,000 is for manage-
12 ment and grants oversight; \$4,000,000 is for client self-
13 help and information technology; \$4,000,000 is for a Pro
14 Bono Innovation Fund; and \$1,000,000 is for loan repay-
15 ment assistance: *Provided*, That the Legal Services Cor-
16 poration may continue to provide locality pay to officers
17 and employees at a rate no greater than that provided by
18 the Federal Government to Washington, DC-based em-
19 ployees as authorized by section 5304 of title 5, United
20 States Code, notwithstanding section 1005(d) of the Legal
21 Services Corporation Act (42 U.S.C. 2996(d)): *Provided*
22 *further*, That the authorities provided in section 205 of
23 this Act shall be applicable to the Legal Services Corpora-
24 tion: *Provided further*, That, for the purposes of section

1 505 of this Act, the Legal Services Corporation shall be
2 considered an agency of the United States Government.

3 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION—LEGAL SERVICES

4 CORPORATION

5 None of the funds appropriated in this Act to the
6 Legal Services Corporation shall be expended for any pur-
7 pose prohibited or limited by, or contrary to any of the
8 provisions of, sections 501, 502, 503, 504, 505, and 506
9 of Public Law 105–119, and all funds appropriated in this
10 Act to the Legal Services Corporation shall be subject to
11 the same terms and conditions set forth in such sections,
12 except that all references in sections 502 and 503 to 1997
13 and 1998 shall be deemed to refer instead to 2017 and
14 2018, respectively.

15 MARINE MAMMAL COMMISSION

16 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

17 For necessary expenses of the Marine Mammal Com-
18 mission as authorized by title II of the Marine Mammal
19 Protection Act of 1972 (16 U.S.C. 1361 et seq.),
20 \$3,431,000.

21 OFFICE OF THE UNITED STATES TRADE

22 REPRESENTATIVE

23 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

24 For necessary expenses of the Office of the United
25 States Trade Representative, including the hire of pas-

1 senger motor vehicles and the employment of experts and
2 consultants as authorized by section 3109 of title 5,
3 United States Code, \$53,000,000, of which \$1,000,000
4 shall remain available until expended: *Provided*, That of
5 the total amount made available under this heading, not
6 to exceed \$124,000 shall be available for official reception
7 and representation expenses.

8 TRADE ENFORCEMENT TRUST FUND
9 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

10 For activities of the United States Trade Representa-
11 tive authorized by section 611 of the Trade Facilitation
12 and Trade Enforcement Act of 2015 (19 U.S.C. 4405),
13 including transfers, \$15,000,000, to be derived from the
14 Trade Enforcement Trust Fund: *Provided*, That any
15 transfer pursuant to subsection (d)(1) of such section shall
16 be treated as a reprogramming under section 505 of this
17 Act.

18 STATE JUSTICE INSTITUTE
19 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

20 For necessary expenses of the State Justice Institute,
21 as authorized by the State Justice Institute Act of 1984
22 (42 U.S.C. 10701 et seq.) \$5,111,000, of which \$500,000
23 shall remain available until September 30, 2019: *Provided*,
24 That not to exceed \$2,250 shall be available for official
25 reception and representation expenses: *Provided further*,

1 That, for the purposes of section 505 of this Act, the State
2 Justice Institute shall be considered an agency of the
3 United States Government.

4 TITLE V

5 GENERAL PROVISIONS

6 (INCLUDING RESCISSIONS)

7 (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

8 SEC. 501. No part of any appropriation contained in
9 this Act shall be used for publicity or propaganda purposes
10 not authorized by the Congress.

11 SEC. 502. No part of any appropriation contained in
12 this Act shall remain available for obligation beyond the
13 current fiscal year unless expressly so provided herein.

