Cheyenne currently holds the position of Secretary for the Omaha Tribe of Nebraska, where she manages official communications, records Tribal Council proceedings, and advocates for federal funding to address critical community needs. Her work involves strategic planning, strengthening public safety infrastructure, and enhancing essential services for her Tribe. Prior to her current role, Cheyenne served as the Administrative Manager of the Nebraska Indian Child Welfare Coalition (NICWC), where she oversaw financial operations, managed budgets, ensured regulatory compliance, and played a key role in child welfare policy development. Her leadership experience extends to her tenure as a Tribal Council Member, where she represented tribal interests in governance, economic initiatives, and federal-state relations.

Cheyenne's academic journey reflects her commitment to continuous learning and advocacy. She recently received her Master of Legal Studies (MLS) degree at the University of Oklahoma, holds a Master of Business Administration (MBA) from Bellevue University, and earned her undergraduate degree from Haskell Indian Nations University. Her skills in budget oversight, policy development, public speaking, and strategic planning enable her to navigate complex intergovernmental relationships while fostering community-driven solutions.

Cheyenne's professional interests include advancing tribal sovereignty through legal advocacy, promoting sustainable economic development, enhancing public health services with an emphasis on mental health and substance abuse programs, and improving public safety infrastructure. Her dedication to serving her community is reflected in her ongoing efforts to secure necessary resources, including funding for a new tribal detention facility and expanded healthcare services.
