### A BILL

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023, and for other purposes.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
4	money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
5	Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September
6	30, 2023, and for other purposes, namely:

9	HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES
10	SALARIES AND EXPENSES
11	For salaries and expenses of the House of Represent-
12	atives, \$1,868,785,000, as follows:
13	House Leadership Offices
14	For salaries and expenses, as authorized by law,
15	\$36,560,000, including: Office of the Speaker,
16	\$10,499,000, including \$35,000 for official expenses of
17	the Speaker; Office of the Majority Floor Leader,
18	\$3,730,000, including \$15,000 for official expenses of the
19	Majority Leader; Office of the Minority Floor Leader,
20	\$10,499,000, including \$17,500 for official expenses of
21	the Minority Leader; Office of the Majority Whip, includ-
22	ing the Chief Deputy Majority Whip, \$3,099,000, includ-
23	ing \$5,000 for official expenses of the Majority Whip; Of-
24	fice of the Minority Whip, including the Chief Deputy Mi-

3 For the allowance established under section 113 of 4 the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 2020 (2) 5 U.S.C. 5106) for the compensation of interns who serve in House leadership offices, \$586,000, to remain available 6 7 through January 2, 2024: Provided. That of the amount 8 provided under this heading, \$322,300 shall be available 9 for the compensation of interns who serve in House leader-10 ship offices of the majority, to be allocated among such 11 offices by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, 12 and \$263,700 shall be available for the compensation of 13 interns who serve in House leadership offices of the minority, to be allocated among such offices by the Minority 14 15 Floor Leader.

\$1,300,000 shall be available for the compensation of in3 terns who serve in offices of the minority, to be allocated
4 among such offices by the Chair, in consultation with the
5 ranking minority member, of the Committee on House Ad6 ministration.

9 For the allowance established under section 10 113(a)(2) of the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 11 2022 (Public Law 117–103) for the compensation of in-12 terns who serve in offices of the Committee on Appropriations, \$463,000: *Provided*, That of the amount provided 13 under this heading, \$231,500 shall be available for the 14 15 compensation of interns who serve in offices of the majority, and \$231,500 shall be available for the compensation 16 17 of interns who serve in offices of the minority, to be allocated among such offices by the Chair, in consultation 18 with the ranking minority member, of the Committee on 19 Appropriations. 20

22 STANDING COMMITTEES, SPECIAL AND SELECT

23 For salaries and expenses of standing committees,
24 special and select, authorized by House resolutions,
25 \$188,971,000: *Provided*, That such amount shall remain

available for such salaries and expenses until December
 31, 2024, except that \$5,800,000 of such amount shall
 remain available until expended for committee room up grading.

5 Committee on Appropriations

6 For salaries and expenses of the Committee on Ap-7 propriations, \$31,294,000, including studies and examina-8 tions of executive agencies and temporary personal serv-9 ices for such committee, to be expended in accordance with 10 section 202(b) of the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946 and to be available for reimbursement to agencies 11 12 for services performed: *Provided*, That such amount shall remain available for such salaries and expenses until De-13 14 cember 31, 2024.

#### 15 SALARIES, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

16 For compensation and expenses of officers and employees, as authorized by law, \$323,557,000, including: 17 for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Clerk, includ-18 ing the positions of the Chaplain and the Historian, and 19 including not more than \$25,000 for official representa-20 21 tion and reception expenses, of which not more than 22 \$20,000 is for the Family Room and not more than 23 \$2,000 is for the Office of the Chaplain, \$40,827,000, of 24 which \$9,000,000 shall remain available until expended; 25 for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Sergeant at

Arms, including the position of Superintendent of Garages 1 2 and the Office of Emergency Management, and including 3 not more than \$3,000 for official representation and re-4 ception expenses, \$38,793,000, of which \$22,232,000 5 shall remain available until expended; for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Chief Administrative Officer 6 7 including not more than \$3,000 for official representation 8 and reception expenses, \$211,572,000, of which 9 \$25,977,000 shall remain available until expended; for sal-10 aries and expenses of the Office of Diversity and Inclusion, 11 \$3,000,000, of which \$1,000,000 shall remain available 12 until expended; for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Whistleblower Ombuds, \$1,250,000; for salaries and 13 14 expenses of the Office of the Inspector General, \$5,138,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of Gen-15 eral Counsel, \$1,912,000; for salaries and expenses of the 16 17 Office of the Parliamentarian, including the Parliamentarian, \$2,000 for preparing the Digest of Rules, and not 18 more than \$1,000 for official representation and reception 19 expenses, \$2,184,000; for salaries and expenses of the Of-20 21 fice of the Law Revision Counsel of the House, 22 \$3,746,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of the 23 Legislative Counsel of the House, \$13,457,000, of which 24 \$2,000,000 shall remain available until expended; for sala-25 ries and expenses of the Office of Interparliamentary Affairs, \$934,000; for other authorized employees,
 \$744,000.

