# AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE TO H.R. 7276

## OFFERED BY MR. SMITH OF NEW JERSEY

Strike all after the enacting clause and insert the following:

### 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Desert Locust Control3 Act".

### 4 SEC. 2. STATEMENT OF POLICY.

5 It is the policy of the United States to prioritize ef-6 forts to control the ongoing desert locust outbreak in East 7 Africa and other affected regions, mitigate the impacts on 8 food security, economic productivity, and political sta-9 bility, improve interagency coordination to prevent future 10 outbreaks, and promote resilience in affected countries.

### 11 SEC. 3. FINDINGS.

12 Congress finds the following:

(1) The United States Agency for International
Development reports that countries in East Africa
are currently suffering the worst desert locust outbreak in decades, which will devour crops and pasture and destroy local livelihoods across the region.

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(2) As of June 2020, there were more than 26
 million people experiencing acute food insecurity in
 Ethiopia, Kenya, Somalia, South Sudan, Tanzania,
 Uganda, Sudan, and Djibouti, and these numbers
 are projected to increase if the desert locust out break is not controlled.

7 (3) As the desert locust outbreak continues,
8 there may be insufficient resources to continue to
9 conduct aerial spraying and without such resources
10 the current outbreak could develop into a plague by
11 the end of 2020.

(4) The desert locust outbreak in East Africa,
particularly in Kenya, Ethiopia, and Somalia, is negatively impacting food security, local livelihoods and
economic productivity, and may threaten political
stability in the region.

17 (5) Proactive investments now to control the
18 desert locust outbreak could reduce the need for a
19 much larger United States humanitarian response
20 effort later, as well as support economic and political
21 stability and build resilience in affected countries.

(6) In order to optimize the United States response to the desert locust outbreak, an interagency
working group should be established to develop and
implement a comprehensive, strategic plan to control

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the desert locust outbreak in East Africa and other
 affected regions, mitigate impacts on food security,
 economic productivity, and political stability and
 prevent future outbreaks.

#### 5 SEC. 4. INTERAGENCY WORKING GROUP.

6 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The President shall establish 7 an interagency working group to coordinate the United 8 States response to the ongoing desert locust outbreak in 9 East Africa and other affected regions, including the de-10 velopment of a comprehensive, strategic plan to control the 11 outbreak, mitigate the impacts on food security, economic 12 productivity, and political stability, and prevent future 13 outbreaks.

- 14 (b) Membership.—
- 15 (1) IN GENERAL.—The interagency working16 group shall be composed of the following:
- 17 (A) Two representatives from the United18 States Agency for International Development.

19 (B) One representative from each of the20 following:

- 21 (i) The United States Mission to the
  22 United Nations Agencies for Food and Ag23 riculture.
- 24 (ii) The National Security Council.
- 25 (iii) The Department of State.

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1	(iv) The Department of Defense.
2	(v) The Department of Agriculture.
3	(vi) Any other relevant Federal de-
4	partment or agency.
5	(2) CHAIR.—The President shall designate one
6	of the representatives from the United States Agen-
7	cy for International Development described in para-
8	graph (1)(A) to serve as chair of the interagency
9	working group.
10	(c) DUTIES.—The interagency working group shall—
11	(1) assess the scope of the desert locust out-
12	break in East Africa and other affected regions, in-
13	cluding its impact on food security, economic pro-
14	ductivity, and political stability in affected countries;
15	(2) assess the impacts of restrictions relating to
16	the coronavirus disease 2019 (commonly referred to
17	as "COVID-19") pandemic;
18	(3) monitor the effectiveness of ongoing assist-
19	ance efforts to control the desert locust outbreak
20	and mitigate its impacts and identify gaps and op-
21	portunities for additional support to such programs;
22	(4) review the effectiveness of regional and mul-
23	tilateral efforts to control the desert locust outbreak
24	and the coordination among relevant United States
25	Government agencies, regional governments, and

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international organizations, including the World
 Food Programme and the United Nations Food and
 Agriculture Organization; and
 (5) not later than 90 days after the establish-

4 (5) not later than 90 days after the establishment of the interagency working group under subsection (a), develop and submit to the President and
7 the appropriate congressional committees a comprehensive, strategic plan to control the desert locust
9 outbreak, including a description of efforts to—

10 (A) improve coordination among relevant
11 United States Government agencies, regional
12 governments, and international organizations,
13 including the World Food Programme and the
14 United Nations Food and Agriculture Organiza15 tion;

16 (B) ensure delivery of necessary assets
17 control the desert locust outbreak and humani18 tarian and development assistance to address
19 and mitigate impacts to food security, economic
20 productivity, and political stability; and

21 (C) to the extent practicable, prevent and
22 mitigate future desert locust and other, similar
23 destructive insect outbreaks (such as Fall
24 Armyworm) outbreaks in Africa and other parts

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1 of the world, which require a humanitarian re-2 sponse.

3 (d) INTERAGENCY WORKING GROUP SUPPORT.—The
4 interagency working group shall continue to meet not less
5 than semi-annually to facilitate implementation of the
6 comprehensive, strategic plan required by subsection
7 (c)(5).

8 (e) SUNSET.—This section shall terminate on the 9 date that is 2 years after the date of the enactment of 10 this Act, or at such time as there is no longer an upsurge 11 in the desert locust outbreak in East Africa, whichever oc-12 curs earlier.

(f) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEES DE14 FINED.—In this section, the term "appropriate congres15 sional committees" means—

- 16 (1) the Committee on Foreign Affairs and the
  17 Committee on Appropriations of the House of Rep18 resentatives; and
- (2) the Committee on Foreign Relations andthe Committee on Appropriations of the Senate.

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
