- **Re:** Committee on Oversight and Reform Hybrid Hearing on "Examining the Harm to Patients from Abortion Restrictions and the Threat of a National Abortion Ban"

On <u>Thursday, September 29, 2022, at 10:00 a.m. ET, in room 2154 of the Rayburn</u> <u>House Office Building and on the Zoom video platform</u>, the Committee on Oversight and Reform will hold a hybrid hearing to examine the impact of abortion bans and restrictions following the Supreme Court's decision in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*, including the harm to patients seeking abortion care, and efforts to impose a national abortion ban.

I. BACKGROUND

On June 24, 2022, the Supreme Court released its decision in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*, overturning the constitutionally protected right to abortion established nearly 50 years ago in *Roe v. Wade*.¹

Without a constitutionally recognized right to abortion, state laws banning or severely restricting abortion have taken effect in 15 states.² Some states had "trigger bans" in place that went into place as soon as *Roe* was overturned, and other states have pursued new restrictions. On September 15, 2022, Indiana became the first state to implement a new abortion prohibition in the wake of *Dobbs*.³ Abortion may soon be prohibited in another six states where court action has thus far prevented bans from going into effect.⁴

Abortion restrictions threaten the health and wellbeing of millions of patients in need of reproductive health care and disproportionately affect marginalized communities that already experience barriers to medical care.⁵

II. HEARING PURPOSE

The hearing will examine how abortion bans and restrictions across the United States following the Supreme Court's decision in *Dobbs* threaten reproductive health care for millions of people. The hearing will evaluate how abortion bans and restrictions harm patients and providers, as well as the ways in which a national abortion ban would threaten the health of people across the United States.
