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David Garcia is a nationally recognized expert in housing and land use policy with a specific focus on housing supply. His work as both an academic and advocate has directly led to legislative changes in California and other states as well as in federal policy. David has worked to build coalitions across disparate interest groups to support pro-housing policies and has also collaborated with policymakers of both political parties to find common ground on the best policies to address the country's housing supply and affordability crisis. Across his career, David has published dozens of research papers on topics as varied as the economics that underpin real estate development, quantifying the breadth of the country's housing shortage, the impacts of zoning changes on housing supply, and tenant protections. His insights and analysis have been covered in media outlets such as the New York Times, the Wall Street Journal, the Washington Post, and NPR, among others. David is also a prominent speaker in the pro-housing movement and is regularly featured at national conferences and convenings.
