

# **Chief Kim C. Dine**

## **United States Capitol Police**

Chief of Police Kim C. Dine has over 40 years of service in the field of law enforcement—with his most recent appointment in December 2012 as the Chief of Police of the United States Capitol Police.

Dine began his career in 1975 with the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD) in Washington, DC, and was eventually appointed as an Assistant Chief of Police. During his tenure as MPD's First District Commander, homicides declined by 60 percent. As Assistant Chief he held command over Internal Affairs, Force Investigation Teams, the Disciplinary Review Division, the Office of Equal Employment Opportunity, and management of the Memorandum of Agreement between MPD and the U.S. Department of Justice to institute agency-wide reforms.

In July 2002, Dine became the Chief of Police of the Frederick Police Department (FPD). During his tenure, he strengthened the relationship between the police, the community and intelligence-led policing, producing the agency's first strategic plan, acquiring national law enforcement accreditation. By outreach, and maximization of resources, use of technology, crime analysis, and acquisition of grants, FPD was able to combat crime effectively and build bridges with the minority communities and deaf community, and make strides in working with the mental health community. These efforts resulted in crime reduction and enhanced trust and communication with all constituents of Maryland's second largest city.

Chief Dine holds a Bachelor of Arts from Washington College and a Master of Science from American University. Chief Dine is a graduate of the FBI National Academy and is a member in a number of organizations, including the Police Executive Research Forum, the International Association of Chiefs of Police, and the Maryland Chiefs of Police Association. He is married to a former NASA scientist and is the proud father of two daughters.
