Khaliah Barnes is Associate Director and Administrative Law Counsel for the Electronic Privacy Information Center (EPIC), an independent, non-profit research center based in Washington, DC that focuses public attention on emerging privacy and related human rights issues. Khaliah works on a host of privacy issues and has submitted comments in over forty federal agency rulemakings and similar agency proceedings concerning car privacy, the Privacy Act, the U.S. - EU Safe Harbor Framework, information security, air traveler rights, student privacy, consumer rights, drones and domestic surveillance, medical privacy, and the Freedom of Information Act. Khaliah also directs EPIC's Student Privacy Project. As Director of the EPIC Student Privacy Project, Khaliah created the Student Privacy Bill of Rights. She has testified before states and local districts on the need to safeguard student records.

Khaliah has provided expert commentary to local and national media, including CBS This Morning, the New York Times, the Washington Post, NPR, Fox Business News, CNN, Education Week, Politico, USA Today, and Time Magazine. Khaliah has been invited to discuss privacy at a variety of conferences and symposia, including events hosted by the Aspen Institute, IAPP, SXSWedu, Harvard's Berkman Center for Internet and Society, the NYU Information Law Institute, and the Consumer Federation of America. Khaliah is a Vice-Chair of the American Bar Association's Privacy and Information Security Committee. She is admitted to practice in Maryland, Washington, D.C., and the United States District Court for the District of Columbia. In 2016, Khaliah will co-teach "Information Privacy Law" with EPIC Executive Director Marc Rotenberg at Georgetown Law.

Khaliah graduated from Georgetown University Law Center and Emory University, where she earned a B.A. in political science and minored in French Studies. Khaliah previously interned with the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy.

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
