

David W. Kreutzer, Ph.D.

Brief Bio

David Kreutzer is Senior Research Fellow in Energy Economics and Climate Change at The Heritage Foundation's Center for Data Analysis.

In this position, Kreutzer researches how energy and climate change legislation will affect economic activity at the national, local, and industry levels.

Kreutzer joined Heritage in 2008. From 1984 to 2007, he taught economics at James Madison University in Harrisonburg, Va., where he also served as Director of the International Business Program. He started his career as a visiting economics instructor at Ohio University in the early 1980s. In addition, Kreutzer served as a Visiting Economist at the U.S. Food and Drug Administration in 1994 and as an economist at Berman and Company in 2007.

In 1994 Kreutzer was elected to the Dayton, Virginia Town Council. He finished his ten years of elected service as mayor. Dayton is a town of about 1,300 people in the Shenandoah Valley.

Kreutzer's research has appeared in journals such as *The Journal of Political Economy*, *the National Tax Journal*, *Economic Inquiry*, *The Southern Economic Journal* and *The Journal of Energy and Development*. He has also written for mainstream media outlets including *The Wall Street Journal*, the *Washington Times*, the *Orange County Register*, the *Cleveland Plain Dealer*, and the *Fort Lauderdale Sun-Sentinel*.

Kreutzer earned a doctorate in economics from George Mason University in 1984. He also has bachelor's and master's degrees in economics from Virginia Tech. Raised in Northern Virginia, he now lives in Arlington with his wife.
