To amend title 39, United States Code, to modernize and improve Alaska bypass freight mail transportation.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Alaska Bypass Mod-

5 ernization Act of 2014".

6 SEC. 2. ALASKA BYPASS MAIL TRANSPORTATION.

1 mail in foreign air transportation between 2 points, or pairs of points within a geographic region or regions, and has not received offers or 3 4 proposals that meet Postal Service requirements 5 at a fair and reasonable price from at least 26 such carriers, the Postal Service may seek of-7 fers or proposals from foreign air carriers. 8 Where service in foreign air transportation 9 meeting the Postal Service's requirements is 10 unavailable at a fair and reasonable price from 11 at least 2 certificated air carriers, either di-12 rectly or through a code-share relationship with 13 1 or more foreign air carriers, the Postal Serv-14 ice may contract with foreign air carriers to 15 provide the service sought if, when the Postal 16 Service seeks offers or proposals from foreign 17 air carriers, it also seeks an offer or proposal 18 to provide that service from any certificated air 19 carrier providing service between those points, 20 or pairs of points within a geographic region or 21 regions, on the same terms and conditions that 22 are being sought from foreign air carriers. 23 "(C) Methodology for determining

FAIR AND REASONABLE PRICES.—For purposes
of this subsection, the Postal Service shall use

1	"(E) SITUATIONS IN WHICH CONCUR-
2	RENCE CANNOT BE ATTAINED.—If, for pur-
3	poses of subparagraph (D)(ii), concurrence can-
4	not be attained, the most recently available
5	market rate data described in this paragraph
6	shall continue to apply for the relevant market
7	or markets.
8	"(2) CONTRACT PROCESS.—The Postal Service
9	shall contract for foreign air transportation as set
10	forth in paragraph (1) through an open procurement
11	process that will provide—
12	"(A) potential offerors with timely notice
13	of business opportunities in sufficient detail to
14	allow them to make a proposal;
15	"(B) requirements, proposed terms and
16	conditions, and evaluation criteria to potential
17	offerors; and
18	"(C) an opportunity for unsuccessful
19	offerors to receive prompt feedback upon re-
20	quest.
21	"(3) Emergency or unanticipated condi-
22	TIONS; INADEQUATE LIFT SPACE.—The Postal Serv-
23	ice may enter into contracts to transport mail by air
24	in foreign air transportation with a certificated air

1	carrier or a foreign air carrier without complying
2	with the requirements of paragraph (1) or (2) if—
3	"(A) emergency or unanticipated condi-
4	tions exist that make it impractical for the
5	Postal Service to comply with such require-
6	ments; or
7	"(B) the Postal Service's demand for lift
8	exceeds the space available to the Postal Service
9	under existing contracts and—
10	"(i) there is insufficient time available
11	to seek additional lift using procedures
12	that comply with those requirements with-
13	out compromising the Postal Service's
14	service commitments to its own customers;
15	and
16	"(ii) the Postal Service first offers
17	any certificated air carrier holding a con-
18	tract to carry mail between the relevant
19	points the opportunity to carry such excess
20	volumes under the terms of its existing
21	contract.
22	"(c) GOOD-FAITH EFFORT REQUIRED.—The Postal
23	Service and potential offerors shall put a good-faith effort
24	into resolving disputes concerning the award of contracts
25	made under subsection (b).

1 "(d) SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES.—If the Postal Serv-2 ice determines that service by certificated air carriers or combination of air carriers between any pair or pairs of 3 4 points in foreign air transportation is not adequate for its 5 purposes, the Postal Service may contract, without advertising for bids, in such manner and under such terms and 6 conditions as the Postal Service may deem appropriate, 7 8 with any air taxi operator or combination thereof for such 9 air transportation service. Contracts made under this sub-10 section may be renewed at the existing rate by mutual 11 agreement between the holder and the Postal Service. The 12 Postal Service, with the consent of the air taxi operator, may adjust the compensation under such contracts for in-13 creased or decreased costs occasioned by changed condi-14 15 tions occurring during the contract term. The Postal Service shall cancel such a contract when the Secretary author-16 izes an additional certificated carrier or carriers to provide 17 18 service between any pair or pairs of points covered by the 19 contract, and such carrier or carriers inaugurate schedules 20adequate for its purposes.

21 "(e) TRANSPORTATION OF MAIL BY AIRCRAFT IN22 INTERSTATE AIR TRANSPORTATION.—

23 "(1) DETERMINATION OF RATES AND CON24 TRACT TERMS.—The Postal Service may determine
25 rates and contract with any air carrier for the trans-

portation of mail by aircraft in interstate air trans portation either through negotiations or competitive
 bidding.

"(2) Mail shipments of live animals.—

5 "(A) IN GENERAL.—In the exercise of its 6 authority under paragraph (1), the Postal Serv-7 ice may require any air carrier to accept mail 8 shipments of day-old poultry, honeybees, and 9 such other live animals as postal regulations 10 allow to be transmitted as mail matter. The au-11 thority of the Postal Service under this sub-12 paragraph shall not apply in the case of any air 13 carrier who commonly and regularly refuses to 14 accept any live animals as cargo.

