**Robert de los Angeles**  
**Chairman**  
**Snoqualmie Indian Tribe**

For the past 12 years, Chairman de los Angeles has served on the Snoqualmie Tribe's Tribal Council. Soon after being elected, he was voted as Vice Chairman by the Tribal Council and later, in 2018, elected as Chairman by the General Membership.

In his role as Chairman, Mr. de los Angeles has focused his efforts on protecting the Snoqualmie people's irreplaceable cultural heritage and advancing the Tribe's sovereignty. During his tenure on Council, the Snoqualmie Tribe obtained 10,000 acres of forest land in its ancestral homelands, became the owners of the globally recognized 8th Generation, a native art and lifestyle brand, and purchased the land around the Tribe's sacred site, sacred Snoqualmie Falls, to ensure its preservation now and in the future.

In 2023, Chairman de los Angeles received the Martin Luther King Medal of Distinguished Service for his contributions to the King County community.

Chairman de los Angeles grew up and worked on a family farm in Woodinville, WA. After graduating from Bothell High School in 1971, he served in the U.S. Army from 1972 to 1976, including a year in Korea. He worked for 30 years in the steel trades, including 17 years as a shop superintendent and additional years as a foreman and leader in other roles.

While not serving in his capacity as Chairman, Mr. de los Angeles spends time with his wife of over 48 years, Debbie, his sons, grandson, two step-granddaughters, step-great-granddaughter, and step-great-grandson.
