



Diana Moldafsky is a Director in the U.S. Government Accountability Office's (GAO) Defense Capabilities and Management team, where she leads GAO's work examining Department of Defense military operations, force structure, warfighter support, and military training. Her recent portfolio includes reviews of Army and Air Force reserve capabilities, V-22 Osprey accidents, the Pacific Deterrence Initiative, and fuel resupply in the Indo-Pacific. Since joining GAO in 2002, she has also served as an Assistant Director in the Contracting and National Security Acquisitions team, managing reviews of U.S. Navy shipbuilding programs. In this capacity, she led over 50 reports and testimony statements on multi-billion-dollar programs—including the Columbia-class submarine and Littoral Combat Ships—resulting in over \$5 billion in financial savings and 80 operational improvements. Her contributions have earned her numerous individual and agency-wide awards. Previously, she completed fellowships in the German Federal Foreign Office, the German Institute for International and Security Affairs, and the German Bundestag. She holds a bachelor's degree in history and international relations from San Francisco State University and a master's degree in political science from the University of California, Santa Barbara.
