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Michael Auslin, author of “The end of the Asian Century: War, Stagnation, and the Risks to the World’s Most Dynamic Region” (Yale University Press, 2017), is a resident scholar and director of Japan Studies at the American Enterprise Institute (AEI), where he specializes in Asian regional security and political issues.
