Ben Castleman is an Assistant Professor of Education and Public Policy at the University of Virginia. Ben's research applies insights from behavioral economics and social psychology to improve college access and success for low-income and non-traditional students. He has conducted several randomized trials to investigate innovative strategies to deliver high-quality information about the college-going process to students and their families, and to ease the process of students and families getting professional support when they need assistance. Ben's work has been published in *The Journal of Policy Analysis and Management*, *The Journal of Research on Educational Effectiveness*, *Social Sciences Quarterly*, and *New Directions for Youth Development*. Ben's research has been generously supported by The Michael and Susan Dell Foundation, The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, The W.T. Grant Foundation, The Heckscher Foundation for Children, The Kresge Foundation, The Lumina Foundation, The Spencer Foundation, and The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board. His research has received extensive media coverage, including *The New York Times*, National Public Radio, *Time Magazine*, and *The Washington Post*. Ben is a recipient of a National Academy of Education/Spencer Foundation Dissertation Fellowship and a Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Dissertation Fellowship. He is a Lumina Foundation/Institute for Higher Education Policy Academic Fellow, and is a recipient of the K. Patricia Cross Future Leaders award, given annually by The Association of American Colleges and Universities.