14 SEC. 503. The expenditure of any appropriation
15 under this Act for any consulting service through procure-
16 ment contract, pursuant to section 3109 of title 5, United
17 States Code, shall be limited to those contracts where such
18 expenditures are a matter of public record and available
19 for public inspection, except where otherwise provided
20 under existing law, or under existing Executive order
21 issued pursuant to existing law.

22 SEC. 504. If any provision of this Act or the applica-
23 tion of such provision to any person or circumstances shall
24 be held invalid, the remainder of the Act and the applica-
25 tion of each provision to persons or circumstances other

1 than those as to which it is held invalid shall not be af-
2 fected thereby.

3 SEC. 505. None of the funds provided under this Act,
4 or provided under previous appropriations Acts to the
5 agencies funded by this Act that remain available for obli-
6 gation or expenditure in fiscal year 2018, or provided from
7 any accounts in the Treasury of the United States derived
8 by the collection of fees available to the agencies funded
9 by this Act, shall be available for obligation or expenditure
10 through a reprogramming of funds that: (1) creates or ini-
11 tiates a new program, project or activity; (2) eliminates
12 a program, project or activity; (3) increases funds or per-
13 sonnel by any means for any project or activity for which
14 funds have been denied or restricted; (4) relocates an of-
15 fice or employees; (5) reorganizes or renames offices, pro-
16 grams or activities; (6) contracts out or privatizes any
17 functions or activities presently performed by Federal em-
18 ployees; (7) augments existing programs, projects or ac-
19 tivities in excess of \$500,000 or 10 percent, whichever is
20 less, or reduces by 10 percent funding for any program,
21 project or activity, or numbers of personnel by 10 percent;
22 or (8) results from any general savings, including savings
23 from a reduction in personnel, which would result in a
24 change in existing programs, projects or activities as ap-
25 proved by Congress; unless the House and Senate Com-

1 mittees on Appropriations are notified 15 days in advance
2 of such reprogramming of funds.

3 SEC. 506. (a) If it has been finally determined by
4 a court or Federal agency that any person intentionally
5 affixed a label bearing a “Made in America” inscription,
6 or any inscription with the same meaning, to any product
7 sold in or shipped to the United States that is not made
8 in the United States, the person shall be ineligible to re-
9 ceive any contract or subcontract made with funds made
10 available in this Act, pursuant to the debarment, suspen-
11 sion, and ineligibility procedures described in sections
12 9.400 through 9.409 of title 48, Code of Federal Regula-
13 tions.

14 (b)(1) To the extent practicable, with respect to au-
15 thorized purchases of promotional items, funds made
16 available by this Act shall be used to purchase items that
17 are manufactured, produced, or assembled in the United
18 States, its territories or possessions.

19 (2) The term “promotional items” has the meaning
20 given the term in OMB Circular A–87, Attachment B,
21 Item (1)(f)(3).

22 SEC. 507. (a) The Departments of Commerce and
23 Justice, the National Science Foundation, and the Na-
24 tional Aeronautics and Space Administration shall provide
25 to the Committees on Appropriations of the House of Rep-

1 representatives and the Senate a quarterly report on the sta-
2 tus of balances of appropriations at the account level. For
3 unobligated, uncommitted balances and unobligated, com-
4 mitted balances the quarterly reports shall separately
5 identify the amounts attributable to each source year of
6 appropriation from which the balances were derived. For
7 balances that are obligated, but unexpended, the quarterly
8 reports shall separately identify amounts by the year of
9 obligation.

10 (b) The report described in subsection (a) shall be
11 submitted within 30 days of the end of each quarter.

12 (c) If a department or agency is unable to fulfill any
13 aspect of a reporting requirement described in subsection
14 (a) due to a limitation of a current accounting system,
15 the department or agency shall fulfill such aspect to the
16 maximum extent practicable under such accounting sys-
17 tem and shall identify and describe in each quarterly re-
18 port the extent to which such aspect is not fulfilled.

