Vladimir Rouvinski is a professor at the Department of Political Studies and Director of the Laboratory for Politics and International Relations (Polnt) at Icesi University in Cali, Colombia, in addition to coordinating the Pacific Alliance Studies Program (PEAP) at the same university.

Vladimir's primary area of expertise is Russia's relations with Latin America and the Caribbean. Among his most recent publications on the topic are "Rethinking Post-Cold War Russian-Latin American Relations" (Routledge, 2022), "Russia's strategic communication in Latin America and the Caribbean" (Florida International University, 2021), and "Venezuela: Russia's Gordian Knot in Latin America" in "Venezuela's Authoritarian Allies: The Ties That Bind?" (ed. by Cynthia Arnson, Wilson Center, 2021).





Vladimir Rouvinski graduated from Irkutsk State University in Russia and has a Ph.D. in international development and cooperation from Hiroshima University in Japan.

Before joining Icesi University in 2007, Vladimir worked with educational and research institutions in Russia, Japan, and Colombia. He also held research positions at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in Washington, DC, Florida International University in Miami, and the Georg Eckert Institute in Braunschweig, Germany.

Vladimir often presents the results of his research to decision-makers and expert communities in the United States, Europe, Latin America, and Asia, and he held elected positions as the Co-Chair of Asia and the Americas Section at the Latin American Studies Association (LASA) and the Colombian International Relations Network (RedIntercol). He also frequently appears in the international media as an expert on the issues of Russian foreign policy.
