

Biography of Patricia M. Kim, Ph.D.

Patricia M. Kim is the Stanton Nuclear Security Fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations. Dr. Kim specializes in Chinese foreign policy, U.S.-China relations, and East Asian security issues. Her current research portfolio includes projects on the United States and China's competition for influence in East Asia, China's policies toward North Korea and the future of the Korean Peninsula, and a book manuscript on high-level negotiations between the United States and China from the 1970s to the present day. Her writing has been featured in *Foreign Affairs*, *Foreign Policy*, *International Security*, *The Washington Post*, *The South China Morning Post*, and *The Hill*, among other venues. Dr. Kim was previously a fellow at the Princeton-Harvard China and the World Program at the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs, and at the Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs at the Harvard Kennedy School of Government. She received her PhD in politics from Princeton University, and a BA in political science and Asian studies from the University of California, Berkeley.
