

Steve Swerdlow, esq. is a Central Asia researcher in the Europe and Central Asia division of Human Rights Watch. An attorney with over fifteen years of scholarly and human rights experience on Russia, Ukraine, the Caucasus, and Central Asia, Swerdlow heads Human Rights Watch's work on Uzbekistan, and has been among the first independent human rights workers to conduct extensive fieldwork on the ground since the government's decision to allow human rights organizations back into the country. Swerdlow was a fellow in the U.S. State Department's Young Leaders for Public Service program in Russia and worked earlier as a human rights monitor for the Union of Council for Soviet Jews (UCSJ) and the International Organization for Migration (IOM) in Russia. Prior to joining Human Rights Watch, Swerdlow practiced law in San Francisco at Lieff Cabraser Heimann & Bernstein, LLP, and served as a law clerk to the Honorable Judge Dean Pregerson of the United States District Court for the Central District of California. Swerdlow received his J.D. from the University of California, Berkeley (Boalt Hall) School of Law and M.A. in International Affairs from Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs with a certificate in Post-Soviet Studies from the Harriman Institute.
