

Dr. Elavie Ndura is a tenured Professor of Education and immediate past Academic Program Coordinator of the Multilingual/Multicultural Education program (MME) in the George Mason University's College of Education and Human Development (CEHD). She was a 2010-2011 Fellow at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars, and the recipient of the Peace and Justice Association's 2011 Peace Educator of the Year Award. She was a Fulbright Scholar (1988, 1989-1993), and the recipient of the British Council Scholarship (1986-1987).

Professor Ndura's research interests are in the areas of diversity and multicultural education, cultural identity development, immigrants' acculturation, students' academic achievement in culturally diverse educational settings, critical multicultural and peace education, and peaceful conflict resolution. She has delivered numerous presentations and keynote addresses at international, national, and local professional meetings and other gatherings. She is the founder and coordinator of the Burundi Schools Project which seeks donations of dictionaries and other instructional materials to benefit schools in Burundi, Africa.

Professor Ndura's books include *Seeds of New Hope: Pan-African peace studies for the twenty-first century* (Africa World Press, 2009), *Building Cultures of Peace: Transdisciplinary voices of hope and action* (Cambridge Scholars Publishing, 2009) and *Seeds Bearing Fruit: Pan-African peace action for the twenty-first century* (Africa World Press, 2011). Professor Ndura has contributed chapters to several books on peacemaking, ethnicity and conflict resolution.

Professor Ndura served as Board Member of the Center for Holocaust, Genocide, and Peace Studies as well as President and Founder of the Northern Nevada Chapter of the National Association for Multicultural Education (NAME) for four years in Reno, Nevada. She served on the National Board of the Peace and Justice Studies Association (PJSA) as Publications Chair. She was Program Chair and Chair of the Peace Education Special Interest Group of the American Educational Association (AERA).
