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Matthijs is the editor (with Mark Blyth) of the book <u>The Future of the Euro</u> published by Oxford University Press in 2015, and author of <u>Ideas and Economic Crises in Britain from Attlee to Blair (1945-2005)</u>, published by <u>Routledge</u> in 2011. Matthijs has also published numerous peer reviewed academic articles in journals, including <u>Perspectives on Politics</u>, <u>Politics & Society, Review of International Political Economy, the Journal of Common Market Studies, Governance, Government and Opposition, the <u>Journal of European Public Policy, the Journal of European Integration, Comparative European Politics, and <u>The International Spectator</u>. He has written multiple articles and essays for <u>Foreign Affairs</u>, <u>Foreign Policy, Journal of Democracy, Survival</u>, and <u>Current History</u>.</u></u>

At Johns Hopkins, Matthijs teaches courses in international relations, comparative politics, and international economics. He was one of the inaugural recipients of a <u>2015 Johns Hopkins Catalyst Award</u> in recognition of his work as a promising early-career investigator. At SAIS, he was also twice awarded the <u>Max M. Fisher</u> Prize for Excellence in Teaching, in <u>2011</u> and <u>2015</u>.

He previously taught at American University's <u>School of International Service</u> from 2008 to 2012 in Washington, DC, and was a visiting assistant professor at SAIS Europe in Bologna, Italy during the spring semester of 2010 and the academic year 2016-17. He has also served as a consultant for the World Bank's Foreign Investment Advisory Service (FIAS) from 2005 to 2007 and for the <u>Economist Intelligence Unit</u> from 2009 to 2011.

Dr. Matthijs received his BA in applied economics from the University of Antwerp, Belgium, and his MA and PhD in international relations from Johns Hopkins University.
