She has also worked closely with Hartford HealthCare and broader regional healthcare leadership initiatives centered on collaboration, healthcare delivery, and institutional engagement.

As the spouse of a surgeon, Shekman also brings firsthand understanding of the personal, professional, and financial commitment required of physicians and healthcare trainees, as well as the pressures facing today's medical workforce and academic training environments.

A proud naturalized American citizen for nearly a decade, Shekman brings both personal and professional commitment to civic responsibility, democratic values, and the importance of strong institutions. Previously a member of AJMA's Board of Directors, Shekman has played a central role in strengthening the organization's governance, national partnerships, and institutional engagement efforts addressing antisemitism in healthcare and medical education. Her work has focused on healthcare workplace climate, physician and trainee support, professional ethics, and institutional accountability.

She serves on multiple national and local nonprofit and advisory boards, including the Jewish Federation of Greater Hartford, Jewish Federations of North America's National Women's Philanthropy, Hartford Hospital Auxiliary, Voices of Hope, and the George Washington University Family Advisory Council. She is also a Strategic Advisor to George Washington University's Program on Extremism and participates in national civic and policy engagement initiatives, including AIPAC's New Leadership Network and as Connecticut's political network co-chair.