19 SEC. 508. Any costs incurred by a department or
20 agency funded under this Act resulting from, or to pre-
21 vent, personnel actions taken in response to funding re-
22 ductions included in this Act shall be absorbed within the
23 total budgetary resources available to such department or
24 agency: *Provided*, That the authority to transfer funds be-
25 tween appropriations accounts as may be necessary to

1 carry out this section is provided in addition to authorities
2 included elsewhere in this Act: *Provided further*, That use
3 of funds to carry out this section shall be treated as a
4 reprogramming of funds under section 505 of this Act and
5 shall not be available for obligation or expenditure except
6 in compliance with the procedures set forth in that section:
7 *Provided further*, That for the Department of Commerce,
8 this section shall also apply to actions taken for the care
9 and protection of loan collateral or grant property.

10 SEC. 509. None of the funds provided by this Act
11 shall be available to promote the sale or export of tobacco
12 or tobacco products, or to seek the reduction or removal
13 by any foreign country of restrictions on the marketing
14 of tobacco or tobacco products, except for restrictions
15 which are not applied equally to all tobacco or tobacco
16 products of the same type.

17 SEC. 510. None of the funds made available in this
18 Act may be used to pay the salaries and expenses of per-
19 sonnel of the Department of Justice to obligate more than
20 \$4,632,000,000 during fiscal year 2018 from the fund es-
21 tablished by section 1402 of Public Law 98-473 (42
22 U.S.C. 10601): *Provided*, That of the amounts made avail-
23 able to a State pursuant to a grant under such section
24 1402(d)(4)(B), a State with a tribal government in the
25 State shall reserve no less than an amount that is equal

1 to the population of members of a federally recognized In-
2 dian tribe who reside in the State, in relation to the total
3 population of the State, and shall distribute such amount
4 to Indian tribes and tribal governments located in that
5 State for the financial support of eligible crime victim as-
6 sistance programs in accordance with section 1404 of such
7 Public Law.

8 SEC. 511. None of the funds made available to the
9 Department of Justice in this Act may be used to discrimi-
10 nate against or denigrate the religious or moral beliefs of
11 students who participate in programs for which financial
12 assistance is provided from those funds, or of the parents
13 or legal guardians of such students.

14 SEC. 512. None of the funds made available in this
15 Act may be transferred to any department, agency, or in-
16 strumentality of the United States Government, except
17 pursuant to a transfer made by, or transfer authority pro-
18 vided in, this Act or any other appropriations Act.

19 SEC. 513. Any funds provided in this Act used to im-
20 plement E-Government Initiatives shall be subject to the
21 procedures set forth in section 505 of this Act.

22 SEC. 514. (a) None of the funds appropriated or oth-
23 erwise made available under this Act may be used by the
24 Departments of Commerce and Justice, the National Aer-
25 onautics and Space Administration, or the National

1 Science Foundation to acquire a high-impact or moderate-
2 impact information system, as defined for security cat-
3 egorization in the National Institute of Standards and
4 Technology's (NIST) Federal Information Processing
5 Standard Publication 199, "Standards for Security Cat-
6 egorization of Federal Information and Information Sys-
7 tems" unless the agency has—

8 (1) reviewed the supply chain risk for the infor-
9 mation systems against criteria developed by NIST
10 and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) to
11 inform acquisition decisions for high-impact and
12 moderate-impact information systems within the
13 Federal Government;

14 (2) reviewed the supply chain risk from the pre-
15 sumptive awardee against available and relevant
16 threat information provided by the FBI and other
17 appropriate agencies; and

18 (3) in consultation with the FBI or other ap-
19 propriate Federal entity, conducted an assessment of
20 any risk of cyber-espionage or sabotage associated
21 with the acquisition of such system, including any
22 risk associated with such system being produced,
23 manufactured, or assembled by one or more entities
24 identified by the United States Government as pos-
25 sible posing a cyber threat, including but not limited to,

1 those that may be owned, directed, or subsidized by
2 the People's Republic of China.

