

Paul R. Williams

Dr. Paul R. Williams holds the Rebecca I. Grazier Professorship in Law and International Relations at American University where he teaches both in the School of International Service and in the Washington College of Law. Dr. Williams is the co-founder and President of the Public International Law & Policy Group (PILPG), which provides *pro bono* legal assistance to states and governments involved in peace negotiations, drafting post-conflict constitutions, and prosecuting war criminals.

Dr. Williams has previously served in the Office of the Legal Advisor at the Department of State, and as a Senior Associate at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. He holds a Ph.D from Cambridge University and a J.D. from Stanford Law School.

In the course of his career, Dr. Williams has assisted over two dozen states in major international peace negotiations and has counseled numerous governments on the drafting and implementation of post-conflict constitutions. In 2005, several of Dr. Williams' *pro bono* government clients throughout the world joined together to nominate him for the Nobel Peace Prize.

With respect to national self-determination, Dr. Williams has been involved in over twenty negotiations, working with either the parent state or the self-determination movement, including throughout the former Soviet Union and the former Yugoslavia, as well as Burma, former Czechoslovakia, India, Iraq, Libya, Nepal, Senegal, Somaliland, South Sudan, Sri Lanka, Syria, and Yemen.
