Jamil N. Jaffer is the Founder and Executive Director of the National Security Institute at the Scalia Law School at George Mason University where he also serves as an Assistant Professor of Law, Director of the National Security Law and Policy Program, and Director of the Cyber, Intelligence, and National Security LL.M. Program. Jamil is also a Venture Partner with Paladin Capital Group and serves on the Tozny and RangeForce boards. Jamil is also affiliated with Stanford's Center for International Security and Cooperation, is an advisor to Beacon Global Strategies, and serves on a variety of other nonprofit and advisory boards.

Previously Jamil served as SVP for a cybersecurity startup for six-and-a-half years as it went from a bootstrapped company to raising multiple rounds of venture capital, all the way through an IPO on the New York Stock Exchange, where he led strategy, technology partnerships, and corporate development. Jamil also served in a variety of senior national security roles in the federal government, including as an Associate Counsel to President George W. Bush, on the leadership teams of the Justice Department's National Security Division and the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, as well as on the senior staff of the House Intelligence Committee. In these roles, Jamil led the drafting of the nation's first cyber threat intelligence sharing legislation, quarterbacked efforts on surveillance, counterterrorism, and other national security matters, led DOJ's work on the President's Comprehensive National Cybersecurity Initiative, and advised on intelligence collection and offensive cyber activities.

Jamil is an honors graduate of UCLA, the University of Chicago Law School, and the U.S. Naval War College, and previously served as a law clerk to Justice Neil M. Gorsuch of the U.S. Supreme Court and Judge Edith H. Jones of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit. Jamil also previously served as a Visiting Fellow at the Hoover Institution, as an outside advisor to the Cyberspace Solarium Commission, and taught classes at GWU's Elliott School and the National Intelligence University.
