

Amanda Catanzano is the acting vice president of global policy and advocacy at the International Rescue Committee. The International Rescue Committee is a global humanitarian aid organization that offers emergency aid and long-term assistance to people in crisis in over forty countries and resettles refugees in twenty-eight U.S. cities. Catanzano oversees the organization's policy and advocacy efforts, which draw on the learning and experience of IRC humanitarian and resettlement programming to shape policy and practice. She joined the IRC from a career in the U.S. government, most recently as the director for strategic planning at the National Security Council. Prior to the National Security Council, Catanzano was a member of the secretary of state's policy planning staff and special assistant to the deputy secretary of state, covering South and Central Asia with a focus on Afghanistan and Pakistan.
