Milton Leitenberg was trained as a scientist in the fields of biology and chemistry. After six years of teaching in US colleges and universities, he began work in the field of arms control in 1966. In 1968, Leitenberg was the first American recruited to work at SIPRI in Stockholm. He was subsequently affiliated with the Swedish Institute of International Affairs and the Center for International Studies at Cornell University. He has been a Senior Research Scholar at CISSM since 1989. His research is widely published. In the years since 1966, he has authored or edited a dozen books or book-length studies, and published over 150 journal papers, monographs and book chapters.

Biological weapons have been a subject of particular concern for the past 25 years. Leitenberg's first paper dealing with biological weapons was published in 1967. At SIPRI he was a member of the team that produced the six-volume study, *The Problem of Chemical and Biological Warfare*, published between 1971 and 1973. Since 1992, he has published approximately 30 papers on the subject of biological weapons.
