

Michael Jerryson was promoted to Professor of Religious Studies at Youngstown State University in 2018. He has a master's degree in Languages and Cultures of Asia from the University of Wisconsin, Madison, and a doctorate in religious studies, with a global studies emphasis, from the University of California, Santa Barbara.

Jerryson is the co-founder and co-chair of the <u>Comparative Approaches to</u> <u>Religion and Violence</u> through the American Academy of Religion. He has worked as an international consultant on South and Southeast Asian conflicts.

After serving in the United States Peace Corps in Mongolia, Jerryson has spent over 20 years investigating the relationship between religion and violence and under-explored Asian practices and beliefs.

Jerryson's current research interests pertain to religion and identity, particularly with regard to gender, race, and class. Among his publications, he is the author of <u>Buddhist Fury: Religion and</u> <u>Violence in Southern Thailand</u> (2011), and he has coedited <u>The Oxford Handbook of Religion and</u> <u>Violence</u> (2013) and <u>Buddhist Warfare</u> (2010).

His latest publication is <u>If You Meet the Buddha on the Road: Buddhism, Politics, and Violence</u> (2018), and he is working on a forthcoming edited volume, tentatively entitled: <u>Religious Violence</u> Today: Faith and Conflict in the Modern World.
