

AMENDMENT TO H.R. 5300
OFFERED BY MR. MILLS OF FLORIDA

At the appropriate place, insert the following:

1 **SEC. ____ . DEPUTY INSPECTOR GENERAL FOR ASSISTANCE.**

2 (a) ESTABLISHMENT OF THE DEPUTY INSPECTOR
3 GENERAL FOR ASSISTANCE.—There shall be in the De-
4 partment a Deputy Inspector General for Assistance who
5 shall be responsible to the Inspector General within the
6 Office of the Inspector General for matters pertaining to
7 the systematic review and evaluation of the administration
8 of activities and operations of all assistance programs, and
9 such other related duties as the Inspector General may
10 from time to time designate. The Deputy Inspector Gen-
11 eral for Assistance shall be appointed by the President,
12 without regard to political affiliation.

13 (b) RESPONSIBILITIES.—In addition to the respon-
14 sibilities described under subsection (a), the Deputy In-
15 specter General for Assistance shall oversee the Office of
16 the Deputy Inspector General for Assistance and maintain
17 continuous observation and coordination of all matters
18 pertaining to the systematic review and evaluation of the
19 administration of activities and operations of all non-secu-
20 rity assistance programs including an examination of—

1 (1) whether financial transactions and accounts
2 are properly conducted, maintained, and reported;

3 (2) whether resources are being used and man-
4 aged with the maximum degree of efficiency, effec-
5 tiveness, and economy;

6 (3) whether the administration of activities and
7 operations meets the requirements of applicable laws
8 and regulations and, specifically, whether such ad-
9 ministration is consistent with the requirements of
10 section 105 of the Foreign Service Act of 1980 (22
11 U.S. C. 3905);

12 (4) whether there exist instances of fraud or
13 other serious problems, abuses, or deficiencies, and
14 whether adequate steps for detection, correction, and
15 prevention have been taken; and

16 (5) whether policy goals and objectives are
17 being effectively achieved and whether the interests
18 of the United States are being accurately and effec-
19 tively represented.

20 (c) DEFINITIONS.—For purposes of this section, the
21 term “assistance” means amounts appropriated or other-
22 wise made available for any fiscal year for all programs
23 funded with appropriations, other than appropriations
24 made available to the Department of Defense, including—

1 (1) foreign assistance programs, other than De-
2 partment of Defense programs, administered pursu-
3 ant to Part I, Chapters 1, 9, & 10 or Part II, Chap-
4 ter 4, of the Foreign Assistance Act (22 U.S.C.
5 2151 et seq.), the Food for Peace Act (7 U.S.C.
6 1691 et seq.), the Millennium Challenge Act of 2003
7 (22 U.S.C. 7701 et seq.), the African Development
8 Foundation Act of 1980 (22 U.S.C. 290h et seq.),
9 the Food for Progress Act of 1985 (7 U.S.C.
10 1736o), or successor legislation; and

11 (2) any other non-military, foreign assistance
12 programs, including global health, development as-
13 sistance, international disaster assistance, food as-
14 sistance and food security, and economic support.

15 **SEC. ____ . OFFICE OF THE DEPUTY INSPECTOR GENERAL**
16 **FOR ASSISTANCE.**

17 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary shall establish
18 an Office of the Deputy Inspector General for Assistance
19 within the Office of Inspector General, which shall per-
20 form functions related to the systematic review and eval-
21 uation of the administration of activities and operations
22 of all non-security assistance programs, as the Inspector
23 General may prescribe.

1 (b) DEPUTY INSPECTOR GENERAL.—The Deputy In-
2 spector General for Assistance shall be the head of the
3 Office.

4 **SEC. ____ . DEPUTY INSPECTOR GENERAL OF THE DEPART-**
5 **MENT OF STATE AND THE FOREIGN SERVICE.**

6 (a) ESTABLISHMENT OF THE DEPUTY INSPECTOR
7 GENERAL OF THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE AND THE
8 FOREIGN SERVICE.—There shall be in the Department a
9 Deputy Inspector General of the Department of State and
10 the Foreign Service who shall be responsible to the Inspec-
11 tor General for matters pertaining to the systematic re-
12 view and evaluation of the administration of activities and
13 operations of Foreign Service posts and bureaus and other
14 operating units of the Department of State, and such
15 other related duties as the Inspector General may from
16 time to time designate. The Deputy Inspector General of
17 the Department of State and the Foreign Service shall be
18 within the Office of the Inspector General and be ap-
19 pointed by the President, without regard to political affili-
20 ation.

21 (b) RESPONSIBILITIES.—In addition to the respon-
22 sibilities described under subsection (a), the Deputy In-
23 spector General of the Department of State and the For-
24 eign Service shall assist the Inspector General in the sys-
25 tematic review and evaluation of the administration of ac-