3 (b) None of the funds appropriated or otherwise
4 made available under this Act may be used to acquire a
5 high-impact or moderate-impact information system re-
6 viewed and assessed under subsection (a) unless the head
7 of the assessing entity described in subsection (a) has—

8 (1) developed, in consultation with NIST, the
9 FBI, and supply chain risk management experts, a
10 mitigation strategy for any identified risks;

11 (2) determined, in consultation with NIST and
12 the FBI, that the acquisition of such system is in
13 the national interest of the United States; and

14 (3) reported that determination to the Commit-
15 tees on Appropriations of the House of Representa-
16 tives and the Senate and the agency Inspector Gen-
17 eral.

18 SEC. 515. None of the funds made available in this
19 Act shall be used in any way whatsoever to support or
20 justify the use of torture by any official or contract em-
21 ployee of the United States Government.

22 SEC. 516. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision
23 of law or treaty, in fiscal year 2018 and each fiscal year
24 thereafter, none of the funds appropriated or otherwise
25 made available under this Act or any other Act may be

1 expended or obligated by a department, agency, or instru-
2 mentality of the United States to pay administrative ex-
3 penses or to compensate an officer or employee of the
4 United States in connection with requiring an export li-
5 cense for the export to Canada of components, parts, ac-
6 cessories or attachments for firearms listed in Category
7 I, section 121.1 of title 22, Code of Federal Regulations
8 (International Trafficking in Arms Regulations (ITAR),
9 part 121, as it existed on April 1, 2005) with a total value
10 not exceeding \$500 wholesale in any transaction, provided
11 that the conditions of subsection (b) of this section are
12 met by the exporting party for such articles.

13 (b) The foregoing exemption from obtaining an ex-
14 port license—

15 (1) does not exempt an exporter from filing any
16 Shipper's Export Declaration or notification letter
17 required by law, or from being otherwise eligible
18 under the laws of the United States to possess, ship,
19 transport, or export the articles enumerated in sub-
20 section (a); and

21 (2) does not permit the export without a license
22 of—

23 (A) fully automatic firearms and compo-
24 nents and parts for such firearms, other than

1 for end use by the Federal Government, or a
2 Provincial or Municipal Government of Canada;

3 (B) barrels, cylinders, receivers (frames) or
4 complete breech mechanisms for any firearm
5 listed in Category I, other than for end use by
6 the Federal Government, or a Provincial or Mu-
7 nicipal Government of Canada; or

8 (C) articles for export from Canada to an-
9 other foreign destination.

10 (c) In accordance with this section, the District Di-
11 rectors of Customs and postmasters shall permit the per-
12 manent or temporary export without a license of any un-
13 classified articles specified in subsection (a) to Canada for
14 end use in Canada or return to the United States, or tem-
15 porary import of Canadian-origin items from Canada for
16 end use in the United States or return to Canada for a
17 Canadian citizen.

18 (d) The President may require export licenses under
19 this section on a temporary basis if the President deter-
20 mines, upon publication first in the Federal Register, that
21 the Government of Canada has implemented or main-
22 tained inadequate import controls for the articles specified
23 in subsection (a), such that a significant diversion of such
24 articles has and continues to take place for use in inter-
25 national terrorism or in the escalation of a conflict in an-

1 other nation. The President shall terminate the require-
2 ments of a license when reasons for the temporary require-
3 ments have ceased.

4 SEC. 517. Notwithstanding any other provision of
5 law, in fiscal year 2018 and each fiscal year thereafter,
6 no department, agency, or instrumentality of the United
7 States receiving appropriated funds under this Act or any
8 other Act shall obligate or expend in any way such funds
9 to pay administrative expenses or the compensation of any
10 officer or employee of the United States to deny any appli-
11 cation submitted pursuant to 22 U.S.C. 2778(b)(1)(B)
12 and qualified pursuant to 27 CFR section 478.112 or
13 .113, for a permit to import United States origin “curios
14 or relics” firearms, parts, or ammunition.

