

Max Primorac

Max Primorac is a senior research fellow at The Heritage Foundation's Margaret Thatcher Center for Freedom. During the last administration, Primorac was Acting Chief Operating Officer at the U.S. Agency for International Development. He previously launched the Bureau for Humanitarian Assistance where he was the federal government's lead coordinator for global disaster response and served as the U.S. Vice-President's Envoy to Iraq, overseeing a genocide recovery program. From

2012-2017 he was President of the Institute for Stabilization & Transition after serving as a senior advisor to the Government of Afghanistan under a USAID contract. During the Bush administration, Primorac held senior executive roles at the U.S. Department of State as Senior Advisor for Stabilization in the Office of the Secretary and Deputy Director of Iraq's multi-billion-dollar reconstruction program. He began his career as President of the Center for Civil Society in Southeastern Europe in response to the violent collapse of former Yugoslavia. Max obtained his master's degree from the University of Chicago and bachelor's degree from Franklin & Marshall College.
