4. In the current calendar year or either of the two previous calendar years, have you or your organization(s) received any Federal grants or contracts (including subgrants and subcontracts) related to the subject of the hearing or your representational capacity at the hearing?

As an individual, unrelated to my employment at the Nuclear Threat Initiative, I am under a subcontract with UT-Battelle, LLC for the Oak Ridge National Laboratory (ORNL) to provide support for a Nonproliferation Seminar Series. In the past year, this work has comprised of one visit to ORNL to consult with officials and give a lecture on how U.S. national laboratory experts can contribute to the development of national security policy, using the examples of North Korea and Iran to provide context. While the subcontract has a maximum limit of \$10,000, my remuneration from the contract to date has comprised only of travel costs (flights, hotel, ground transportation) to and from the laboratory, for a total of \$598.97. I did not (and do not intend in the future to) receive any additional payments or honoraria beyond travel costs.

5. In the current calendar year or either of the two previous calendar years, have you or your organization(s) received any contract or payment originating with a foreign government related to the subject of the hearing or your representational capacity at the hearing?

The Nuclear Threat Initiative has received the following grants that have some relationship to the subject of the hearing:

2020:

Canada – Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development: \$607,046 to support the International Partnership for Nuclear Disarmament Verification

Norway – Ministry of Foreign Affairs: \$474,968 to support the International Partnership for Nuclear Disarmament Verification and the Global Enterprise to Strengthen Nonproliferation and Disarmament

2019:

Canada – Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development: \$277,024 to support the International Partnership for Nuclear Disarmament Verification

Norway – Ministry of Foreign Affairs: \$370,272.25 to support the International Partnership for Nuclear Disarmament Verification and the Global Enterprise to Strengthen Nonproliferation and Disarmament

2018:

Netherlands – Ministry of Foreign Affairs: \$100,000 to support the International Partnership for Nuclear Disarmament Verification

Sweden – Swedish Radiation and Safety Authority: \$55,000 to support, develop, assess, and address legal issues for disarmament verification
