Cameron Hudson is a senior fellow in the Africa Program at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS). He was previously a senior fellow at the Atlantic Council's Africa Center, where his research focused on the democratic transitions and conflict in the Horn of Africa and Sahel regions of Africa. Cameron has served in a number of roles across the U.S. government. At the State Department, he served as the chief of staff to successive presidential special envoys for Sudan during the period of South Sudan's separation from Sudan and the Darfur genocide. He also served during the Bush administration as the director for African affairs on the staff of the National Security Council at the White House. He began his government career as an intelligence analyst in the Africa Directorate at the Central Intelligence Agency. His commentary on Africa issues has been featured by, among other outlets, the BBC, Al Jazeera, the *New York Times*, the *Wall Street Journal*, *Foreign Policy*, Voice of America, and National Public Radio. He is a graduate of the University of Virginia and the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts University.
