A BILL

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2021, and for other purposes.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
4	money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
5	Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September
6	30, 2021, and for other purposes, namely:

11 SEC. 110. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any amounts appropriated under this Act for 12 "HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES—SALARIES AND 13 EXPENSES—MEMBERS' Representational 14 ALLOW-15 ANCES" shall be available only for fiscal year 2021. Any amount remaining after all payments are made under such 16 17 allowances for fiscal year 2021 shall be deposited in the 18 Treasury and used for deficit reduction (or, if there is no 19 Federal budget deficit after all such payments have been made, for reducing the Federal debt, in such manner as 2021 the Secretary of the Treasury considers appropriate).

(b) The Committee on House Administration of the
House of Representatives shall have authority to prescribe
regulations to carry out this section.

(c) As used in this section, the term "Member of the
 House of Representatives" means a Representative in, or
 a Delegate or Resident Commissioner to, the Congress.

4 LIMITATION ON AMOUNT AVAILABLE TO LEASE VEHICLES

5 SEC. 111. None of the funds made available in this 6 Act may be used by the Chief Administrative Officer of 7 the House of Representatives to make any payments from 8 any Members' Representational Allowance for the leasing 9 of a vehicle, excluding mobile district offices, in an aggre-10 gate amount that exceeds \$1,000 for the vehicle in any 11 month.

12 CYBERSECURITY ASSISTANCE FOR HOUSE OF 13 REPRESENTATIVES

14 SEC. 112. The head of any Federal entity that pro-15 vides assistance to the House of Representatives in the House's efforts to deter, prevent, mitigate, or remediate 16 cybersecurity risks to, and incidents involving, the infor-17 mation systems of the House shall take all necessary steps 18 to ensure the constitutional integrity of the separate 19 20 branches of the government at all stages of providing the 21 assistance, including applying minimization procedures to 22 limit the spread or sharing of privileged House and Mem-23 ber information.

RESCISSIONS OF FUNDS

SEC. 113. (a) Of the unobligated balances available from prior appropriations Acts from the revolving fund established under House Resolution 64, Ninety Eighth Congress, agreed to February 8, 1983, as enacted into permanent law by section 110 of the Congressional Operations Appropriation Act, 1984 (2 U.S.C. 4917), \$212,000 is hereby rescinded.

9 (b) Of the unobligated balances available from prior 10 appropriations Acts from the revolving fund established in 11 the item relating to "Stationery" under the heading 12 "House of Representatives, Contingent Expenses of the 13 House" in the first section of the Legislative Branch Ap-14 propriation Act, 1948 (2 U.S.C. 5534), \$1,000,000 is 15 hereby rescinded.

Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 2005 (2 U.S.C.
5538), \$2,000,000 is hereby rescinded.

SEC. 114. (a) INCREASE IN LIFETIME LIMIT.—Section 105 of the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act,
2003 (2 U.S.C. 4536) is amended—

1	(A) is an employee of an employing office
2	of the House during fiscal year 2021 or any
3	succeeding fiscal year;
4	(B) prior to fiscal year 2021, had pay-

(b) STORAGE OF STATUES.—In the case of any stat-ue removed under subsection (a), the Architect of the Cap-

itol shall keep such statue in storage until the Architect
 and the State which provided the statue arrange for the
 return of the statue to the State.

4 (c) DEFINITIONS.—

5 (1) Confederate statue.—In this section, the term 6 "Confederate statue" means a statue which was provided 7 by a State for display in the United States Capitol under 8 section 1814 of the Revised Statutes (2 U.S.C. 2131), in-9 cluding a replacement statue provided by a State under 10 section 311 of the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 11 2001 (2 U.S.C. 2132), which depicts—

(A) any individual who served voluntarily at any
time as a member of the armed forces of the Confederate States of America or of the military forces of
a State while the State was in rebellion against the
United States; or

(B) any individual who served as an official in
the government of the Confederate States of America or of a State while the State was in rebellion
against the United States.

(2) Confederate bust.—In this section, the term "Confederate bust" means a bust which depicts an in individual
described in subparagraph (A) or (B) of paragraph (1).
This Act may be cited as the "Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 2021".
