Dr. Genevieve Siegel-Hawley is a professor in the Department of Educational Leadership at Virginia Commonwealth University. She received her master's in Education Policy and Management from Harvard University and her Ph.D. in Urban Education from the University of California-Los Angeles, where she worked as a research associate for the UCLA Civil Rights Project. Siegel-Hawley's research focuses on examining school segregation and resegregation in U.S. metropolitan areas, along with strategies for promoting inclusive school communities and policy options for integration. Siegel-Hawley is the author of two books, When the Fences Come Down: 21st Century Lessons from Metropolitan School Desegregation (UNC Press, 2016) and A Single Garment: Creating Intentionally Diverse Schools that Benefit All Children (Harvard Education Press, 2020). She has published numerous peer-reviewed articles in leading education journals and law reviews, as well as a variety of policy- and practitioner-facing reports. Siegel-Hawley has worked with states and districts to use research-based decisions to better design school choice for desegregation. She has also served as an expert witness in school desegregation cases involving school choice for the United States and for plaintiffs represented by the NAACP Legal Defense Fund. Siegel-Hawley is a native of Richmond and a proud graduate of and former high school history teacher in Richmond Public Schools.