15 SEC. 518. None of the funds made available in this
16 Act may be used to include in any new bilateral or multi-
17 lateral trade agreement the text of—

18 (1) paragraph 2 of article 16.7 of the United
19 States–Singapore Free Trade Agreement;

20 (2) paragraph 4 of article 17.9 of the United
21 States–Australia Free Trade Agreement; or

22 (3) paragraph 4 of article 15.9 of the United
23 States–Morocco Free Trade Agreement.

24 SEC. 519. None of the funds made available in this
25 Act may be used to authorize or issue a national security

1 letter in contravention of any of the following laws author-
2 izing the Federal Bureau of Investigation to issue national
3 security letters: The Right to Financial Privacy Act of
4 1978; The Electronic Communications Privacy Act of
5 1986; The Fair Credit Reporting Act; The National Secu-
6 rity Act of 1947; USA PATRIOT Act; USA FREEDOM
7 Act of 2015; and the laws amended by these Acts.

8 SEC. 520. If at any time during any quarter, the pro-
9 gram manager of a project within the jurisdiction of the
10 Departments of Commerce or Justice, the National Aero-
11 nautics and Space Administration, or the National Science
12 Foundation totaling more than \$75,000,000 has reason-
13 able cause to believe that the total program cost has in-
14 creased by 10 percent or more, the program manager shall
15 immediately inform the respective Secretary, Adminis-
16 trator, or Director. The Secretary, Administrator, or Di-
17 rector shall notify the House and Senate Committees on
18 Appropriations within 30 days in writing of such increase,
19 and shall include in such notice: the date on which such
20 determination was made; a statement of the reasons for
21 such increases; the action taken and proposed to be taken
22 to control future cost growth of the project; changes made
23 in the performance or schedule milestones and the degree
24 to which such changes have contributed to the increase
25 in total program costs or procurement costs; new esti-

1 mates of the total project or procurement costs; and a
2 statement validating that the project's management struc-
3 ture is adequate to control total project or procurement
4 costs.

5 SEC. 521. Funds appropriated by this Act, or made
6 available by the transfer of funds in this Act, for intel-
7 ligence or intelligence related activities are deemed to be
8 specifically authorized by the Congress for purposes of sec-
9 tion 504 of the National Security Act of 1947 (50 U.S.C.
10 3094) during fiscal year 2018 until the enactment of the
11 Intelligence Authorization Act for fiscal year 2018.

12 SEC. 522. None of the funds appropriated or other-
13 wise made available by this Act may be used to enter into
14 a contract in an amount greater than \$5,000,000 or to
15 award a grant in excess of such amount unless the pro-
16 spective contractor or grantee certifies in writing to the
17 agency awarding the contract or grant that, to the best
18 of its knowledge and belief, the contractor or grantee has
19 filed all Federal tax returns required during the three
20 years preceding the certification, has not been convicted
21 of a criminal offense under the Internal Revenue Code of
22 1986, and has not, more than 90 days prior to certifi-
23 cation, been notified of any unpaid Federal tax assessment
24 for which the liability remains unsatisfied, unless the as-
25 sessment is the subject of an installment agreement or

1 offer in compromise that has been approved by the Inter-
2 nal Revenue Service and is not in default, or the assess-
3 ment is the subject of a non-frivolous administrative or
4 judicial proceeding.

5 (RESCISSIONS)

6 SEC. 523. (a) Of the unobligated balances from prior
7 year appropriations available to the Department of Com-
8 merce, the following funds are hereby rescinded, not later
9 than September 30, 2018, from the following accounts in
10 the specified amounts—

11 (1) “Economic Development Administration,
12 Economic Development Assistance Programs”,
13 \$47,000,000; and

14 (2) “National Oceanic and Atmospheric Admin-
15 istration, Operations, Research, and Facilities”,
16 \$20,000,000.