4 For allowances and expenses as authorized by House 5 resolution or law, \$444,115,200, including: supplies, materials, administrative costs and Federal tort claims, 6 7 \$1,555,000; official mail for committees, leadership of-8 fices, and administrative offices of the House, \$190,000; 9 Government contributions for health, retirement, Social 10 Security, contractor support for actuarial projections, and 11 other applicable employee benefits, \$387,368,200, to re-12 main available until March 31, 2024, except that \$35,000,000 of such amount shall remain available until 13 14 expended; salaries and expenses for Business Continuity 15 and Disaster Recovery, \$22,841,000, of which \$6,776,000 shall remain available until expended; transition activities 16 for new members and staff, \$19,225,000, to remain avail-17 18 able until expended; Green and Gold Congressional Aide Program, \$9,674,000, to remain available until expended; 19 20 Office of Congressional Ethics, \$1,762,000; and miscella-21 neous items including purchase, exchange, maintenance, 22 repair and operation of House motor vehicles, inter-23 parliamentary receptions, and gratuities to heirs of de-24 ceased employees of the House, \$1,500,000.

19	SEC. 110. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision
20	of law, any amounts appropriated under this Act for
21	"HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES—SALARIES AND
22	Expenses—Members' Representational Allow-
23	ANCES" shall be available only for fiscal year 2023. Any
24	amount remaining after all payments are made under such
25	allowances for fiscal year 2023 shall be deposited in the

Treasury and used for deficit reduction (or, if there is no
 Federal budget deficit after all such payments have been
 made, for reducing the Federal debt, in such manner as
 the Secretary of the Treasury considers appropriate).

5 (b) The Committee on House Administration of the
6 House of Representatives shall have authority to prescribe
7 regulations to carry out this section.

8 (c) As used in this section, the term "Member of the
9 House of Representatives" means a Representative in, or
10 a Delegate or Resident Commissioner to, the Congress.

11 LIMITATION ON AMOUNT AVAILABLE TO LEASE VEHICLES

12 SEC. 111. None of the funds made available in this 13 Act may be used by the Chief Administrative Officer of 14 the House of Representatives to make any payments from 15 any Members' Representational Allowance for the leasing 16 of a vehicle, excluding mobile district offices, in an aggre-17 gate amount that exceeds \$1,000 for the vehicle in any 18 month.

19 CYBERSECURITY ASSISTANCE FOR HOUSE OF

#### REPRESENTATIVES

21 SEC. 112. The head of any Federal entity that pro-22 vides assistance to the House of Representatives in the 23 House's efforts to deter, prevent, mitigate, or remediate 24 cybersecurity risks to, and incidents involving, the infor-25 mation systems of the House shall take all necessary steps

to ensure the constitutional integrity of the separate
 branches of the government at all stages of providing the
 assistance, including applying minimization procedures to
 limit the spread or sharing of privileged House and Mem ber information.

6	HOUSE INTERN RESOURCE OFFICE
7	Sec. 113. (a) Establishment; Coordinator.—
8	(1) ESTABLISHMENT; COORDINATOR.—There is
9	established in the Office of the Chief Administrative
10	Officer of the House of Representatives the House
11	Intern Resource Office (hereinafter referred to as
12	the "Office").
13	(2) APPOINTMENT.—The Office shall be headed
14	by the House Intern Resource Coordinator (herein-
15	after referred to as the "Coordinator"), who shall be
16	employed by the Chief Administrative Officer in con-
17	sultation with the chair and ranking minority mem-
18	ber of the Committee on House Administration.
19	(b) DUTIES.—In consultation with the Office of Di-
20	versity and Inclusion and such other offices as the Coordi-
21	nator considers appropriate, the Office shall:
22	(1) provide support services, such as accom-
23	modations, training, and professional development,
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to interns of offices of the House of Representatives;

(2) serve as a center for resources and best
 practices for the recruitment, hiring, training, and
 use of interns by offices of the House of Representa tives; and

5 (3) gather demographic and other data about6 interns of offices of the House of Representatives.

