

Prof. Eugene Kontorovich, bio

Eugene Kontorovich is a professor at Northwestern University School of Law. His research and expertise span constitutional and international law. In the latter field, he is an internationally recognized expert on international criminal law and jurisdiction. His research articles on these subjects, has been published in leading student-edited and peer-reviewed journals in the U.S. and abroad. In the past year, he has published two studies on the potential jurisdiction of the International Criminal Court over Israel.

Prof. Kontorovich's research has been cited in leading international law cases in federal courts and around the world. He has also consulted the Defense Department on international law issues, and both leading media outlets and policy-makers in the U.S frequently call upon his expertise. And abroad. He is a regular contributor to the Volokh Conspiracy law blog at the Washington Post.

Professor Kontorovich attended college and law school at the University of Chicago, where he also taught for two years. After law school, he clerked for Judge Richard Posner on the Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit. He has been honored with the Federalist Society's Bator Award, given to distinguished law professors under 40, as well as a fellowship at the Institute for Advanced Studies in Princeton.