17 (b) Of the unobligated balances available to the De-
18 partment of Justice, the following funds are hereby re-
19 scinded, not later than September 30, 2018, from the fol-
20 lowing accounts in the specified amounts—

21 (1) “Working Capital Fund”, \$409,834,000;

22 (2) “Federal Bureau of Investigation, Salaries
23 and Expenses”, \$195,000,000 from fees collected to
24 defray expenses for the automation of fingerprint

1 identification and criminal justice information serv-
2 ices and associated costs;

3 (3) “State and Local Law Enforcement Activi-
4 ties, Office on Violence Against Women, Violence
5 Against Women Prevention and Prosecution Pro-
6 grams”, \$17,500,000;

7 (4) “State and Local Law Enforcement Activi-
8 ties, Office of Justice Programs”, \$60,000,000;

9 (5) “State and Local Law Enforcement Activi-
10 ties, Community Oriented Policing Services”,
11 \$17,500,000;

12 (6) “Legal Activities, Assets Forfeiture Fund”,
13 \$304,000,000 is permanently rescinded; and

14 (7) “Federal Bureau of Investigation, Salaries
15 and Expenses”, \$53,365,000.

16 (c) The Departments of Commerce and Justice shall
17 submit to the Committees on Appropriations of the House
18 of Representatives and the Senate a report no later than
19 September 1, 2018, specifying the amount of each rescis-
20 sion made pursuant to subsections (a) and (b), and the
21 Department of Justice shall ensure that sufficient bal-
22 ances are available in the “Working Capital Fund” to re-
23 scind the amount specified in subsection (b) and shall
24 transfer unobligated balances from discretionary appro-
25 priations (except from “Federal Bureau of Investigation,

1 Salaries and Expenses”, “Fees and Expenses of Wit-
2 nesses”, “Public Safety Officer Benefits”, and amounts
3 that were designated by the Congress as an emergency or
4 disaster relief requirement pursuant to a concurrent reso-
5 lution on the budget or section 251(b)(2) of the Balanced
6 Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985) made
7 available in this Act to the Department into the “Working
8 Capital Fund” if necessary to meet the amount specified
9 in subsection (b) and this transfer authority is in addition
10 to any other transfer authority contained in this Act.

11 SEC. 524. None of the funds made available in this
12 Act may be used to purchase first class or premium airline
13 travel in contravention of sections 301–10.122 through
14 301–10.124 of title 41 of the Code of Federal Regulations.

15 SEC. 525. None of the funds made available in this
16 Act may be used to send or otherwise pay for the attend-
17 ance of more than 50 employees from a Federal depart-
18 ment or agency, who are stationed in the United States,
19 at any single conference occurring outside the United
20 States unless such conference is a law enforcement train-
21 ing or operational conference for law enforcement per-
22 sonnel and the majority of Federal employees in attend-
23 ance are law enforcement personnel stationed outside the
24 United States.

1 SEC. 526. None of the funds appropriated or other-
2 wise made available in this or any other Act may be used
3 to transfer, release, or assist in the transfer or release to
4 or within the United States, its territories, or possessions
5 Khalid Sheikh Mohammed or any other detainee who—

6 (1) is not a United States citizen or a member
7 of the Armed Forces of the United States; and

8 (2) is or was held on or after June 24, 2009,
9 at the United States Naval Station, Guantanamo
10 Bay, Cuba, by the Department of Defense.

11 SEC. 527. (a) None of the funds appropriated or oth-
12 erwise made available in this or any other Act may be used
13 to construct, acquire, or modify any facility in the United
14 States, its territories, or possessions to house any indi-
15 vidual described in subsection (c) for the purposes of de-
16 tention or imprisonment in the custody or under the effec-
17 tive control of the Department of Defense.

