Alison Kaufman, Ph.D., is a senior research scientist in CNA's China Strategic Issues group. She has been working on issues related to China and Asia for over 20 years. At CNA, her research has focused on Chinese views of conflict control; U.S. security cooperation in the Asia-Pacific region; Asian intra-regional economic, political, and military relations; and cross-Strait issues. Her additional research interests include Chinese nationalism and U.S.-China relations. She has published work on the historical roots of current-day Chinese foreign policy, including "The 'Century of Humiliation,' Then and Now: Chinese Perceptions of the International Order" (*Pacific Affairs*, 2010) and "In Pursuit of Equality and Respect: China's Diplomacy and the League of Nations" (*Modern China*, 2013).

Before joining CNA in 2007, Kaufman worked for the World Bank's China program and at China Radio International in Beijing. She also worked as a subject matter expert on Chinese affairs for a consulting firm. From 2011 to 2012, she was a postdoctoral fellow in the Princeton-Harvard China and the World Program.

Kaufman holds a Ph.D. in political science with a focus on Chinese political philosophy from the University of California, Berkeley, and a B.A. in East Asian Studies from Harvard University. She has lived in Taipei and Beijing.
