Dr. Aaron L. Friedberg is Professor of Politics and International Affairs at Princeton University, where he has been a member of the faculty since 1987, and co-director of the Woodrow Wilson School's Center for International Security Studies. Dr. Friedberg is also a non-resident senior fellow at the German Marshall Fund of the United States, a senior advisor to the National Bureau of Asian Research, a consultant to the Long-Term Strategy Group in Washington, D.C. and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and the International Institute for Strategic Studies in London.

From June 2003 to June 2005 Dr. Friedberg served as a Deputy Assistant for National Security Affairs and Director of Policy Planning in the office of the Vice President. After leaving government he was appointed to the Defense Policy Board and the Secretary of State's Advisory Committee on Democracy Promotion. He has been a consultant to various agencies of the U.S. government, including the Department of Defense, Los Alamos National Laboratory, and the Central Intelligence Agency. In 2011-2012 he served as co-chair of the Asia-Pacific Working Group and the China Policy Transition Team of the Romney for President Campaign. In 2016 he was a member of the National Security Advisory Council for Senator Marco Rubio's presidential campaign.

In 2001-2002 Friedberg was selected as the first occupant of the Henry A. Kissinger Chair at the Library of Congress. He has been a research fellow at the Australian Strategic Policy Institute, the Norwegian Nobel Institute, the Smithsonian Institution's Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in Washington, D.C., and Harvard University's Center for International Affairs.

Dr. Friedberg is the author of five books, including A Contest for Supremacy: China, America, and the Struggle for Mastery in Asia (published in 2011 and translated into Japanese, Chinese, and Korean), Beyond Air-Sea Battle: The Debate Over U.S. Military Strategy in Asia (published in 2014 and translated into Japanese) and The Authoritarian Challenge: China, Russia and the Threat to the Liberal International Order (forthcoming). He recently published a report entitled "Rethinking the Economic Dimension of U.S. China Strategy" (August 2017). His articles and essays have appeared in a number of publications, including The New York Times, The Wall Street Journal, The Washington Post, The Los Angeles Times, Commentary, The National Interest, The American Interest, The Weekly Standard, Foreign Affairs, The Washington Quarterly, Survival, and International Security.

Dr. Friedberg received his A.B., M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from Harvard University.