15 "(B) SURCHARGES.—Notwithstanding any 16 other provision of law, the Postal Service is au-17 thorized to assess, as postage to be paid by the 18 mailers of any shipments covered by subpara-19 graph (A), a reasonable surcharge that the 20 Postal Service determines in its discretion to be 21 adequate to compensate air carriers for any 22 necessary additional expense incurred in han-23 dling such shipments.

24 "(f) APPLICABILITY TO POINTS WITHIN ALASKA.—
25 The authority of the Secretary and the Postal Service

under subsections (b), (c), and (d), as in effect on Sep tember 30, 2008, shall also apply, and the authority of
 the Postal Service under subsection (e) shall not apply,
 to the transportation of mail by aircraft between any 2
 points both of which are within the State of Alaska and
 between which the air carrier is authorized by the Sec retary to engage in the transportation of mail.".

8 (b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of sections

11 SEC. 4. REDUCTION OF ALASKA BYPASS MAIL SUBSIDY.

12 (a) IN GENERAL.—Chapter 54 of title 39, United
13 States Code (as amended by this Act), is further amended
14 by adding at the end the following:

15 "§ 5405. Reduction of Alaska bypass mail subsidy

16 "(a) Competitive Product Classification.—

17 "(1) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in this
18 section, Alaska bypass mail service under section
19 5402 shall be treated as a separate competitive
20 product for all purposes.

21 "(2) TRANSFER PROHIBITED.—No part of
22 Alaska bypass mail service may be transferred to the
23 market-dominant category of mail under section
24 3642.

1	"(3) LIMITATIONS.—Alaska bypass mail service
2	shall not be treated as a competitive product for
3	purposes of the implementation of sections 3633(a)
4	and 3634.
5	"(b) Minimum Cost Coverage.—
6	"(1) IN GENERAL.—The Postal Service shall es-
7	tablish and maintain rates and fees for matter sent
8	by Alaska bypass mail service—
9	"(A) for fiscal year 2015, that cover at
10	least 30 percent of the costs attributable to
11	Alaska bypass mail service in that fiscal year;
12	"(B) for fiscal year 2016, that cover at
13	least 34 percent of the costs attributable to
14	Alaska bypass mail service in that fiscal year;
15	"(C) for fiscal year 2017, that cover at
16	least 38 percent of the costs attributable to
17	Alaska bypass mail service in that fiscal year;
18	"(D) for fiscal year 2018, that cover at
19	least 42 percent of the costs attributable to
20	Alaska bypass mail service in that fiscal year;
21	"(E) for fiscal year 2019, that cover at
22	least 46 percent of the costs attributable to
23	Alaska bypass mail service in that fiscal year;
24	and

"(F) for fiscal year 2020, and for each fiscal year thereafter, that cover at least 50 percent of the costs attributable to Alaska bypass mail service in that fiscal year.

5 "(2) COSTS ATTRIBUTABLE.—The costs attrib-6 utable to Alaska bypass mail service for a fiscal year 7 shall include all the direct and indirect costs of Alas-8 ka bypass mail service during that fiscal year that 9 are attributable to that service through reliably iden-10 tified causal relationships.

11 "(3) INSTITUTIONAL COSTS.—Costs that can be 12 attributed to Alaska bypass mail service may not be 13 classified as institutional costs of the Postal Service. 14 "(4) RATE INCREASE LIMITATION.—For fiscal 15 years 2014 through 2020, no rate for any type of 16 Alaska bypass mail service may be increased in a fis-17 cal year by more than the maximum permitted rate 18 increase for market dominant products plus an addi-19 tional 1 percent.

20 "(c) COMPLIANCE.—

21 "(1) ANNUAL REVIEW.—At least once each fis22 cal year, the Postal Regulatory Commission shall de23 termine whether the Postal Service is in compliance
24 with the requirements under subsection (b).

1	"(2) Remedial actions.—If, under paragraph
2	(1), the Postal Regulatory Commission determines
3	that the Postal Service has not complied with the re-
4	quirements under subsection (b) with respect to a
5	fiscal year, the Commission shall prescribe, not later
6	than 60 days after making such determination, ac-
7	tions to ensure—
8	"(A) the establishment and maintenance of
9	rates and fees for Alaska bypass mail service
10	that recover any costs required to have been
11	covered for such fiscal year under subsection
12	(b), but that were not covered, by the date that
13	is not later than the last day of the fiscal year
14	that follows such fiscal year; and
15	"(B) compliance with the requirements
16	under subsection (b) in subsequent fiscal years.
17	"(3) LIMITATION.—The Postal Regulatory
18	Commission may not order the Postal Service to dis-
19	continue Alaska bypass mail service.
20	"(4) REGULATIONS.—Not later than 90 days
21	after the date of enactment of this subsection, the
22	Postal Regulatory Commission shall issue regula-
23	tions to implement this subsection.".
