



Mallory Stewart is the Chief Executive Officer at The Council on Strategic Risks. Her areas of expertise include weapons of mass destruction law and policy, missile defense, outer space security policy, and risk management regarding emerging and disruptive technologies. From 2022 to 2025, she served as the Assistant Secretary for the Bureau of Arms Control, Deterrence, and Stability at the U.S. Department of State. She joined the bureau after serving as Special Assistant to the President and Senior Director for Arms Control, Disarmament, and Nonproliferation at the National Security Council from January 2021.

Prior to joining the NSC, Ms. Stewart was the Senior Manager for Global Nuclear Security and Nonproliferation at the Center for Global Security and Cooperation in Sandia National Laboratories. While at Sandia, she led Sandia's Cooperative Monitoring Center in its efforts to facilitate scientific and diplomatic engagement for global security.

From 2015 to 2017, Ms. Stewart was Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Emerging Security Challenges and Defense Policy in what was then called the Bureau of Arms Control, Verification and Compliance. In that role, she oversaw the Office of Emerging Security Challenges and the Office of Chemical and Biological Weapons Affairs. Before her time in the Arms Control Bureau, Ms. Stewart served as an attorney adviser in the Department of State's Office of the Legal Adviser. She joined the Legal Adviser's Office in 2002, and in that role she worked on numerous legal issues related to nonproliferation, arms control, deterrence, and U.S. participation in international treaties. Ms. Stewart was the State Department lawyer for the U.S. delegation that negotiated the Ballistic Missile Defense Agreements with Poland and Romania, and she was the lead lawyer on the 2013 U.S.-Russian Framework for the Elimination of Syrian Chemical Weapons.

Ms. Stewart is a Senior Non-Resident Fellow at the Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs at Harvard Kennedy School and has served as an adjunct professor at Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service. She has previously worked as a Nonresident Fellow at the Stimson Center and as an associate at the law firm of Sullivan & Cromwell. She holds an A.B. from Harvard College and a J.D. from Stanford Law School.