18 (b) The prohibition in subsection (a) shall not apply
19 to any modification of facilities at United States Naval
20 Station, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

21 (c) An individual described in this subsection is any
22 individual who, as of June 24, 2009, is located at United
23 States Naval Station, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, and who—

1 (1) is not a citizen of the United States or a
2 member of the Armed Forces of the United States;
3 and

4 (2) is—

5 (A) in the custody or under the effective
6 control of the Department of Defense; or

7 (B) otherwise under detention at United
8 States Naval Station, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

9 SEC. 528. The Director of the Office of Management
10 and Budget shall instruct any department, agency, or in-
11 strumentality of the United States receiving funds appro-
12 priated under this Act to track undisbursed balances in
13 expired grant accounts and include in its annual perform-
14 ance plan and performance and accountability reports the
15 following:

16 (1) Details on future action the department,
17 agency, or instrumentality will take to resolve
18 undisbursed balances in expired grant accounts.

19 (2) The method that the department, agency, or
20 instrumentality uses to track undisbursed balances
21 in expired grant accounts.

22 (3) Identification of undisbursed balances in ex-
23 pired grant accounts that may be returned to the
24 Treasury of the United States.

1 (4) In the preceding 3 fiscal years, details on
2 the total number of expired grant accounts with
3 undisbursed balances (on the first day of each fiscal
4 year) for the department, agency, or instrumentality
5 and the total finances that have not been obligated
6 to a specific project remaining in the accounts.

7 SEC. 529. (a) None of the funds made available by
8 this Act may be used for the National Aeronautics and
9 Space Administration (NASA) or the Office of Science
10 and Technology Policy (OSTP) to develop, design, plan,
11 promulgate, implement, or execute a bilateral policy, pro-
12 gram, order, or contract of any kind to participate, col-
13 laborate, or coordinate bilaterally in any way with China
14 or any Chinese-owned company unless such activities are
15 specifically authorized by a law enacted after the date of
16 enactment of this Act.

17 (b) None of the funds made available by this Act may
18 be used to effectuate the hosting of official Chinese visitors
19 at facilities belonging to or utilized by NASA.

20 (c) The limitations described in subsections (a) and
21 (b) shall not apply to activities which NASA or OSTP,
22 after consultation with the Federal Bureau of Investiga-
23 tion, have certified—

24 (1) pose no risk of resulting in the transfer of
25 technology, data, or other information with national

1 security or economic security implications to China
2 or a Chinese-owned company; and

3 (2) will not involve knowing interactions with
4 officials who have been determined by the United
5 States to have direct involvement with violations of
6 human rights.

7 (d) Any certification made under subsection (c) shall
8 be submitted to the Committees on Appropriations of the
9 House of Representatives and the Senate, and the Federal
10 Bureau of Investigation, no later than 30 days prior to
11 the activity in question and shall include a description of
12 the purpose of the activity, its agenda, its major partici-
13 pants, and its location and timing.

14 SEC. 530. None of the funds made available by this
15 or any other Act, for fiscal year 2018 and each fiscal year
16 thereafter, may be used to pay the salaries or expenses
17 of personnel to deny, or fail to act on, an application for
18 the importation of any model of shotgun if—

19 (1) all other requirements of law with respect to
20 the proposed importation are met; and

21 (2) no application for the importation of such
22 model of shotgun, in the same configuration, had
23 been denied by the Attorney General prior to Janu-
24 ary 1, 2011, on the basis that the shotgun was not

1 particularly suitable for or readily adaptable to
2 sporting purposes.

3 SEC. 531. (a) None of the funds made available in
4 this Act may be used to maintain or establish a computer
5 network unless such network blocks the viewing,
6 downloading, and exchanging of pornography.

7 (b) Nothing in subsection (a) shall limit the use of
8 funds necessary for any Federal, State, tribal, or local law
9 enforcement agency or any other entity carrying out crimi-
10 nal investigations, prosecution, adjudication, or other law
11 enforcement- or victim assistance-related activity.

