

Robert Joseph is Senior Scholar at the National Institute for Public Policy. In the George W. Bush administration, Dr. Joseph served as Under Secretary of State for Arms Control and International Security and, prior to that, as Special Assistant to the President and Senior NSC Director for Proliferation Strategy, Counterproliferation and Homeland Defense. From 1992 until 2000, Dr. Joseph was Professor of National Security Studies and Director/Founder of the Center for Counterproliferation Research at the National Defense University. Earlier, he was U.S. Commissioner to the Standing Consultative Commission and Head of the U.S.-Russian Commission on Nuclear Testing, Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for International Security Policy, Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Nuclear Forces and Arms Control Policy, Nuclear Policy/Planning Officer at U.S. Mission to NATO, and Assistant Professor of International Relations/Strategic Studies at the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Tulane University, and Carleton College. Dr. Joseph received his BA from Saint Louis University, his MA from the University of Chicago, and his PhD from Columbia University.