7 (c) Addressing Inequities in Access to Intern-8 SHIPS.—In carrying out its duties, the Office shall con-9 sider inequities in access to internships in offices of the House of Representatives, and shall consider the viability 10 of establishing an intern stipend program for interns from 11 12 under represented backgrounds, including those who at-13 Historically Black Colleges and Universities tend (HBCUs), Tribal Colleges or Universities, Hispanic-Serv-14 15 ing Institutions (HSIs), and other Minority Serving Institutions described in section 371(a) of the Higher Edu-16 17 cation Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1067q(a)).

(d) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
are authorized to be appropriated for fiscal year 2023 and
each succeeding fiscal year such sums as may be necessary
to carry out this section.

(e) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall apply with
respect to fiscal year 2023 and each succeeding fiscal year.

2	DEVELOPMENT FOR HOUSE EMPLOYEES
3	SEC. 114. (a) EXPANSION OF STUDENT LOAN RE-
4	PAYMENT PROGRAM TO COVER EDUCATIONAL ASSIST-
5	ANCE AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT.—Section
6	105(a) of the Legislative Appropriations Act, $2003$ (2
7	U.S.C. 4536(a)) is amended to read as follows:
8	"(a) Program to cover student loan
9	REPAYMENT, EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANCE, AND
10	PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT FOR HOUSE EM-
11	PLOYEES.—
12	"(1) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Chief
13	Administrative Officer shall establish a
14	program under which an employing office
15	of the House of Representatives may
16	agree—
17	"(A) to repay (by direct payment
18	on behalf of the employee) any stu-
19	dent loan previously taken out by an
20	employee of the office;
21	"(B) to make direct payments on
22	behalf of an employee of the office or
23	to reimburse an employee of the office
24	for expenses paid by the employee for

the employee's educational and profes-
sional development; and
"(C) to make direct payments on
behalf of an employee of the office or
to reimburse an employee of the office
for credentialing, professional accredi-
tation, professional licensure, and pro-
fessional certification expenses paid by
the employee.
"(2) Exclusion of members.—For
purposes of this section, a Member of the
House of Representatives (including a Del-
egate or Resident Commissioner to the
Congress) shall not be considered to be an
employee of the House of Representa-
tives."
(b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendment made by
subsection (a) shall apply with respect to payments made
during fiscal year 2023 or any succeeding fiscal year.

(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—In order to retain 19 qualified personnel, the Chief of the Capitol Police shall 20 have authority to accept unpaid multi-denominational 21 chaplain services whereby volunteers from multiple faiths 22 may advise, administer, and perform professional work in-23 volved in a program of spiritual welfare and religious guid-24 ance for Capitol Police employees.

8 (0)(1) No part of overtime pay (as described in sec-9 tion 8331(3)(J) paid to a member of the Capitol Police 10 shall be treated as basic pay for purposes of any computation of an annuity under this section, unless, before the 11 12 date of the separation on which entitlement to annuity is based, the separating individual has completed at least 15 13 vears of service (whether performed before, on, or after 14 15 the date of the enactment of this subsection).

16 "(2) If the condition under paragraph (1) is met, then any amounts received by the individual in the form 17 18 of such overtime pay shall (for the purposes referred to in paragraph (1)) be treated as basic pay, but only to the 19 20 extent that such amounts are attributable to service per-21 formed on or after the date of the enactment of this sub-22 section, and only to the extent of the percentage allowable, 23 which shall be determined as follows:

1	"(3) Notwithstanding any other provision of this sub-
2	section, 100 percent of all amounts received as overtime
3	pay (as described in section $8331(3)(J)$ ) shall, to the ex-

6	pay for purposes of computing—
7	"(A) an annuity under section 8452; and
8	"(B) a survivor annuity under subchapter IV, if
9	based on the service of an individual who dies before

6 For salaries and expenses necessary for the operation 7 of the Office of Congressional Workplace Rights, as au-8 thorized by section 305 of the Congressional Account-9 ability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1385), \$8,000,000, of which 10 \$2,500,000 shall remain available until September 30, 2024: Provided, That not more than \$1,000 may be ex-11 12 pended on the certification of the Executive Director in 13 connection with official representation and reception ex-14 penses.

