by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall
within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned

A BILL

To authorize the imposition of sanctions with respect to
the Houthis, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Houthi Human Rights
5 Accountability Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. SENSE OF CONGRESS.**

7 It is the sense of Congress that—

8 (1) Houthi efforts to indoctrinate Yemenis into
9 a violent, anti-Semitic, and extremist worldview are

1 a threat to a Yemeni-led peace process and to re-
2 gional stability; and

8 SEC. 3. REPORT ON HOUTHI INDOCTRINATION.

9 Not later than 180 days after the date of the enact-
10 ment of this Act, the Secretary of State, in consulta-
11 tion with the Administrator of the United States Agency for
12 International Development, shall submit to the appro-
13 priate congressional committees a report on—

18 SEC. 4. REPORT ON OBSTACLES TO PROVISION OF HUMANI-
19 TARIAN AID IN AREAS OF YEMEN UNDER DE-
20 FACTO HOUTHI CONTROL.

21 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the
22 date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State,
23 in consultation with the Administrator of the United
24 States Agency for International Development, shall submit
25 to the appropriate congressional committees a report on

1 obstacles to the provision of humanitarian aid by inter-
2 national organizations and nongovernmental organizations
3 in areas of Yemen under de-facto Houthi control.

4 (b) MATTERS TO BE INCLUDED.—The report re-
5 quired by subsection (a) shall include the following:

6 (1) An identification of challenges to distribu-
7 tion of humanitarian aid created by Houthi-enforced
8 rules, regulations, and bureaucracy with respect to
9 access, and freedom of movement, and the overall
10 impact on such rules, regulations, and bureaucracy
11 have on the international community's ability to dis-
12 tribute such aid in a manner consistent with basic
13 humanitarian principles.

14 (2) An assessment of attempted Houthi inter-
15 ference in the delivery of humanitarian aid, includ-
16 ing the manipulation or undue influence of bene-
17 ficiary lists or related data for political or military
18 purposes, and the implications of any interference on
19 civilian needs and aid distribution.

20 (3) An evaluation of the Houthis' use of vio-
21 lence and intimidation against humanitarian workers
22 and diplomats, including current and former United
23 States Embassy locally employed staff.

24 (4) An overview of the steps the United States
25 and its partners are taking to ensure humanitarian

1 assistance is delivered unhindered and consistent
2 with basic humanitarian principles, including how
3 United States-supported organizations respond to
4 attempted Houthi diversion or interference.

5 (5) SCOPE.—The report required by subsection
6 (a) shall address the period beginning on January 1,
7 2020, and ending on the date that is 90 days after
8 date of the enactment of this Act.

9 **SEC. 5. REPORT ON HUMAN RIGHTS ABUSES COMMITTED
10 BY THE HOUTHIS.**

11 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the
12 date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State
13 shall submit to the appropriate congressional committees
14 a report on human rights abuses committed by the
15 Houthis, including gender-based discrimination and vio-
16 lence, including—

- 17 (1) mahram regulations;
18 (2) recruitment and use of child soldiers;
19 (3) enforced disappearance;
20 (4) prolonged and arbitrary detention;
21 (5) conduct that amounts to torture; and
22 (6) unlawful killing.

23 (b) SCOPE.—The report required by subsection (a)
24 shall address the period beginning on March 1, 2015, and

1 ending on the date that is 90 days after date of the enact-
2 ment of this Act.

3 **SEC. 6. SANCTIONS AUTHORIZED UNDER THE GLOBAL**
4 **MAGNITSKY HUMAN RIGHTS AND ACCOUNT-**
5 **ABILITY ACT.**

6 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the
7 date of the enactment of this Act, and annually thereafter,
8 the Secretary of State, in consultation with the Secretary
9 of the Treasury, shall submit to the appropriate congres-
10 sional committees a determination on whether foreign per-
11 sons described in subsection (b) meet the criteria for sanc-
12 tions authorized under the Global Magnitsky Human
13 Rights and Accountability Act (22 U.S.C. 2656 note), in-
14 cluding with respect to acts that constitute gross violations
15 of internationally recognized human rights as defined in
16 section 502B(d)(1) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961
17 (22 U.S.C. 2304(d)(1)).

18 (b) PERSONS DESCRIBED.—A foreign person de-

19 scribed in this subsection is a foreign person that—

20 (1) is a member of the Houthis; and

21 (2) knowingly—

22 (A) imposes arbitrary or unlawful restric-
23 tion on the delivery of humanitarian assistance
24 in Yemen; or

(B) engages in the human rights abuses described in section 5(a).

3 SEC. 7. SANCTIONS AUTHORIZED UNDER THE ROBERT
4 LEVINSON HOSTAGE TAKING AND ACCOUNT-
5 ABILITY ACT.

(a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, and annually thereafter, the Secretary of State, in consultation with the Secretary of the Treasury, shall submit to the appropriate congressional committees a determination on whether foreign persons described in subsection (b) meet the criteria for sanctions authorized under the Robert Levinson Hostage Recovery and Hostage-Taking Accountability Act (22 U.S.C. 1741 et seq.), and Executive Order 14078.

15 (b) PERSONS DESCRIBED.—A foreign person de-
16 scribed in this subsection is a foreign person that—

17 (1) is a member of the Houthis; and

18 (2)(A) is responsible for or is com

19 responsible for ordering, controlling, or otherwise di-
20 recting, the hostage-taking of a United States na-
21 tional abroad or the unlawful or wrongful detention
22 of a United States national abroad; or

(B) knowingly provides financial, material, or technological support for, or goods or services in

1 support of, an activity described in subparagraph
2 (A).

3 **SEC. 8. SUNSET.**

4 This Act shall terminate on the date that is 5 years
5 after the date of the enactment of this Act.

6 **SEC. 9. DEFINITIONS.**

7 In this Act—

8 (1) the term “appropriate congressional com-
9 mittees” means—

10 (A) the Committee on Foreign Affairs and
11 the Committee on Appropriations of the House
12 of Representatives; and

13 (B) the Committee on Foreign Relations
14 and the Committee on Appropriations of the
15 Senate;

16 (2) the term “foreign person” means a person
17 that is not a United States person;

18 (3) the term “Houthis” refers to persons offi-
19 cially known as “Ansarallah”;

20 (4) the term “person” means and individual or
21 entity; and

22 (5) the term “United States person” means—
23 (A) a national of the United States;
24 (B) an alien who is lawfully present in the
25 United States; or

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
