What we know about the Langley Air Force Base drone incident

Langley Air Force Base officials are in the market for special anti-drone nets to protect their tactical aircraft from prying eyes after waves of still-unexplained uncrewed aerial vehicles buzzed the base.

Incident Details:

- In December 2023, Langley Air Force Base experienced drone overflights for more than two weeks
- A dozen or more drones were involved in the incident
- The number of aerial incursions fluctuated daily
- The drones did not appear to exhibit hostile intent
- The identity of the drone operators remains unknown

Military Response:

- Military commanders have the authority to protect forces, facilities, and infrastructure
- No action was taken to destroy or disable the drone swarms
- Coordination with interagency partners was required due to the incident occurring on U.S. soil
- The Department of Defense is continuing to analyze the incident

Protective Measures:

- Langley Air Force Base is now seeking anti-drone nets to protect tactical aircraft
- The nets are intended to cover up to 42 aircraft shelters on the flight line
- The goal is to deter and prevent drone intrusions near airmen and aircraft