#### SALARIES AND EXPENSES

17 For salaries and expenses necessary for operation of 18 the Congressional Budget Office, including not more than 19 \$6,000 to be expended on the certification of the Director 20 of the Congressional Budget Office in connection with offi-21 cial representation and reception expenses, \$64,637,000. 22 Provided, That the Director shall use not less than 23 \$500,000 of the amount made available under this head-24 ing for (1) improving technical systems, processes, and models for the purpose of improving the transparency of 25

estimates of budgetary effects to Members of Congress,
 employees of Members of Congress, and the public, and
 (2) to increase the availability of models, economic as sumptions, and data for Members of Congress, employees

17 (3) reported that determination to the Commit-18 tees on Appropriations of the House of Representa-19 tives and the Senate in a manner that identifies the 20 telecommunications equipment for inclusion in a 21 high or moderate impact system intended for acqui-22 sition and a detailed description of the mitigation 23 strategies identified in paragraph (1), provided that 24 such report may include a classified annex as nec-25 essary.

1 PROHIBITION ON CERTAIN OPERATIONAL EXPENSES

2 SEC. 209. (a) None of the funds made available in
3 this Act may be used to maintain or establish a computer
4 network unless such network blocks the viewing,
5 downloading, and exchanging of pornography.

6 (b) Nothing in subsection (a) shall limit the use of
7 funds necessary for any Federal, State, tribal, or local law
8 enforcement agency or any other entity carrying out crimi9 nal investigations, prosecution, or adjudication activities
10 or other official government activities.

11 PLASTIC WASTE REDUCTION

12 SEC. 210. All agencies and offices funded by this Act 13 that contract with a food service provider or providers 14 shall confer and coordinate with such food service provider 15 or providers, in consultation with disability advocacy 16 groups, to eliminate or reduce plastic waste, including waste from plastic straws, explore the use of biodegradable 17 items, and increase recycling and composting opportuni-18 19 ties.

20 CAPITOL COMPLEX HEALTH AND SAFETY

21 SEC. 211. In addition to the amounts appropriated 22 under this Act under the heading "OFFICE OF THE AT-23 TENDING PHYSICIAN", there is hereby appropriated to the 24 Office of the Attending Physician \$5,000,000, to remain 25 available until expended, for response to COVID-19, in-

Notwithstanding any other provision of 13 law, an entity may use amounts appropriated or otherwise made available under this Act to pay the compensation 14 15 of an officer or employee without regard to the officers or employees immigration status if the officer or employee 16 has been issued an employment authorization document 17 under the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals Pro-18 19 gram of the Secretary of Homeland Security, established pursuant to the memorandum from the Secretary of 20 21 Homeland Security entitled "Exercising Prosecutorial 22 Discretion with Respect to Individuals Who Came to the 23 United States as Children", dated June 15, 2012.

1 REMOVAL OF OFFENSIVE UNITED STATES CAPITOL

#### STATUARY

3 SEC. 214. (a) REMOVAL AND STORAGE.—Not later
4 than 45 days after the date of the enactment of this Act,
5 the Architect of the Capitol—

6 (1) shall remove all Confederate statues and 7 Confederate busts from any area of the United 8 States Capitol which is accessible to the public; and 9 (2) shall remove the bust of Roger Brooke 10 Taney; the statue of Charles Brantley Aycock; the 11 statue of John Caldwell Calhoun; and the statue of 12 James Paul Clarke from any area of the United 13 States Capitol, which is accessible to the public.

(b) STORAGE OF STATUES.—In the case of any statue removed under subsection (a), the Architect of the Capitol shall keep such statue in storage until the Architect
and the State which provided the statue arrange for the
return of the statue to the State.

19 (c) DEFINITIONS.—

(1) CONFEDERATE STATUE.—In this section,
the term "Confederate statue" means a statue which
was provided by a State for display in the United
States Capitol under section 1814 of the Revised
Statutes (2 U.S.C. 2131), including a replacement
statue provided by a State under section 311 of the

3 (A) any individual who served voluntarily
4 at any time as a member of the armed forces

(2) CONFEDERATE BUST.—In this section, the

of paragraph (1).
