

Jonas Nahm is an Assistant Professor of Energy, Resources, and Environment at the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies in Washington, DC. His research interests focus on the intersection of economic and industrial policy, energy policy, and environmental politics. In particular, he studies the role of the state in processes of industrial restructuring that accompany responses to climate change and clean energy transitions more broadly. His work utilizes clean energy transitions in China, Germany, and the United States to engage two debates in comparative political economy: (1) the role of the state in shaping the international division of labor in highly globalized industries, and (2) sources of state capacity in interest group politics during periods of industrial restructuring. In addition to his work on renewable energy industries, Jonas has ongoing research projects on the politics of greening the global auto sector and the determinants of climate policies during economic recessions. Prior to coming to Johns Hopkins, Jonas was a postdoctoral fellow at the Watson Institute for International and Public Affairs at Brown University. He holds a PhD in political science from MIT and speaks German and Mandarin Chinese.