12 SEC. 532. The Departments of Commerce and Jus-
13 tice, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration,
14 the National Science Foundation, the Commission on Civil
15 Rights, the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission,
16 the International Trade Commission, the Legal Services
17 Corporation, the Marine Mammal Commission, the Offices
18 of Science and Technology Policy and the United States
19 Trade Representative, and the State Justice Institute
20 shall submit spending plans, signed by the respective de-
21 partment or agency head, to the Committees on Appro-
22 priations of the House of Representatives and the Senate
23 within 45 days after the date of enactment of this Act.

24 SEC. 533. None of the funds made available by this
25 Act may be obligated or expended to implement the Arms

1 Trade Treaty until the Senate approves a resolution of
2 ratification for the Treaty.

3 SEC. 534. The Department of Commerce, the Na-
4 tional Aeronautics and Space Administration, and the Na-
5 tional Science Foundation shall provide a quarterly report
6 to the Committees on Appropriations of the House of Rep-
7 resentatives and the Senate on any official travel to China
8 by any employee of such Department or agency, including
9 the purpose of such travel.

10 SEC. 535. Of the amounts made available by this Act,
11 not less than 10 percent of each total amount provided,
12 respectively, for Public Works grants authorized by the
13 Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965 and
14 grants authorized by section 27 of the Stevenson-Wydler
15 Technology Innovation Act of 1980 (15 U.S.C. 3722) shall
16 be allocated for assistance in persistent poverty counties:
17 *Provided*, That for purposes of this section, the term “per-
18 sistent poverty counties” means any county that has had
19 20 percent or more of its population living in poverty over
20 the past 30 years, as measured by the 1990 and 2000
21 decennial censuses and the most recent Small Area In-
22 come and Poverty Estimates.

23 SEC. 536. None of the funds made available by this
24 Act may be used to approve the registration or renewal
25 of, or maintain the registration of, a mark, trade name,

1 or commercial name, under the Act entitled “An Act to
2 provide for the registration and protection of trademarks
3 used in commerce, to carry out the provisions of certain
4 international conventions, and for other purposes”, ap-
5 proved July 6, 1946 (commonly referred to as the “Trade-
6 mark Act of 1946”; 15 U.S.C. 1051 et seq.), including
7 the receipt or acceptance of post-registration affidavits or
8 declarations, where such mark, trade name, or commercial
9 name is the same or substantially similar to a mark, trade
10 name, or commercial name that was used in connection
11 with a business or assets that were confiscated, as that
12 term is defined in section 4(4) of the Cuban Liberty and
13 Democratic Solidarity (LIBERTAD) Act of 1996 (22
14 U.S.C. 6023(4)), unless the original owner of the mark,
15 trade name, or commercial name, or the bona-fide suc-
16 cessor-in-interest has expressly consented.

17 SEC. 537. None of the funds made available by this
18 Act may be used to require a person licensed under section
19 923 of title 18, United States Code, to report information
20 to the Department of Justice regarding the sale of mul-
21 tiple rifles or shotguns to the same person.

22 SEC. 538. (a) A State may bring a civil action against
23 the United States in an appropriate United States district
24 court for such declaratory and injunctive relief (including
25 preliminary injunctive relief) as may be necessary to re-

1 store the sovereignty reserved to the States by the Con-
2 stitution. It shall be duty of the courts of the United
3 States to advance on the docket and to expedite to the
4 greatest possible extent the disposition of any such action.

5 (b) This section shall take effect on the date of enact-
6 ment of this Act and continue in effect through all fiscal
7 years thereafter.

8 SEC. 539. None of the funds made available by this
9 Act may be used to relocate the Bureau of Alcohol, To-
10 bacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) Canine Training
11 Center or the ATF National Canine Division.

12 SEC. 540. None of the funds made available by this
13 Act may be used to enter into a civil settlement agreement
14 on behalf of the United States that includes a term requir-
15 ing that any donation be made to any non-party by any
16 party-defendant to such agreement.
