

## **Daniel Benjamin**

Daniel Benjamin is Director of the John Sloan Dickey Center for International Understanding at Dartmouth. Prior to joining the Dickey Center in 2013, Daniel Benjamin served as Ambassador-at-Large and Coordinator for Counterterrorism at the U.S. State Department. In that position, he was the principal advisor to Secretary of State Hillary Clinton on counterterrorism. Ambassador Benjamin was the longest serving coordinator since that position was created. He is also a non-resident senior fellow at The Brookings Institution.

Prior to joining the Obama Administration, Benjamin was director of the Center on the United States and Europe at Brookings. During more than five years on the National Security Council staff in the 1990s, Benjamin served as a foreign policy speechwriter and special assistant to President Bill Clinton and as director for transnational threats. Benjamin co-wrote *The Age of Sacred Terror* (2002), which was awarded the Arthur Ross Prize of the Council on Foreign Relations and was also named a New York Times Notable Book and a Washington Post Best Book of 2002. *The Next Attack: The Failure of the War on Terror and a Strategy for Getting it Right* (2005), which he also co-authored, was named a best book of the year by The Washington Post and The Financial Times.

Daniel Benjamin began his career as a journalist and served as Germany Bureau Chief for The Wall Street Journal and Germany Correspondent for TIME Magazine. He holds degrees from Oxford, where he was a Marshall Scholar, and Harvard.
